# A Little Child Shall Lead Them y un Niño Pequeño Los Conducirá Hispanic Ministries

In Jesus' time, religious leaders in Judaism as well as leaders in other ancient cultures considered children as a burden until they were physically strong enough to contribute to the family. Children were essentially a drain on the family resources. A child was another mouth to feed, and another "job" for the parents to have to do until the child became old enough to help out with the household chores and income. Jesus' words to the disciples were quite a surprise to them and to those within earshot. Jesus' reaction and action was

different than the norm. Instead of dismissing children as a bother or of no value, Jesus bids them come near. He does not need or want the disciples to be the "gatekeepers" of who could come to Him.

American **Baptist Foreign Mission** Society missionary, Debbie Mulneix shared stories a few years ago about some of the students at Woodstock school in India. Several were children of high ranking officials, politicians and

business/industry people in non-Christian countries. While at Woodstock, they were required to attend Christian chapel services and Bible classes and were surrounded by Christian teachers and dorm parents. They were able to hear and see the gospel everyday. This was a God-given opportunity for those in leadership at Woodstock to impact the future leadership in many countries in Asia.

Here in West Virginia, we have an opportunity to impact the world for

Christ through reaching out to immigrants in our communities. Yes, we do have a growing immigrant population! According to the last census 22,511 persons in West Virginia are immigrants. They come from Latin American, Asia, Europe, Africa and the Middle East. As Christians, we have the privilege and charge to reach out to them in Christian love and share with them the Good News of Jesus. Who knows the futuure impact?

Make an effort to invite immigrant children to your Sunday schools,

Wednesday night programs and other children's events. Many times when you share Christ with them, you are also opening a door to share with their parents as well. While some of these children may stay in the United States, others may move to their parents' country of origin. They can return knowing the Prince of Peace and the Lord of Lords, and share this life-saving message with a whole new group of people!

# Reading Books

Folks know I like to read books so the question is asked many times, "Have you read any good books lately?" or "What are some of the books the Baptist Convention staff is reading these days?" My latest reading list would include the following:

• Under The Overpass by Mike

Yankoski - A book that shares a journey of faith on the streets of America. Yankoski shares his story of living a life of faith while being homeless. Yankoski will be a keynote speaker at our Annual Meeting in October at New Baptist Church (Guyandotte), Hungtington.

• <u>Almost Christian</u> by Kendra Creasy Dean - A book based on the national study of youth and religion and what the faith of our teenagers is revealing about the American church.

• <u>Radical</u> by David Platt - The author explores the concept of taking up your cross daily for the sake of the gospel. He asks some tough questions such as: Would you abandon everything for the gospel? What is Jesus worth to you? If all the church stuff and building comforts were taken away, would the gospel be enough to cause people to worship?

These are hard questions for a culture that says most of us are believers, yet we don't act as if we even know the Lord. And the gap between what we say we believe and how we act seems to grow larger. Institutional trust just keeps going away. At an all time low is trust in government, education and religious organizations, including the church. What can we do?

First, to build trust in the church, we must let people know where we stand, use simple language and show we genuinely care for them. We must be real and genuine, not letting pride get in the way of doing the right thing. Practice accountability, keep commitments, deliver results and extend trust to others. And when they ask you why you act in this matter, *tell them about Jesus!* 

Second, keep reading the greatest book of all - the **Bible!** There are many good books about the church, religion, faith, God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. But only one - the Bible - is life changing and renewing. It is one thing to know about Jesus; it is another issue to know Jesus!



Ministry Team greatly appreciates the support of ABHMS," said Ray. "Thank you for your prayers, encouragement and financial gifts. The generous funding you have provided not only allows us to do the physical tasks of disaster relief ministry, but also to minister to the spiritual needs of so many who are broken and

lost. We look forward to an active and productive partnership with ABHMS during the project and future missions with our men's ministry, being the hands and feet of Christ, as we have been called to be."

The multi-week project, to begin on June 18, 2012, will build new capacity for ministry on the Hopi Reservation. Volunteers are needed for jobs that include the following: electrical work, ventilation repair, drain system installation and wheelchair ramp completion, all at Sunlight Mission Church, Second Mesa, Arizona; water tank removal and placement of holding tank and filtration system in the pump house; window replacement, septic system repair and building construction at the community center; floor and septic system repair at the parsonage; razing of shed; and maintenance at Hopi Mission School.

# Bivocational Pastors' Event to be Held April 21, 2012

Approximately 70 percent of West Virginia Baptist Convention churches are pastored by people who make most of their living from a source other than the church. Called "tent-makers" by some in reference to the Apostle Paul's trade, these are bivocational ministers.

The West Virginia Baptist Convention will conduct a special event for bivocational pastors at Parchment Valley Conference Center on Saturday, April 21, 2012. Rev. Dennis Bickers, Southeast Area Resource Minister, American Baptist Churches of Indiana and Kentucky will be leading the event.

