BRIDGEPORT - The American Baptist Women's Ministries of West Virginia announced at its annual session the "Million Women Movement." "This movement is a way to declare God's might and goodness throughout the world as we honor the women who have blessed and impacted our lives," they said.

In introducing the movement, several women shared compelling stories about women that had impacted them. Parents, teachers, significant leaders, etc ... were lifted up as examples of women who had made a personal difference. 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
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The Birth of Hope

- HANDS being the hands and feet of Christ - how we serve others as Christ serves us and calls us to share His message of HOPE.

We are working with the Greg Boso Engineering Firm to insure the corrected repairs are made, and in accordance with the WVDEP requirements. The cost of the project could be upwards of \$300,000. We ask for your prayers and support as we faithfully move forward to finishing the work.

When the disciples were on the lake with Jesus a fierce storm arose. The storm was so powerful that it made experienced fishermen fear for their lives. In their panic, they woke Jesus from His sleep and asked, "Do you not care if we

perish?" Jesus calmly spoke to the wind and the waves and the storm immediately ceased. (Mark 4)

The disciples were focused on the storm instead of Jesus. They lost hope because they were looking at the situation through faithless eyes. Jesus challenged them to have faith. Jesus provided relief from the storm and gave them peace.

Camp Cowen builds my community! I can't begin to explain the number of Christian peers I have met at Cowen that are still great friends to this day!





Hispanic Ministries: Hope for a Better Future - La Esperanza de un Futuro Mejor

Hope for a better future describes quite well the reason millions of Hispanic immigrants have come to the United States. The vision of a better life justifies the perils, uncertainties and sacrifices of their journey. A house for their family; property to grow food; education for a son, a daughter or siblings; helping a relative with medical expenses; and paying a debt are among the aspirations Hispanic immigrants have when they set foot in the United States.

Their lives are inspiring stories of hope, courage and determination. Several months ago, I partnered with a photo-journalist student from Ohio University to carry out interviews that would help us gain deeper understanding into the lives of Hispanic immigrants in West Virginia. "What inspired you and what was the reason you finally decided to immigrate to the United States?" was one of the questions. The responses were many, but the constant of them all was the hope of a better and brighter future. The yearning for a better life indwells the heart of every human being. It is this longing that has propelled millions of people into this country and across the globe in search of new opportunities or to escape poverty and famine. Listen to some of the responses:

Casimiro was sixteen-years-old when he immigrated to the United States. He says, "I wanted to have a house and try to improve my life ..."

Reyna was fifteen-years-old when she made the decision to immigrate. Her mother was very ill and, when her father took her mother to the doctor, they found a tumor in her chest. She told her mother, "I will go to the United States. Do not worry because I will make lots of money and I will send money so you can go to the doctor, so my siblings do not have to suffer what I suffered, so they can study."

Dagoberto says about his experience, "I thought about the fact my family in Mexico didn't have a house." While going through the dessert a cactus thorn pierced his foot. He could barely walk. The pain was searing, but he kept moving. He feared for his life and prayed, "My God, what should I do? Do I go back? Do I stay here?" The dream of a better life, a house for his mother and siblings compelled him to keep moving. To go back would have meant more of the same misery.

Teresa said, "Back home, we didn't have money, we didn't have food to eat, we didn't have the means to sustain a family. There is nothing to do, nothing to make a living. We only had our house. There wasn't even money to buy clothes or 'guaraches' (sandals) for the children. That is why we came here."

God commissions us to offer these immigrants the hope we have found in Jesus Christ. It is through a relationship with God through Jesus we can truly experience abundant life now and in the future.

Thank you for your prayers and financial support as we continue to bring the hope found in Christ to the Hispanic immigrants in West Virginia.

Dewey taught for 36 years at Marsh Fork Middle School, Eccles Junior High School, Trap Hill Middle School and finished his career at the Raleigh County Board of Education as an Academic Writing Coach. He sponsored the National Junior Honor Society and the Student Council.

His extracurricular activities included coaching boys and girls' basketball, wrestling, girls' track and soccer at the YMCA for nine years.

He was called to his first and only pastorate at Breckenridge Missionary Baptist Church in 1975 and was ordained by the church in March 1976. During that time, the church has added an annex, built a new sanctuary, a gymnasium and procured lands on all sides for further development.

Dewey has had over 500 baptisms, one being a 91 year old lady, 182 weddings, one of those being his mother-in-law, Emily Phillips and 215 funerals, burying four generations of one dear family.

Celebrate Recovery has been a real blessing at Romney First Baptist Church (Eastern), and in the community. Celebrate Recovery is a biblical and balanced program that helps us overcome our hurts, hang-ups and habits. It is based on the actual words of Jesus rather than psychological theory. It was designed as a program to help those struggling with hurts, habits and hang-ups by showing them the loving power of Jesus Christ through a recovery process.

Pastor Rick Warren of Saddleback Church in Lake Forest, California said this could be the greatest outreach program a church could have. He was not kidding. In 13 weeks of meetings, the group at Romney First Baptist Church has been able to go from seven people on the first night to 35 people on other nights. We have given out over 65 Bibles and step guides to every participant, along with step guides.

Most of the program is run and supported by the participants. In the past two weeks, we have been able to see the Lord call 12 people for first-time decisions for Christ and immediately become baptized! We even dedicated four children the night we baptized the 12 participants.


Bridgeport Baptist Church Celebrates 100th Anniversary

On September 1, 2013, Bridgeport Baptist Church (Judson) celebrated 100 years in Bridgeport, West Virginia. They had a full day of service, beginning with a morning meet and greet for the local community. Pastor Thomas Edgell preached on God's sovereignty by addressing His work goes on "With or



Without You." There was a church picnic after the sermon and a special concert by Crossland Trio, a new country-gospel group.

Following a series of meetings in the homes of members, from April 13, 1913, until June, 1913, a church was finally organized in the home of A.J. Williams, on June 13, 1913. Twenty-eight persons comprised the charter members at the meeting. This group of people had been part of the membership of Simpson Creek Baptist Church (Union). The original structure of the church was completed in 1913 and was dedicated on October 12, 1913, when the first service was held in it. On September 10, 1914, the church was accepted into the Judson Baptist Association. Early in the 1940's, several improvements were undertaken. These improvements included new church school chairs, choir chairs, carpeting, a division of the balcony for church school classes and erection of a new altar. In September 1957, property was acquired on East Main Street, Bridgeport, to house the pastor and his family. In 1961, the complete remodeling of the church sanctuary was concluded. In 1963, a plot of ground on Worthington Drive was acquired, which now serves as the site of the current Bridgeport Baptist Church.
