Students Attend Passion 2012 Conference

ATLANTA, GEORGIA - Baptist Campus Ministry (BCM) students rang in the new year with 43,000 other college students and leaders. January 2-5, 2012 in Atlanta, Georgia was quite possibly the largest gathering of college-aged students in the name of Jesus, in the history of the church. One-hundred twenty West Virginia BCM students joined up with tens of thousands of college students from around the country and world for the sole purpose of worshipping Jesus at Passion 2012 Conference.

The theme of the conference this year was "Freedom." At this very moment, 27 million people are enslaved. That is more than at any point in history. This includes children trafficked for sexual exploitation, kids abused in factories, men and women trapped as bonded labor slaves and countless other horrific abuses. These are real, living, breathing people. Passion believes together we can make a difference in putting an end to human slavery. People tend to think college students are "poor" financially, but these "poor" college students dug deep into their pockets and took the scripture literally and gave over \$1.5 million to put an end to injustice. I am so thankful we have a generation of college students who are willing to rise up and give sacrificially, not only for the sake of humanity, but for the glory of Jesus!

Christine Caine spoke to the students at Passion. She talked about her journey to Poland. When she was in Poland she began to think about the Holocaust. She asked God, "Where was the church during the Holocaust? Why didn't the church stand up for the injustice of the Holocaust?" She promised God that day on her watch, she would not allow something like that to ever happen again. A few years later she realized something even larger than the Holocaust was happening around the world and for the most part the church, once again, was being silent. Christine

has committed her life to bringing freedom to the 27 million slaves. Now that we know, how will we respond? Some college students gave, some have committed to going to the mission field and others have a new zeal for the gospel and are seeing their room-

mates come to Christ. God is moving in this generation of college students and it is exciting! These students are not content to hear a good message and sing a nice song and then go about their lives. But rather, they are LIVING the messages they hear and the songs they sing! May we exude the same zeal for our mighty Savior!

A Failure to Communicate

“What we have here is a failure to communicate.” So goes a line from the 1967 movie *Cool Hand Luke*. Poor communications can cause difficulties in so many places and in so many relationships... problems that cause time delays, personal inefficiency and general frustration. Good healthy communication is vital within organizations and personal relationships.

Another communications quote shared over the years reminds us how complicated communications can be : *“I know that you believe you understand what you think I said, but I am not sure you realize that what you heard is not what I meant.”* Not only can we apply this quote to our lives and our workplace, but also to our churches. Communication is hard work! To get everyone in any organization or family on the same page is a great accomplishment. One teacher of a speech class taught this theory: *You tell people what you are going to tell them, then you tell them and finally you tell them what you told them.* Reinforcement of a message is important, but it does not always deal with all the various aspects of getting the message shared.

We should seek to improve our communications and find better methods, tools and tactics to share the gospel. In a recent article by Kaya Singer entitled “Five Communication Secrets to Creating a Strong Team,” she shares five tools for empowering our ability to get our message communicated clearly.

1. **ATTITUDE IS EVERYTHING** - It seems we live in a world where being negative is normal. Life is 10 percent what happens to us and 90 percent how we react to it. As much as you are able, create a new normal. Roman 12:18 reminds us of that approach.

2. **USE POSITIVE LANGUAGE** - Words are a powerful tool in work and in life. Speak well!

3. **BE CONGRUENT** - Actions speak louder than words. Only seven percent of communication is verbal. Don't forget about the other 93 percent! People make firm judgments about you long before you speak. *Be what you say.*

4. **FOCUS ON WHAT YOU WANT** - Most people focus on what they don't want. Watch the complaining and blaming vocabulary in your communications.

5. **IT'S OKAY TO ASK FOR HELP** - You don't have to know everything. You do need to seek out people who know the answers to your concerns. We need to create an environment where people are encouraged to ask for help if needed.

These five suggestions have many more applications for each tool, but they are direct ways to improve our ability to share the work of the gospel and change people for the kingdom. In this New Year, may we find exciting ways to communicate the good news and be who we say we are - the people of God!



Missional Church Learning Experience (back by popular demand!)

WHAT IS IT?

