A View from the Summit

(Biennial Mission Summit Wrap Up and Supreme Court Same-Sex Marriage Ruling Commentary)

The 2015 Biennial Mission Summit was an American Baptist gathering at Overland Park, Kansas from June 26-28. The summit highlighted transitions, challenges and changes, including a report regarding the search process for a new general secretary. Roy Medley will be retiring from that leadership position at the end of 2015. The present search committee discontinued their work

because of a high level of dysfunction and a new search committee will be established in 2016. Other board of general ministries' items included the formation of a United Mission task force to increase the awareness of United Mission without changing the concept.



Aidsand Wright-Riggins will be retiring from the leadership of the American Baptist Home Mission Society on October 31, 2015. Jeff Haggray, a unanimous choice by the search committee, will succeed Wright-Riggins in that leadership role.

Reid Trulson celebrated the strong American Baptist values of doing and being a missional people. In the spirit of affirmation and celebration, there was a reminder of the 2016 World Mission Conference on July 3-9, 2016 in Green Lake, Wisconsin. Trulson will retire from the International Ministries' board at the end of August 2016. The International Ministries' board approved an executive director succession plan.

The music for all the sessions was grand, and our own Claire Dent of Vienna Baptist Church (Parkersburg) was part of the music leadership at each session. The preaching expressed a focus on social justice issues, racism and sexism with an emphasis on our multicultured Baptist family.

The issues pressing in on our gathering, and of great interest to the West Virginia Baptist Convention was the United States' Supreme Court decision to legalize same-sex marriage. On our website there is a statement that was shared during the Biennial meeting. One of the most helpful places for guidance is the Christian Law Association (www.christianlaw.org). As a reminder, please make sure your church has a stated building use



policy in your ruling documents. Keep the wording simple and direct, and note churches are not public institutions receiving public dollars. One of our West Virginia Baptist Convention staff members said it well in citing that there is another part of the

majority decision that should give us comfort as religious leaders. Justice Kennedy, in his writing for the majority, expressly cited the First Amendment protections for churches and clergy who object on religious grounds, stating that neither could be forced to perform ceremonies for which they had religious objections. This citation makes these protections as much the law of the land as the main point of the opinion. It may be challenged, yet it is the official opinion of the court.

Let us not panic, but rather *use this opportunity to proclaim the truth of the love of Jesus*!





The **Mountain State Mission Offering**, along with United Mission are the financial pillars that support our mission together. Without the generous support of these offerings, our mission would face serious reductions.



Weirton Christian Center has been blessed by the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church (Guyandotte) mission team this summer! Many needed repairs and maintenance issues were handled and a beautification project included painting indoors and out as well as landscaping around the center. What a group of hardworking servants for the Lord - the teens and their leaders. They were truly a blessing to our programming and with the children also. We would love to have them back any time as well as any other groups willing to come share their talents and service. With 75 children here during the same week as the 21 on the mission team, it was quite a bustling place. We also have another team coming from Fairmont between programs to paint and help stuff 750 backpacks for the back to school bash. We are truly blessed.

At the center, we are also sending kids from first grade through high school to camp each week. In the first three weeks of camp, we sent 78 children to Elkhorn Valley Christian Camp on "Jesus Loves You" scholarships; 32 of those attended in one week. These are life-changing times for the summer.

Afterschool begins on August 19, 2015 and we are looking to building up our depleted quarters for grades fund. Hispanic Ministries: Giving up Prejudices - Renunciar Prejuicios

Early followers of Jesus quickly discovered the Spirit was leading them beyond their religious, ethnic, social, economic and political limits to reach strangers with the gospel. They grasped that faithful participation in God's mission demands self-denial, relinquishment of prejudices and love of neighbor. Just like us, early disciples were slow to learn and often reluctant to act.

In Acts 10, Luke relates a key episode by which God challenges His church to dismantle ethnic, cultural and religious prejudices. Cornelius, a Roman citizen and a top official in the Roman army, lived in the seaport city of Caesarea. Caesarea was the center of the Roman administration for the province of Palestine and its culture and religion were pagan. Jews were not fond of Caesarea, in fact they despised it.

Cornelius was a devout, generous man of prayer who feared God. One day while praying, Cornelius clearly saw a vision in which an angel assures him his prayers and gifts to the poor had caught God's attention. Then the angel gives detailed instructions for Cornelius to contact Peter; he has a message he needs to hear. Cornelius does not hesitate to obey and immediately shares his vision with three trusted servants and sends them to look for Peter (Acts 10:1-8).

