"We are planning a multicultural revival at the federal prison in Beckley. We want Anglos, African-Americans and Hispanics to come together for four days of inspiration, encouragement and preaching. We want you to be part of it as a representative for the Hispanics in this institution." This was the vision a committed Christian, whom God has placed at a strategic position within this detention facility, shared with me. Indeed a bold and captivating vision as discord due to gangs, ethnic and racial divides are frequent in such centers.

God's vision is to redeem the world, people from every race, tongue and nation. He invites us to join Him in His ongoing mission work in the entire world, which means every place is a mission field. Correctional facilities are a different kind of mission field. A mission field, nonetheless, in need of the transforming power of the gospel and ready to be harvested. Statistics by the Federal Bureau of Prisons indicate there are 217.363 inmates secluded in Federal prisons across America; 74,572 or 34.3% of them are Hispanics1. Hundreds of them are in the prisons of West Virginia, I believe, for a God-given purpose and opportunity. In fact, numerous Hispanics have confessed Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and some of them are deported to their countries of origin carrying something much more valuable than the economic improvement they initially sought.

Conversions, baptisms and 24-hour prayer vigils are some of the excit-

ing things happening at Federal Corrections Institution (FCI) Beckley. September 26 was our night for the multicultural revival and more than 200 inmates - Hispanics, Anglos and African-Americans - gathered as one people at the prison's chapel. We started with a vibrant and inspirational time of praise and worship led by Samantha Walker of **South Parkersburg Baptist Church** (Parkersburg) and two of her friends. Their willingness to step out of their comfort zone, their voices, a guitar and a djembe were the tools God used as these young people led the inmates in a passionate time of worship. Then, Mike Sisson of Crab Orchard Baptist **Church** (Greenbrier-Raleigh) inspired the inmates with the gospel story in John 5:1-9. Shouts of amen and hallelujahs, claps, and jumps abounded as they heard Jesus Christ is a personal God, as they were challenged to quit making up excuses, and stand up and live for God's glory! Thirty-one people had confessed Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior in three days, including six who did it that night. Many more came forward for prayer, and as if we were celebrities, they asked us to sign their Bibles! It was a humbling experience to be part of what God is doing in the lives of those He loves.

All believers are called to play a role in mission; the Holy Spirit has gifted you and empowered you to do it! Where is God inviting you to join Him in mission and share the love you found in Jesus?

### Keep the Bells Ringing

The holiday season brings to mind many images: decorated trees, special church programs, candles, great food, chorales and family gatherings. Bells are something else that come to mind: church bells, handbells, Salvation Army kettle bells and sleigh bells. Bells seem so special and are delightful to hear ringing. The Bible does not talk a great deal about bells, but they are a very cultural

part of the holiday season. During our history, church bells have called the faithful to worship, celebrated a wedding or remembered a believer's passing. Church bells became a part of the fabric of our towns and cities before the Revolution. Many of our churches have handbell choirs, and while they are delightful to experience, it takes commitment on the part of the ringers for rehearsals and concerts. And it takes commitment to ring the bells for those red kettles as well.

In a day and age where commitment to anything is lacking, who will keep all the bells ringing? Who will keep our traditions alive? Please keep in mind traditions are not just mindless acts. They have reason, a corporate history. Traditions are kept to point to something greater than themselves and while traditions are good, traditionalism can be not so good. Traditionalism says "We have always done it that way," but we aren't sure why. Traditionalism may not be biblically sound, but rather built upon matters of taste or rules that bind the gospel.

So, to keep the bells ringing we need to know what we are doing for the kingdom and why we are doing it. Jesus observed Jewish traditions and He understood and taught their

purpose as He was about His Father's business of changing people for the kingdom. We must focus our energy on change: changing people for the kingdom. As we move through missions, evangelism, leadership, stewardship development and discipleship resourcing, we will lift up the call to the work of the kingdom for us all. Our Baptist family had a wonderful prayer experience during 2011 and we now will move toward the call of our Lord upon us to begin *Changing People for the Kingdom* in 2012.