Missional Church Learning Experience (MCLE) is a cluster of churches in the West Virginia Baptist Convention that will form a learning community to explore what God is saying to the church today.

How can we best fit in with God's mission in our rapidly changing culture? Each church involved in the learning community forms a mission team that receives training in basic missional church principles and practices those principles by designing and implementing a small community project.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE?

Any church, large or small, country or city, who is interested in exploring the future of Christian faith in America can participate. Some guidelines for church involvement include a willingness to try new ideas, including involvement in their communities with other community organizations.

WHAT IS THE CHURCH EXPECTED TO DO?

Establish a mission team of 3-5 members or more who will give oversight to their church's involvement during the Missional Church Learning Experience (MCLE).

The team is composed of the pastor (or appointed leader), three lay members and a youth (age 15-29).

The mission team will attend three regional MCLE sessions over a one-year period. They will complete three assign-

ments that will help the mission team design a small community project that will be used to practice missional principles. The MCLE will implement their community project, involving appropriate church resources of time, money, energy and community partnerships.

They will share what they learn from their experience with other churches in the West Virginia Baptist Convention. They will be able to continue to do MCLE projects into the future and multiply teams.

WHAT ARE THE CONTENTS OF THE THREE SESSIONS?

1. Orientation - introduction to basic missional principles and explanation of the MCLE process. Handouts will help them to implement a Bible study and survey of their church and community.

2. Session 2 - the mission teams will share what they learned during their home assignments and use their community project outline as a case study to learn more about missional church principles.


3. Session 3 - the mission teams will tell about their community project and what they are learning about God's kingdom work and the learning community will celebrate what they have learned and discuss ways to multiply future ministry.

Hispanic Ministries: Memorable Experiences - Experiencias Inolvidables

Memorable experiences instill our lives with joy, gratefulness and hope for the future. God has blessed me with quite a few experiences as a new dad which I will forever cherish, but, three of them have a unique significance. The day my son was born is the first. Great delight, nervousness and a myriad of other mixed feelings were unavoidable. Seeing his face and touching his little hands for the first time were intensely emotional. Then, when he was about eight months he began babbling the word "papa." It was such a triumph to beat "mami," even though now, that's all he says. Lastly, it's the day he walked for the first time. He lifted himself up by grabbing the side of the couch, then looked at me and there he went, risking his balance. It wasn't long before he hit the floor. Yet, I was so thrilled celebrating my son's magnificent achievement.

There is no doubt that just like me, most of you celebrate the accomplishments in the lives of your children, dear ones and special friends. There are even times when we exhilaratingly rejoice on the performances of our favorite sport teams and players. The kingdom of God is filled with memorable moments and accomplishments we all must celebrate for the glory of God. Let me share some with you. On January 2012, Comunidad Nueva Esperanza's (CNE) (Good Hope) commemorated her second birthday! Long ago, even before we envisioned a Hispanic ministry in West Virginia, God conceived CNE in his heart for such a time as this (Isaiah 46:9-10). Two years ago, we heard God crying out, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" (Isaiah 6:8) It was a call to commit and risk. We believed God had a special purpose with the migrant farm workers and their families, and we embarked on this adventure. There have been many challenges and triumphs. We must pray for strength and wisdom to

overcome the challenges and be joyful for the triumphs.

Comunidad Nueva Esperanza's Christmas dinner was one these victories. The Christmas dinner, held on the evening of December 25, 2011, had an absolute outreach focus. In addition to the feast of flavors from Mexico, Guatemala, Nicaragua and the United States, CNE delighted in blessing with Christmas presents for 30 kids from Hispanic and American families in Ravenswood and surrounding areas. "We need to bring a smile to the faces of these children," said Alex, an Hispanic that God is raising as a leader in CNE. Several families heard the gospel for the first time. This Hispanic congregation is committed to God's global mission - "backyard" as well as international missions. CNE has been blessed by the generosity and prayers of numerous sister churches throughout West Virginia. Comunidad Nueva Esperanza also wants to be a blessing to others. As an expression of this desire to be a blessing, CNE made a commitment to provide financial support to the Myers' family, who have been endorsed and appointed as missionaries to Mexico. But, that's not all: CNE is also supporting the construction of "un templo" (a temple) in a rural community of Chiapas, Mexico.