The following day as Cornelius' delegation journeys to fulfill its task, Peter receives an obscure and confusing vision. In his vision, Peter sees a large sheet containing all kinds of clean and unclean animals descending from heaven, and a voice directs him to "kill and eat." For Jews, dietary laws were no trivial matter; they were central to their identity. Their laws stated a clear distinction between what was holy and unholy, clean or unclean and pure and impure. What's more, these laws led them to reject other people and nations. Peter is scandalized and fiercely opposes the command, "By no means, Lord; I have never eaten anything that is profane or unclean." (Acts 10:13) Peter recognizes the voice giving the order is the Lord's, yet he refuses to obey.

The Lord, however, engages Peter and responds: "Do not call anything impure that God has made clean." (Acts 10:15) No doubt, God is calling Peter beyond his comfort zone to relinquish the ethnic, cultural and religious prejudices driving him to avoid contact with Gentiles; His call is so urgent He repeats it three times (Acts 10:16).

When Cornelius' messengers arrived at Peter's home, he was still pondering the meaning of his vision. And the Spirit instructs Peter to welcome them and go with them without hesitation. Peter opens up to God's activity and takes a bold step by welcoming and offering them hospitality (Acts 10:19-23). God

was about to reveal to Peter that he must not regard any group of people as profane or unclean.

The next day, Peter goes to Cornelius' home. As he arrives, he hurriedly makes sure Cornelius, his relatives and close friends understand the only reason he is there is because God sent him. If it were up to him, he would have nothing to do with them; they are uncircumcised, unholy and unclean. By then, Peter had grasped the meaning of his vision and declares, "God has shown me that I should not call anyone impure or unclean." (Acts 10:28)

As Cornelius retells his vision, Peter sees "God plays no favorites! It makes no difference who you are or where you're from - if you want God and are ready to do as He says, the door is open." (Acts 10:34-35) Then, as Peter tells them the story of Jesus, the unexpected happens, the Holy Spirit is poured on them. Peter and his companions are astounded that the gift of the Spirit is given to those they viewed as unclean and impure. Grace reaches Cornelius and his household and they are baptized (Acts 10:45, 48).

We live in times of great debates and polarization. And today, like then, God's people still grapple with prejudice. Prejudices and cultural biases hinder our mission efforts. For instance, a recent survey by the Public Religion Research Institute reveals among religious groups there is, particularly white evangelical Protestants, a majority (53 percent) who view immigrants as a threat to traditional American customs, and only a minority (33 percent) say they are a strength to society. In other words, we see immigrants not as an opportunity to share God's love, but as a threat to our way of living.

On the other hand, I know many others whose biases and negative views of immigrants were transformed once they personally met and learned the story of an immigrant. They have discovered that among immigrants we have sisters and brothers of incredible faith, courage and hope who dare coming to the United States because they trusted God was guiding them.

I realize giving up prejudices is a difficult task. Just like Peter and the early church, we need the work of the Spirit and God's grace in our lives. The good news is when Jesus promises the Spirit will empower us to be His witnesses across the globe, He implies the Spirit will challenge and shatter our prejudices - if we allow Him - so we can be the people God has sent us to be. A people bearing good news for everyone everywhere.

Gone Fishing



When I was a teenager I would go out at night after it had rained and collect night crawlers. My brothers and I would gather as many as we could and sell them to the local bait shop for a penny each.

When I was in high school, my grandfather, who was always looking for the next big deal, thought having a worm farm would be a great business opportunity. So we helped him convert his shop into what would become his worm house. He built worm boxes and filled them with bedding and his brood stock of worms.

To supplement the bedding, he decided to add composted cardboard. He got empty appliance boxes from Montgomery Ward and shredded them for compost. He would wet the cardboard pile and the decomposition process would begin. After the heat cycle, he added the material to the bedding. Grandpa did not know the composting process takes two heating cycles - so the first batch of worms died from the heat the composting cardboard emitted.

He was not deterred by the setback. He started over with a new batch of worms and was soon shipping Canadian Grey Night Crawlers to bait shops across the country. Business was good. However, when his heater failed in the winter months, his worm business was finished as the entire inventory was frozen.

