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West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen: Strong in the Storm

Summer 2012 provided great adventures on this wonderful pursuit of God. We all remember the storms that hit West Virginia in June. The adventure began at the end of vespers with 271 junior high students making a mad dash to the Alice Randall Dining Hall. That is where we gathered as the wind and rain made its presence known. Counselors and campers alike gathered around candles in the dining hall as staff assessed the damage. Although we had a few trees down and a broken power line, camp was fine! It was a fun night of problem solving and worship at campfire! Junior High II ended with 10 students accepting Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. What a blessing from God!

One big problem with the storm was we had to cancel Mid-High Camp. My history only goes back a few years, but at least since 1996, we have never had to cancel a week of camp. This turned into a great bless-

ing. The Greenbrier-Raleigh/Rockcastle Association Camp invited any student from Mid-High who could attend to join them for a week of camp. Several volunteers from Mid-High joined with the association camp to create a great atmosphere for campers. There were five first-time decisions for Christ, 40 rededications and three calls to ministry during this crazy, amazing week.

Some reflections from Lee Boso, director of Mid-High Camp, "This summer, I realized God's presence in the midst of a storm, literally. The morning after the major storm hit West Virginia, I woke up early to no power and began trying to make contact with people to

figure out what we were going to do about Mid-High Camp. In the face of no power, limited communication and realizing this was a much bigger deal than a quick power outage, we cancelled camp for the next week. This was a big deal for me. In my 15 or more years of being involved with Camp Cowen, I never experienced a camp being cancelled. The next few days were an emotional roller coaster as power came on and went off; however, I learned God is faithful and present with His people in every circumstance. I heard stories and experienced first-hand neighbors helping neighbors, preparing meals, sharing airconditioned homes, cutting trees and offering encouragement. We also were

able to experience the community of the West Virginia Baptist Convention family as the Mid-High leadership worked with other camps to ensure kids had the opportunity to go to camp. As power was restored at Camp Cowen, we were

I am grateful for this association camp, which has a long legacy at Camp Cowen, and their willingness to welcome new faces, new ideas and ultimately combine to create an incredible week of camp. I believe God was present through the storm and in the calm. God opened doors to get kids to camp to hear the good news of Jesus. I am grateful for the reminder God is in control no matter what and He is present with us. I look forward to an opportunity for camps to operate on a "normal" schedule next year, God willing!"

Roots And Fruits....

Father Walter Adams was an Anglican parish minister and a spiritual mentor to C.S. Lewis. They met almost every week for more than a decade. Lewis grew to love the scriptures and to know the Lord Jesus Christ. Adams would often remind Lewis, "Look after the roots and fruits will look after themselves." There are times our passion for ministry feeds the fruits and forgets the roots. It is not an either or situation, but a calling to support

both roots and fruits.

We live in a culture of choices. Every occasion of life seems to give us a menu of choices with some of the choices not being carried out wisely because we did not possess all the necessary information to do so. Further, we need to understand as much as possible the intended and unintended consequences of our choices.

How do we support the roots and the fruits? Luke 14:28 tells us to "count the cost." Do the resources we have wisely support our purpose? Can we support the roots and the fruits, remembering without the roots there will be no fruits? Sometimes, we pick the low hanging fruits and forget to look beyond it. Paul reminds us to "not grow weary in your well-doing." (Galatians 6:9) But sometimes our "well-doing" becomes selfish in that we do things that make us feel good

rather than doing something that fulfills a mission.

Roots and fruits are in a relationship that requires attention and celebration. There are times we act as if we don't need the family and the family only needs us. In Baptist circles, that is called the associational principle. As Baptist family members, we support one another for the sake of the kingdom. This fall, as we develop our ministry plans in dollars (church budgets), let us be intentional in our work, remembering our purpose and the total work of the Baptist family.

Ministry is not a fixed system of tasks and objectives, but rather an affirmation of what the Spirit has empowered God's people to be about. Look after the roots and fruits - they require intentional spiritual care. Paul tells Timothy, "Do not neglect the spiritual gift which is in you." (I Timothy 4:14) John Biersdorf, in a book entitled Creating an Intentional Ministry, noted intentionality refers to the style of faith and proactive behavior at the heart of our ministry. We must develop the quality of our relationships with intentionality.

As we celebrate the fruits of the kingdom, may we also be intentional about caring for the roots. We look at a menu in a restaurant, and while we can't eat everything it presents to us, we can make the best choices possible. Our West Virginia Baptist roots are Missions, Evangelism, Discipleship and Stewardship - look after the roots and fruits will look after themselves.

American Baptist Foreign Mission Society Missionaries Keith and Debbie Myers Move Closer to Commissioning

Keith and Debbie Myers, two of American Baptist Foreign Mission Society's (ABFMS) newest endorsed missionary candidates, reached an important milestone on August 1, 2012 by becoming appointed for missionary service in central Mexico.