These memorable achievements we must celebrate for the glory of God! Yet, before the celebration, comes His call. The Lord continues to cry out, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" His call is a call to commit and to risk. He calls us to join His mission - a mission with global and eternal implications. Are we hearing His voice? Or, are we paying no heed to His invitation? Let's step out in faith. Let's change lives for the kingdom! God is faithful and He is with us!

Help in a Time of Need

Many of you know our son, Timothy, and keep him in your prayers as he has had serious health issues for several years. Last April he shattered his ankle and required reconstructive surgery. The surgery went well and his healing progressed as well as one could expect. However, his bones being weakened by his other health issues caused another break requiring another surgery. The healing went well again, but a couple of weeks after the annual meeting, his leg broke just below the knee and he was placed in a full-length cast. With the full cast we could no longer safely get him in and out of the house.

We needed to build a ramp - quickly! Kevin Hanna had done the specifications for a ramp as a possible Brothers' Keeper project last year and he gladly gave us the plans. Some of our staff sent out e-mails letting people know we needed help. We received lots of calls and e-mails offering help and the project was completed in two weeks time.

Fox Engineering of Ripley sent a crew to dig the 30 post holes for the project. They, like several others, worked in the rain to get the project underway. Frank Miller not only arranged for Fox to come, he brought the equipment needed to cut the boards. The men from Comunidad Nueva Esperanza (Good Hope) came out and worked in the dark, digging and

cutting. Parchment Valley Baptist Church (Good Hope), Parkersburg Baptist Temple (Parkersburg), Lifespring Jackson and the SWAT (servants working around town) from South Parkersburg Baptist Church (Parkersburg) came together to build the 80-foot ramp that continues to make a tremendous difference to our family.

Lisa and I were overwhelmed by the outpouring of assistance. Other churches also called to make sure we had things covered as they too were offering teams. We could have never imagined the project would come together so quickly with so many people helping.

What a joy it is to be part of a Christian community that works together to help someone in a time of need. Words cannot express our gratitude to all who came to help us in our time of need. Thank you for your continued prayers!



Missions... The Tie That Binds

When Dr. David Carrico became the Executive Minister of the West Virginia Baptist Convention in 2005, he was asked what his top three priorities would be. He responded, "Missions! Missions! Missions!" It has been evident the past seven years missions has been and continues to be the one thing that keeps us together as Baptists.

There is no doubt the churches of the West Virginia Baptist Convention are committed to missions. Each year hundreds from our Convention churches "go" on mission. From the reports we have received, we can estimate over 1,000 people went on a mission trip last year. You impacted the world and your communities with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

It is exciting to hear how God is working and using us in that work. One group just got back from Russia where they celebrated Christmas with our partners there. It is with much anticipation, we wait for their stories to be shared.

Some of the recent stories of overseas mission trips involve our Convention staff. Max Hill has been involved with ministry in Cuba for many years. He was going to Cuba long before it became



an easy destination and has seen much change in the ministry environment for our brothers and sisters there. Max and his team held revival in the El Jordan Baptist Church in Havana. While much of the meeting would compare with revivals in our churches, there was the uniqueness of the Cuban Baptists that added a youth meeting, soccer game and children's events. Revivals there are community events and the results of the meeting will be lasting - and for the three that came to Christ, eternal!

Rob Ely just returned from his ninth trip to India. His previous trips had always been to the North East, but this mission opportunity was to join Baptist Youth Fellowship, India for its quadrennial gathering at the Century Baptist Church in Andhra Pradesh (Southern India). Rob traveled with a couple of youth pastors from West Virginia to provide leadership at the conference. By India standards, this was a small meeting for youth leaders from across the country. Over 800 people gathered for worship and training.

Imagine the logistics for a three-day meeting where the hosts had to provide housing and food for everyone who came. The General Secretary reported the people ate one ton of rice, 880 pounds of chicken, 2000 eggs, 616 pounds of vegetables and 440 pounds of fruit.