Grandpa would be amazed at the bait business today. The worms I sold for a penny each are now selling for \$3.00 a dozen. Local worms are rare as the stores bring in their worms from large worm farms.

I recently bought a dozen night crawlers and was intrigued by the motto on the box: "We will catch fish or die trying!"

As I thought about this motto, I could not help but think about the church. When Jesus called His first disciples He told them they would become fishers of men. He then commissioned them to go into the world and make disciples of all nations.

As Christians, as the church, we should be so committed to making disciples (catching fish) that we are willing to risk everything to accomplish this purpose. We are to catch fish or die trying.

Adult Discipleship: Spiritual Formation - Active Repentance

The first facet of spiritual formation, reflective reading of God's Word, the Bible will lead a growing Christian's into facet number two, which is *active repentance*. Reflective reading helps us to know and understand who Christ is and what His nature is. As growing Christians, we want to intentionally become more Christlike. Becoming Christlike means realizing our humanness and sin each day and the need to confess each day. Repentance is more than a one-time event that happens when we accept Jesus as Savior and Lord. Confession and repentance are continuous, intentional acts of the growing Christian.

While there may be prayers of general confession and repentance during worship services, each Christian must come to God individually and acknowledge their sin and shortcomings during private prayer times as well. Confession comes out of an inward search of our souls, hearts and lives and the comparison to the standard of Jesus and His teachings. Confession comes from our realization we have missed the mark and need our sins to be forgiven. While we may live a "good" life, all of Jesus' followers are in need of forgiveness and grace.

Think about this story: A Native American and a white man were deeply moved by the same sermon. That very night the Native American received Jesus as his Savior, but for days the white man refused to accept Christ. At last he, too, repented and enjoyed the sweet peace of having his sins forgiven. Later, he asked his Native American friend, "Why did it take me so long, while you responded right away?"

"My brother," he replied, "I can best explain it by this little story: At one time a rich prince wished to give each of us a new coat. You shook your head and replied, 'I don't think so; mine looks good enough.' When he made the same offer to me, I looked at my old blan-

ket and said, 'This is good for nothing,' and gratefully accepted the beautiful garment. You wouldn't give up your own righteousness. But knowing I had no goodness of my own, I immediately received the Lord Jesus Christ and His righteousness."

Psalm 32:1-8 says: "Happy are those whose <u>transgression is forgiven</u>, whose <u>sin is covered</u>. Happy are those to whom the Lord imputes no iniquity and in whose spirit there is no deceit. <u>While I kept silence, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long</u>. For day and night your hand was heavy on me; <u>my strength was dried up</u> as by the heat of summer. Then <u>I acknowledged my sin to you</u> and I did not hide my iniquity; I said "<u>I will confess my transgressions to the Lord and you forgave the guilt of my sin."</u>

Sin and unrepentance in the soul of the believer will destroy both body and soul. God provides each follower with a way to be clean, fresh, strong and blameless each and every day. We have the opportunity to confess to our Heavenly Father and He in turn promises forgiveness.

Active repentance allows God to work in and through us. Cleansed of the burden of sin, we are then able to be filled with the power and wisdom of God through the work of the Holy Spirit and will become more useful instruments for serving Christ.

How could this feeling be compared to allowing God to cleanse you? Why is it hard to confess our sins after we become Christians? What do you need to do now to get in the habit of active repentance?

Another year, another amazing week of service at Brothers' Keeper 2015! During the last week of June and the first few days of July, a massive crew of youth and adults traveled to Parchment Valley Conference Center to serve as the hands and feet of Jesus.

Each day, over 150 campers from West Virginia and

Ohio spread out like a small army across Jackson County. Work included painting, constructing wheelchair ramps, weeding, tearing down and rebuilding decks, tarring roofs, pressure washing walls and so much more.

One can't help but be reminded of the words of Jesus in Matthew 20:28, when He says "... the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve." How often do you see a group of young people devoted to serving others, the smiles on

traveling around the region. One night during the week as things were winding down, some of the youth were a little rambunctious at the local grocery store. The effect on those served is apparent as the teenage repair crews help maintain homes for those who are unable to

due to physical or financial hardships. A bond develops between the youth and the homeowners, who are always surprised to see such a young, enterprising and servant-focused group accomplish so much in a week of work. The tears shed at the end of the project are in recognition of a job well done.

It is easy to miss another important element of the Brothers' Keeper community experience: the youth and adults
