In Puerto Rico, Christmas dinner calls for pork! During the latest meeting of *Project Hope*, the West Virginians learned an important Puerto Rican phrase, "Every pig has its Christmas dinner." In other words, the time will come for every pig to give it's all (except the squeal). It is inevitable.

Jesus calls us to give our all too. We are to be willing to give heart, soul, mind and strength in service to Him. This

often may lead us to get out of our comfort zone and begin something new and different, relying on God to lead the way.

Project Hope is a year-long project involving young adults from Puerto Rico and West Virginia in a period of leader development and thinking in new ways. It is a project that deliberately puts young adults into cross-cultural relationships to work together in growing spiritually and in learning how to work for God's kingdom in unity. Those members of the team have

been using online conferencing and will have a total of three face-to-face meetings.

Meeting number two recently occurred at Parchment Valley Conference Center in Ripley. The Puerto Rican side of the team arrived to cold weather and snow. Their prayers were answered! Between meetings, the West Virginians enjoyed showing their Puerto Rican brothers and sisters the fine art of

The weekend was spent learning, sharing, praying and developing a final project which would be useful to young adults in learning about Jesus' call to be "missionaries" wherever they find themselves. The program will be a modular, web-based program that can be done in small groups in homes, at churches or maybe even at the local Panera

Our culture seems to be filled with contradictions. At many levels we are a spiritual people, open to Jesus, but not to the church. We are wired for relationships, but we have difficulty always understanding them. It seems for some of us we must make sense out of our interaction with others before we can enjoy them. As children of God, we need a practical, scriptural approach to all our relationships. Sometimes the how becomes more important than the why - we need both or we do activities in life without understanding their purpose. Any action without a purpose has little value.

God is a *giver* which is as much a part of His nature as a *sender*. He is not a getter. We are made in God's image so we need to reflect His nature as a giver and a sender. Many of the folks around the church are givers, sharing their time, talents and treasure with those who need it. One of the ways Christians are known is by the way they give back to society, and believers give in all kinds of ways. In recent days, folks have shoveled walks, provided rides to those wanting to get to church or given someone a phone call to see how they are. Unbelievers do these things as well, but the difference is we, as Christians, know 'why' we do these things. God is a giver, but we live in a world of folks looking for something for themselves. One thing that should never be heard in a church business meeting is, "What are we doing for ourselves?" God is a *sender* and a giver. Why then should we be

Living Water



It started simply enough. On the morning of January 9, 2014, Freedom Industries reported that it had a hole in one of its storage tanks. They also reported that their containment systems had failed

allowing crude MCHM (4-methylcyclohexanemethanol) to flow into the Elk River. West Virginia American Water, believing its filtration systems could handle the invasion of MCHM into the water, decided to leave the intakes open. However, it was soon discovered that MCHM had gotten through the system and into the finished water. Thus the entire system was tainted and the water declared unusable. The full economic and health impacts of the spill and subsequent pollution of the water supply will take years to determine.

The water crisis made all of us aware of how dependent we are on potable water. It also reminded us of how difficult life can be when that clean, usable water is not easily available. Weeks after the spill, water is still being trucked in. There are daily reports of contamination. It seems like the lingering effects of this breach of trust will be around forever.

It started simply enough. A woman went to gather water in the middle of the day. She walked alone as no respectable person would be seen with her. She had, through her lifestyle, destroyed her standing and status in society. When she got to the well, Jesus was there. He asked her for a drink. In the exchange that followed (John 5), Jesus told her she should be asking Him for a drink instead of Him asking her.

Jesus offered the woman living water! Water welling up to eternal life! Water that would satisfy the thirst in her soul. Water that would wash away all of the sin and guilt - all of the pollutions of life so she could be, once and for all, satisfied.

It starts simply enough: a decision not to close an intake, a decision to experiment with drugs, to ignore the warnings and think one can handle it. Then, like the water system, one is overwhelmed with the sin and the stains it leaves. Thank God Jesus is the living water that offered His life to cleanse us of all unrighteousness.

Let us share the living water with those who are dying of thirst.

Committed to Missions

Hispanic Ministries: Samaritans in Our Midst -Samaritanos en Medio de Nosotros

"A movement toward God necessarily moves us closer to other people." Roberta C. Bondi

The gospels include stories of Jesus sharing the good news of God's kingdom with people from other cultures. In John 4, we read the well-known encounter and life-changing conversation between Jesus and the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well. This is a beautiful story that allows us to catch a glimpse of God's heart. Samaritans were culturally different from the Jews; they were rejected and unwelcomed. But Jesus breaks through cross-cultural barriers to reveal Himself. Jesus crossed boundaries that keep people apart to form a relationship, to bring hope and salvation. Through His actions, Jesus teaches us the power of the gospel removes barriers - ethnic, gender and religious - that prevent this woman from getting the living water she needs.