The Myers were first endorsed by ABFMS to form a Missionary Partnership Team. Assisted by their Missionary Partnership Team (MPT) and ABFMS' staff, the couple then

began building a Missionary Partnership Network (MPN) to secure commitments of prayer and financial support from individuals and churches. Having built an MPN sufficient for an initial level of support, Debbie and Keith moved from endorsement to missionary appointment.

Upon appointment, missionaries become ABFMS' employees. This allows missionaries like the Myers to complete cross-cultural orientation as well as language acquisition, security and other prefield training to prepare them for international, cross-cultural ministry.

Appointment also frees them to expand their MPN to secure the remaining per-

sonalized support needed to be commissioned by the ABFMS' board for missionary service.

Debbie and Keith are from Worthington, West Virginia and have been appointed to serve in Mexico with CICEM, Consejo Indígena Campesino Evangélico de México, A.R. (Council of Rural Indigenous Evangelicals of Mexico, A.R.). The Myers will assist ABFMS' partner, CICEM, in its mission to provide encouragement and support to rural indigenous evangelical churches in their biblical-theological training. This consists

of training pastors, church leaders, youth leaders and teachers for the children. Debbie and Keith's two children, Boyden (age 14) and Baillie (age 13), are enthusiastic about joining their parents in ministry in Mexico.

"We feel called to minister to the indigenous people of southern central Mexico because of the need we saw when we visited with some of the pastors of CICEM last November," the Myers recalled. They wanted to better understand God's word

> and learn how to effectively reach out to their communities and create a sense of safety and be a place of refuge for the church to gather and worship and discover God's call in their lives.

Dr. David Carrico, executive minister, West Virginia Baptist Convention, has said of Debbie and Keith, "The Myers have prepared their lives well to be used by the Lord. The West Virginia Baptist Convention is so blessed to have another missionary family to support with our prayers and resources. Keith and Debbie are gifted and ready to serve the kingdom."

The Weirton Christian Center ended a summer of fun and learning with great results in Lexia Learning and Kindergarten Readiness. Fitness goals each child set were met with the help of our AmeriCorps*VISTA member, Tabetha Henderson and summer VISTA member, Kerissa Herr. There were two great weeks of Vacation Bible school and Christian clown training with several graduates and lots of special guests. The library literacy program included a large group of our children who participated in reading books all summer on their own. Sixty-five children attended camp at Elkhorn Valley and 45 of us from the center were able to be together for a four-day retreat.

The summer also brought a new area to use for programming: our revamped "Christian Fellowship Park." Work was completed when rubber mulch was laid under the swing set by Jamie Wilson and his group from Sand Fork Baptist Church (Little Kanawha). Our kids even shed some tears when the group left because they enjoyed them so much. Working with them during Vacation Bible school and playing games when they weren't working was just phenomenal. They worked on land-scaping the playground and organized and cleaned areas all over the center for us. What a blessing! Thank you to Frank Miller and Parchment Valley Conference Center who provided the mulch.

Our new shelter allowed us to hold a Bible study with the kids and serve snacks. The new "whirl" and fence around the revamped basketball court kept the park busy all summer. Scriptures were hung on the fence to inspire the kids daily and the neighborhood has been excited and taking care of the park since our party, which had over 200 in attendance. Funding was provided by the Christian Fellowship Foundation, who is greatly appreciated by many.

We closed out the summer with a day of praise and a performance from the Adoration Dance Team from Shinnston First Baptist Church (Judson). The dance team also worked with our children and let them do one song with them. They were awesome and everyone was impressed!

With the new school year, we start the new phase of the Journey Project. The Social Security Administration has free computers and we are planning to get 100 of them for our program to distribute to our kids and their families, once they earn them. The majority of our children are at a disadvantage at school, beginning with 4th grade timed writing assessments, because they have no computers in their homes. Once they have attended enough of our Life Skills programs and a parent has volunteered at the center at least three times, they will be eligible to take a computer home. Next year we hope to find funding to provide portable internet access and three months of service. Our first distribution will be at our Christmas party. We welcome any gift cards to purchase gifts.

Many thanks for thinking of us in the area of school supplies. Two loads came just in time for distribution, as they do each year, from our friends at Vienna Baptist (Parkersburg) and Pine Grove Baptist (Parkersburg) Churches. The supplies come in handy all year long and the kids count on us to have what they need. So many churches have helped with our quarters' fund and so many of the children's needs. And those of you who contribute financially to us on a regular basis have made this year so much easier for us. We can't thank you enough for being partners in this ministry with us through your support and prayers!