Rev. Bickers, author of three books on the subject of bivocational and small church ministry, is National Project Director of BivoNet, a ministry of American Baptist Churches-USA. In addition, he is a member of the advisory board for the Bivocational Ministry Center at Campbellsville University. Perhaps most importantly, however, he is a veteran bivocational pastor having spent more than 20 years serving in bivocational pastorates.

According to some statistics, 80 percent of churches in North America are plateaued or declining, and most of those could be described as maintenance-minded. Rev. Bickers will be leading us in a presentation titled, "Transforming the Church from Maintenance-Minded to Missional." He will help us to understand the differences in missional and maintenance-minded churches and how to move the church to a missional mindset.

The cost of the conference, including lunch and one of Rev. Bickers' books, is \$15. Registration for the conference will begin at 9:00 a.m. and the meeting will conclude at 3:00 p.m. We hope to see you there.

Thank you so much for helping get our year off to a great start. We have been so blessed with all the donations of things we have needed as well as financial contributions. It is wonderful to have many friends of the Weirton Christian Center throughout the state. Our enrollment continues to grow, and with the weather being so mild, we are able to use the yard and the playground for additional space.

We are looking forward to renovating the park the city has leased to us. In the fall, the American Baptist Men at Page Baptist Church (Fayette) have offered to help with the basketball court. The Christian Fellowship Foundation has granted us funding to provide for new additions to the playground, including upgrades to the basketball court, where we are hoping to develop a summer street league, and even a shelter for summer programming. We welcome any groups who would like to come and help us complete the work that needs done. We will need help with the landscaping, equipment installation, cementing the benches and garbage cans, lighting and more. We will have the opportunity to post scripture signs to witness to the neighborhood and plan to have a block party celebration when it is complete. There is so much need for the Lord in our neighborhood. A family of five will lose their home of 15 years this month, and yet another family of five is without transportation as of this month. Our utility assistance requests number at least five per week, and sometimes many more. Some of the children in our neighborhood suffer all forms of abuse, some do not have food in their homes, their water is being turned off, they don't have warm clothes and some have parents who are either in jail, or are going to be. Our downtown area is the base of most of Weirton's drug busts. People need the Lord. And although we provide as much as we can to the children, we need to also reach the parents. So, we have started a Ladies' Bible Study, "Cup of Life" on the second Friday of each month after realizing the weekly plan we tried wasn't working. We have had no consistency with any parental programs we attempt. Please pray for our ministry to the children, and now to the mothers who so desperately need the hope and guidance only the Lord can give. One mother said she is coming because of the constant urging of her four children to go "to church." The Good News is our children really are influencing their parents to follow God's plan. We truly appreciate your generosity and the power you provide to us by being faithful financial and prayer partners with us in our mission.

# Change You Can Count On

You are likely familiar with the old jokes that ask, "How many ..... does it take to change a light bulb?" The punch line when the word Baptist is inserted is: "Change? What do you mean change? My grandpa put that bulb in and if it worked for him, it is good enough for us!" The joke is thought to be funny because supposedly, it is difficult to get Baptists to change. And as in most humor, there is at least some element of truth.

I agree the message of the gospel does not, nor will it ever change. While the message will never change, we must always be adapting our methods in light of culture and opportunity. While Paul's sermon on Mars Hill did not produce the results he desired, it is an excellent demonstration of how to meet people where they are to invite them to join you on the Christian journey.

Pastor Mark Stump, of Gassaway Baptist Church (Elk Valley) shared at the officers' training event in February 2012 three reasons why people change:

1. People change when they *HURT* enough that they *HAVE* to.

2. People change when they LEARN enough they WANT to.

3. People change when they *LOVE JESUS* enough they *TRY* to *PLEASE HIM*.

If we are truly going to help change people for the kingdom of God, we must first be changed people. It is our human nature to try to hold onto the familiar and comfortable. Our first response to a proposed change is usually to defend the way things are and resist the change. Our second response is usually to form a committee to study the change so we can delay, defer and deny the change.

God has called the church to be agents of change. How can we be agents of change when we, ourselves, refuse to be changed? We cannot change the world if we refuse to engage the world. We cannot see growth in our churches or in the lives of our members if we do not embrace the changes Jesus would have us make.

If you are looking for a change you can count on, I recommend you allow Jesus to work in your life and make you a new creation. Let the old go to live and serve in the newness of Christ.

# Baptist Campus Ministries: His Breath, Breathed Out on Us


All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work.

And at 7:00 a.m. on Tuesdays, the ladies meet to study what God has to say about being a godly woman. The response has been overwhelming. Each week, over 70 students have been coming out at 7:00 a.m. to study the word of God because they realize it is indeed His breath, breathed out on us. God continues to blow us away with His grace and mercy as we serve a college generation that is eager for His presence in their lives. May we hunger for God's word like the students we serve.