Jesus avoids going through the preferred and comfortable road from Judea to Galilee. He risks going through Samaritan territory where people will know He is not from the area. Not being from the area and having a different accent may mean one gets a skin or accent tax or no attention at all at a local family restaurant! But Jesus knows the reward far exceeds the risks. When He meets the woman He asks for a drink of water, but receives an antagonistic response. "How is it that you, being a Jew, ask a drink from me, a Samaritan woman?" (John 4:9) The woman knows Jesus is not supposed to be talking to her. He is a Jew. Jews look at Samaritans as religiously and ethnically inferior. She is both a Samaritan and a woman, and by way of His contact with her He will be contaminated.

Throughout her conversation with Jesus, the Samaritan raised several objections (social, cultural and religious), but Jesus breaks through each of them and becomes an agent of God's love. He wants this woman to know the "gift of God" and drink of His "living water." (John 4:10) She has been discriminated against and regarded as of lesser worth in a society that pushes some people down and lifts others up based on manmade barriers. He wants to restore and give her hope. He wants to satisfy her deepest thirst with "a fountain of water springing up into everlasting life." (John 4:14) The woman's eyes slowly opened and Jesus perceives the time to reveal Himself as the Messiah. (John 4:25-26) At this point, the disciples arrived and got agitated because Jesus was talking to a Samaritan woman (John 4:27) failing to understand what had just happened. After meeting Jesus, she becomes an evangelist to those in her town. She goes back and tells them of this God who loves everyone and crosses cultural, social and religious barriers to demonstrate His grace.

Where is Samaria today? Who are the Samaritans in our midst who need to hear about this God who restores and gives hope? Samaria today may be just a house down the road or a few miles away from your neighborhood. The 52 plus million Hispanics living in the United States are surely part of the Samaritans living among us. They work in the restaurants you dine at; they work in farms and pick the fruit and vegetables you eat; they build your houses; they clean your office buildings; they attend school with your children; and so much more. Jesus invites us to follow His example to go into forbidden territory to be in relationship with racially rejected and unwelcomed people so we can share the hope we have found in Him!

It came to our attention in 2011 there is an underlying problem in our communities. We have many students who fall under the poverty levels set forth by the federal guidelines and they have little or nothing to eat over the weekend. We find this appalling! During the 2012-2013 school year, we at Agape Cloak gave out over 10,000 *love bags*.

We are made up of area community churches (Baptist, Methodist and Independent) and private individuals, and serve the students of the Big Coal River area through three different programs. All six schools on Big Coal River are provided for, covering an area of 40 miles.

These children are served through a snack program we call "Love

Bags." These *love bags* are delivered to the schools every Friday to be given to those students the schools have deemed eligible.

After starting this program, we started receiving requests for other assistance. We have two other programs in place: "Travel Bags," a hygiene bag and a "Smile" clothing program. The school contacts us with what is needed and we try to provide accordingly.

In 2011, we started out with our faith and \$600 in the bank. Our budget for this past school year for the *love bags* was \$20,000. Adult Discipleship: A Slow Fade

I certainly get lots of messages when listening and observing children's story

sermons in local churches. Sometimes the brief message for the children touches me deeper than the adult sermon! While in a local church, I observed a young boy hesitantly coming forward to sit in the choir loft with the other children for the children's story sermon. He was not too enthused about leaving his seat and facing an audience of grown ups.

While the leader of the story shared with the children the young guy VERY slowly rose from his seat and tried to walk away. The leader, seeing him, gently tried to encourage him to stay, but could not give much attention to him as she was leading. The youngster stood by the teacher as she continued on with the lesson. However very, very slowly he began to back up. He quietly and in perfect slow motion moved away from the teacher and step by quiet step backed his way to the side of the stage area, down the steps and back to his seat in the audience. The teacher never noticed as she continued her lesson. While those of us watching found the situation comical, the teacher was surprised when she noticed he was gone. He had slowly faded away!

leship: ade The incident reminded me of how we in the local church experience and allow the slow fade of adults from our community of faith. For various reasons, many people slowly fade from our groups, Sunday School classes and activities. At first we notice and try to encourage them to keep involved and

fade from our groups, Sunday School classes and activities. At first we notice and try to encourage them to keep involved and be present. However, as we are busy with this and that, sometimes we don't notice them again or don't follow up on them. They slowly step by quiet step fade away.

So what can we do to remedy this situation? Here are some ideas:

• Intentionally make note each week of who is missing from activities of your church, small group, Sunday School class or worship opportunities.

- Check to see if it is because of illness, weather, trips etc. Perhaps others know the reason.
- Make a call. People respond more to voices of encouragement and invitation than a card.
- *Make it simple. Let the person know they were*
- missed. Be genuine. Offer help when appropriate.
- Be ready to contact them again if needed.

Don't be known for the "slow fade" in your church.