Parchment Valley Conference Center: Reflecting on the Summer Season

THINKING MISSIONS

United in Mission



No matter how we have chosen to support missions, American Baptists have always been a missional people. While the specific ways funding has been raised to support missionaries, both at home and abroad, changes we have had at our core purpose the desire to support those who are reaching out to the world with the good news of Jesus Christ.

As the mission societies came together and helped shape the denomination, we all saw the great

value of being united in our mission efforts and fundraising. We also saw the efficiency of having a central agency for the collection, recording and distribution of mission dollars. The mission support system administered through the office of the General Secretary, ABC-USA provides each of the mission entities, individuals and churches a very cost effective way to support the many ministries of our denomination family. Without this structure, it would be far more expensive for us to get the mission dollars where God needs them.

In the past few years, we have seen a dramatic shift in the way many churches and individuals give to missions. What we have seen is a movement away from our being *united in mission* and towards a segmentation of appeals for funds. Where a decade ago, you heard a unified message from a minister of mission support, you now hear a cacophony of voices asking you for support. The result is our United Mission dollars are less than half of what they were a decade ago. This has led to the erosion of structural support and a

looming crisis if we continue on this path.

Dr. Allen Reasons, senior pastor of Fifth Avenue Baptist Church (Guyandotte) writing in support of United Missions said, "The truth of the matter is no budget can sustain long on the idea that everyone pick and choose which causes they support individually. The most fashionable causes will eventually win. Whether the budget is for a business, a church, a convention or even a family, we eventually have to pool our resources to pay the bills." I agree with Dr. Reasons when he says, "United Missions is still an effective and healthy way to support missions."

The bottom line is this: if we continue to drain resources away from the core structure that efficiently receives, records and distributes mission dollars to the mission agencies and partners, we will soon have far fewer usable dollars to do the work for which God has called us together. I fully support the idea and practice that new mission dollars are being generated as more direct appeals are made. I am also acutely aware of the tens of thousands of dollars that have been diverted from the whole for individual parts of the body. I am reminded of Paul's words to the Corinthians when he tells them, "The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though its parts are many, they form one body... If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it." (1 Corinthians 12:12, 26)

"Doing Church" in South Africa

When asked why he had missed church for several weeks in a row, the late Chadd Bain, the original founder of the Izulu Orphan Project (IOP), responded, "It is because I have been busy doing church."

That is the story of the Izulu Orphan Project, located in KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa. And that is the story of our team of 11 who traveled to South Africa for two weeks in July 2012. While we did have the chance to participate in a local Zulu church gathering of more than 500 people, our primary reason for going there was to "do church."

IOP is a strong partner of American Baptist Foreign Mission Society's missionaries, Rick and Anita Gutierrez. Several churches throughout the West Virginia Baptist Convention support the Gutierrez family financially and through prayer. They have been serving in South Africa for more than nine years, originally serving among the Indian people and now more recently, also serving among the Zulu people. The latter ministry provided us an opportunity to get involved.

Rick and Anita are medical doctors who use their medical knowledge and skills as a platform for ministry. Describing it as a "holistic approach," they focus on not only meeting the spirituals needs of the people, but also the physical, mental and emotional needs as well. To do this, they have designed a program that trains locals on how to do basic health screenings, while also equipping them to lead Bible studies. Those who graduate from their program are given the title of "Health Builders" and are then commissioned back to their villages to do screenings and to make disciples.

While all of us had the privilege of watching Rick and Anita train some of the Zulus, some even had a further privilege of actually traveling to see a few Health Builders carry out the application of the program by performing health screenings and leading Bible studies. For all of us, it was an incredible example of not just being a "hearer of the word," but also a "doer of the word." (James 1:22)

For the rest of us, we did everything from painting schools, to participating in food distributions, to acting as gophers to carry around medical supplies. A couple of individu-

als primarily spent their time with Rick designing the first prototype of a tool Rick calls "the chicken tractor." The chicken tractor is basically a chicken coop on wheels that can be moved around the garden for the chickens to fertilize the garden, and it also introduces protein (through the eggs and the meat) into the Zulu diet. Again, this is an example of their holistic approach to ministry.

We did a lot with Rick and Anita and we also did a lot with IOP. But of everything we did, the greatest thing was building relationships with the Gutierrez family, the IOP staff and the local Zulu people. Being located in South Africa, it is rare for the Gutierrez family to host visitors from North America, as it takes so long to travel there. But through our time there, it became obvious how much they care for not only the 11 of us who traveled, but also for all of the churches they have been able to visit during their trips through West Virginia. They recalled names, faces and stories, and they asked for updates on many of you. They really do value the partnership of the West Virginia Baptist churches.

Please continue praying for and supporting the ministry of Rick and Anita Gutierrez. God is at work in South Africa in incredible ways. What a blessing it is to be a part of that work through our giving, praying, going and sending.