What is really encouraging about the church in India is it remains focused on missions. In the second leg of their trip, the group led Peacemaking workshops and did further training with 25 youth pastors from the area. They also worshiped at South Lallguda, Secunderbad Baptist Church recognized by the BWA as one of the top 20



David and Laura Parajon, the group conducted medical clinics and did construction projects.

The medical team was very pleased to see great improvement in the children they had treated the previous year. Because of the vitamins and iron contributed by our churches, these children have much better health.

The group also participated in a Vacation Bible School, teaching the children about Noah, Jonah and Zacchaeus. There was something for each person on the trip to contribute as God provided many unexpected opportunities and blessings along the way.

Our partners in Nicaragua greatly appreciate and depend on our visits to enhance the ministries God has called them to do. You can look for future trip announcements for Nicaragua in the Convention Mountain Topics and Mission Matters publications.

"Missions! Missions! Missions!" If you were to ask Dr. Carrico today, that would still be his response as to the focus and priority of the Convention.

Missions is the reason the Convention was formed and continues to be the tie that binds us together as we change people for the kingdom around the block and around the world.

Project Good Samaritan

Project Good Samaritan began in 1983, when Rev. Roger Fairfax learned, while visiting Ruby Memorial Hospital in Morgantown, that an out-of-town couple whose baby was seriously ill lacked money to eat. All they could afford during the child's stay were crackers, cookies and milk or soft drinks provided by the pediatric pantry. He also learned the couple's case was not isolated and so, in conjunction with social services at the hospital, he contacted other ministers and a committee of four clergy was formed and Project Good Samaritan became a reality. In the beginning, donations were solicited from individuals, businesses and churches. Three hospitals receiving funding at that time were West Virginia University, Charleston Area Medical Center and the cancer center at Camden Clark Medical Center. Now, we have 12 hospitals and as funds become available, other hospitals will be added.

The purpose of Project Good Samaritan is to provide a helping hand to destitute family members of hospital patients by providing a limited number of hot meals and/or initial prescriptions upon the patient's discharge from the hospital. This help is granted only as a last resort when all other avenues of financial help have been exhausted.

Project Good Samaritan is funded by contributions from churches and associations. Our annual budget is around \$20,000 and if your church would like to be a part of this, send your contributions to the West Virginia Baptist Convention through your church treasurer and mark Project Good Samaritan. This is the project of the West Virginia Baptist churches and is administered by the American Baptist Women's Ministries.

Please pray that lives will be touched and our Lord glorified as the hurting are ministered to in this unique way. Let us not forget the words of Jesus in Matthew 25:40, "And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

American Baptist Men of West Virginia Disaster Relief: Year in Review

The American Baptist Men of West Virginia responded to only one West Virginia disaster this year. Nine volunteers worked 170 hours helping five families clean their homes following a flood in late June 2011 on the upper waters of Grave Creek. The flood affected 50 structures in Cameron in Marshall County.

In August and September 2011, two American Baptist Men of West Virginia teams and a team of eight from Summersville Baptist Church responded to Minot, North Dakota after the Souris river flooded the area with water up to ten feet in low lying homes and stayed there for two to three weeks. Approximately 4,000 homes were affected in the area. The teams worked 2,130 hours cleaning homes and basements and preparing the houses for rebuild. Due to the early onset of winter, a few of the homeowners will be able to enclose the structure, put heat into it and wait for spring weather to begin rebuilding their homes. However, most of the houses will set as open shells through the winter resulting in many homeowners being displaced for more than a full year.

Zion Missionary Baptist Church Celebrates 150 Years

Zion Missionary Baptist Church (Teays Valley) celebrated its 150th anniversary in October 2011 with a special homecoming day of celebrations. During the morning service, Basil Hudson preached, and later in the day, Fred McCallister and Joe Hammick, both former pastors, preached. This small church has seen its community decline and change in recent years; however, their spirit remains strong. They know they have been maintained on Crab Creek for a reason and are seeking new ways to serve the community in 2012.

Churches of the Teays Valley Association have worked together to have a preacher at Zion Missionary each Sunday since their pastor, Jake Rainey died in 2010.