As many of our churches report no new members in their annual reports, our new year will be a season of evangelism and revival. Tools for evangelism and revival have been developed and are available through our state office and state staff. One of those tools will be a one-day seminar at Parchment Valley Conference Center for our bivocational pastors on Saturday April 21, 2012, with Rev. Dennis Bickers from the Indiana and Kentucky region leading this event. Future programming will include the introduction of the tools and tactics of adaptive leadership, and a tool to find answers when there seem to be no answers. Adaptive leadership reminds us to be connected to our purpose and new possibilities for the future of our churches. We face many challenges and opportunities in the future.

During this holiday season, celebrate the birth of our Lord and be committed to keep the bell ringing!

### Weirton Christian Center's School Year is Now Underway

The Weirton Christian Center's school year is underway. After closing for the month of August, it was great to see the kids come back with books and homework and all the excitement that comes with new teachers and new classes. Thanks go to all those who provided us with school supplies. We received a large shipment from Pine Grove Baptist Church (Parkersburg), as usual, and Vienna Baptist Church (Parkersburg) filled our small van with their Vacation Bible School collection. Although we were part of a huge back to school bash on August 6th, 2011,

there were many things the kids needed outside of what they received. They know they can count on us year round for supplies, homework help, tutoring, computer access and caring about what happens in their day.

The preschool has the largest enrollment we have had in years with 26 four-year-olds and 17 three-year-olds. We are blessed to have several interns and volunteers to help Ms. Pam and Mrs. Dulaney. Although the grade schools are now offering preschool, we still seem to be the Christian choice. Weirton Transit is once again providing us with transportation for \$1 a day. We have received eight requests for transportation scholarships and currently only have three that are covered. For \$20 per month, we can provide transportation for a student. Anyone interested in sponsoring a scholarship can call the Weirton Christian Center.

Our fall program kicked off with visits from local police and fire departments and an EMT Squad. The children made thank-you cards and were told about what duties were involved in each area and why these civil servants chose the job they did. With National Service Day, we felt we should honor the 129 local people who take care of our city every day. New programs this fall included an eight-week manners' program that taught respect and table manners for all ages. At the end of the program, they were all invited to a Thanksgiving dinner at the local All Saints Greek Church, so they could practice their skills.

Also, we are bringing *The Silver Ring Thing* to Weirton, with the sponsorship of Christian Fellowship Foundation. This free event will encourage our young people to remain abstinent until marriage and commit their lives to the Lord. For four weeks prior and four weeks after, we will have a Bible study that ties in with the program, one for girls and one for boys. Please keep this in your prayers.

Our two AmeriCorps\*VISTA volunteers are working in the areas of literacy and health and fitness. They will be developing programs and each will be writing a grant to fund the programs they develop for our children. The book club for 7-12

grade girls started this summer was the first developed by a Vista and was continued in the fall program.

As we struggle with funding, we are looking for ways to cut costs in programming. Our biggest expense is staffing; however, people are the mentors that make the difference in the lives of these at risk children during the most important time of the day. Many would have no supervision or food after school if we did not provide it free of charge. Taking all expenses of the ministry into consideration, the average cost is \$500 per child each year for 1,800 hours of care (.28 per hour). We really don't want to limit the number of children because there is so much inconsistency in their attendance. We could not do what we do without the support of West Virginia Baptists. And we cannot thank you enough for all you are doing in the way of funding and donations to our programs. The quarters for grades' fund is already building back up after being depleted at the end of the school year. What a blessing to be a part of the Baptist Family.



Valley) in 1968.





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

Parchment Valley was born out of a vision to have a year-round conference center that provided space and programming for the churches of the West Virginia Baptist Convention. In October of 1965, the Convention voted at its annual meeting to purchase the Hyres farm after an extensive review of the property and consideration of other locations. Once purchased, the development began. The milking barn was converted into a place for meetings. In the early years, guests would also sleep in the meeting rooms. Programming began in 1974.

If you study the history of Parchment Valley, you will find it is what it is today because thousands of people shared the vision for what it could be. As you walk the grounds, you will see many of the early visionaries honored with their names on various places around the grounds.

In 2011, the Parchment Valley Board of Directors voted to initiate the Don Loudermilk Society as a way to honor Don's great contributions to the ministry at Parchment Valley and as a way to provide consistent funding for the ongoing ministry of the center. Don loved Parchment Valley and dedicated much of his life developing the grounds and programming for the center. His love for Parchment Valley also led him to write its history.
