Leslie Turley Appointed Area Director Designee

American Baptist International Ministries (IM) is pleased to announce that Leslie Turley has accepted the invitation to become area director for Southeast Asia and Japan. The current area director, Stan Murray, plans to retire in 2015. Leslie will begin in her new role on July 1, 2015.

Leslie and her husband, David, have been serving as International Ministries' missionaries in Japan (mainland) and Okinawa since 1991. "Leslie served as a Christian school administrator, teacher, counselor and mission trip coordinator. She has also done leadership training," noted Murray. "She shared Christ through it all."

Turley is currently engaged in the Master's program in Global Leadership at Fuller Seminary and plans to pursue ordination in 2014. "I could not be more pleased that Leslie feels called to be my successor," said Murray. "God led in discerning this call in Leslie and I believe God has been 'growing her' into this leadership position for some time now."

David Turley, who served in Japan with Leslie for the past 23 years, supports the new role. He said, "It is Leslie's time to shine and I support her fully. It was hard for me to think about leaving this ministry [in Japan], but now that Leslie has accepted this offer, I can leave with joy and peace in my heart." David

will be departing from active missionary service to re-enter local church pastoral ministry.

"It is clear the Holy Spirit has equipped Leslie with spiritual gifts, skills and experience that have uniquely prepared her for this ministry," said Reid Trulson, executive director for International Ministries. "I am delighted she has embraced God's call to enter this work of ministering to fellow servants of the Lord in Southeast Asia and Japan."

The Turleys are returning to the United States in July 2014 for

their planned three-month United States/Puerto Rico Assignment. From October 2014 - June 2015, Leslie will be a missionary on special assignment as "Area Director Designee."

Those will be very full months of preparation for her area director ministry. The work of the area directors is based out of International Ministries' home office in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. The Turley's plan is to initially locate in West Virginia prior to moving to the Valley Forge area next year.

International Ministries requests prayer for the Turleys, "that Leslie and her family really have a sense of God's peace, especially when they transition from West Virginia to moving to the Valley Forge area," said Murray.

Leslie will continue to serve as an IM missionary in need of your ongoing support until she goes on staff in July 2015.





Rise to the Challenge

A full bus of West Virginia Baptists journeyed to Green Lake, Wisconsin for the 2014 World Mission Conference. This conference was a celebration of our 200 years of overseas mission work. All of our global missionaries were at this historic event as well as representatives from most of our global partners.

Those of us blessed to be there on opening night heard the packed house of 1,300 sing *How Great Thou Art*, each in their own language. The tent was filled with the awesome presence of God as we began to hear the stories - God's stories of lives changed through mission.

Annie Dieselberg, missionary to Thailand, shared the ministry of *Night Light*. She told about her work in the "red-light" district of Bangkok, and the work of national partners she has brought together to minister to the hundreds of women and girls sold into prostitution. She shared a story of redemption, a story of love.

Bill Clemmer, missionary to South Sudan, shared how God had multiplied a simple project for South Sudan into a national health care system.

The voices echoed out of the windows as the standing room only crowd of West Virginia Baptists stood and sang the "Doxology" at the close of worship in the Chapel Car Grace. Grace is stationed at the American Baptist Assembly at Green Lake, Wisconsin. The sound of the reed organ bellowing out the notes as we sang the *Old Rugged Cross* made a lasting memory.

Stan Murray, International Ministries' director for Southeast Asia and Japan, took us on a journey through the back alleys on the back of a motorcycle in Ho Chi Men City to visit a secret church in his first visit there. He also shared how God has now opened the doors for Christians that had previously been closed.

Back in Bolivia

After a whirlwind summer - 12 churches, 4 conferences and over 5,000 miles driven - we have flown back to Bolivia to get back to life and work. At the writing of this update, the kids have one day of freedom left until the start of school. Rhonda has already returned to Santa Cruz Christian Learning Center as the school nurse to get ready for the coming year. God has truly blessed her work with students and their families, and we know

He will continue to put opportunities in her path to share Christ's love with the kids. She also spends significant time traveling and working with short-term teams that come to Bolivia and provides medical care to rural and indigenous people.

Tablet Ministry Goes National

In September/October 2014, J.D. will begin to take his School of Leaders' training project to eight additional cities to train pastors and help develop other leaders. By the end of October, there will be over 140 students in the program. Because of this expansion, he will be doing much more traveling in Bolivia. As you can imagine, this support of pastors and leaders will be costly both in time and resources. The travel expense alone will add \$300 monthly to their ministry budget, which is a cost that wasn't expected. Young Adults: Skilled and Waiting

How to Encourage Millennials to Become Involved with Mission

Millennials are full of passion. They like to be involved in mission, and while they are not going to do it like their parents, God still works through them. While previous generations trusted organizations and contributed general dollars to mission through them, millennials want to first believe an organization is matching their passion and then doing something that is making a difference.

Millennials need to be inspired. They want to hear the stories about missionaries and what God is doing through their ministries. We need to be ready to share those stories, so that may mean we practice sharing with the younger generation.

Millennials get information mostly through electronic communication. It is important that in our sharing of stories we use different kinds of mediums. About 67% of young adults interact through Facebook and 65% are still seeking information through websites. When they want to learn more about missionaries and mission, they will search for information through Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, websites and other electronic media, so it is important to have information posted in key places.

Millennials are team players. They have been taught to work together in teams since they were in kindergarten and are good at team work.

Millennials want to be part of something that has a higher purpose. They will connect with an organization or group that

is doing something they believe in and in which they feel they can play a significant part. One example is an annual conference for young adults focusing on issues related to human trafficking. The participants, who are mostly college students, gave millions of dollars to the sponsoring organization to help address and stop human trafficking. When they saw a way to play a significant part, they gave generously.

Millennials need to see, feel and touch. They need to see and meet the missionaries in person to discover what God is doing through them, hearing how lives are being changed and how funding is used to make a difference. Their biggest pet peeve is not knowing where their money is going.

Millennials do not want to give to administrative costs. Missionaries need people who "have their back" and this includes sharing in administration work. We need to give millennials a different picture of what administration is all about and how that is an important component of changing lives and making a difference in the world. How can we help them to understand every dollar does go to and is used for mission?

Millennials prefer to give electronically. They do not carry cash or checkbooks, but prefer to give online or through any means in which they can give electronically with a credit or debit card.
