# A Ministry of Presence

Have you ever thought of worship attendance as a ministry? Most of us can understand worship as a witness, and so it is. Folks see believers going to church, and in most small communities people are aware of who does what. One of our Baptist saints stated the situation in an interesting way... "Most people in our town know what church we are staying away from." For Christians, worship is not an option, but rather a priority,

and attendance in worship becomes a benchmark for growing churches.

Last year, the West Virginia Baptist Convention was handed a challenge of increasing the number of baptisms, and you did it! With your commitment to that goal, you stopped the sliding number of baptisms and increased those following the Lord through those wonderful waters. The Holy Spirit is still moving among us. Reports of continuing growth in baptisms keep coming to our attention. Now we need to come into a partnership with the Spirit to grow our ministry of presence for all the world to see.

There are times when we cannot be in worship during the usual scheduled services. But, in most communities there are multiple worship opportunities at different hours on different days. Believers need to be in worship to keep their relationship with the Lord fresh and their faith strong.

During the month of December, our nation was deeply wounded with the events in Newtown, Connecticut. Where was God during this massacre of innocence? He was where He always is - working out His ultimate purpose, even if we don't understand what that is. The same cries were lifted up when Jesus was born and Herod had all the male babies in Bethlehem slain (Matthew 2:16-18). When the world needs answers, our ministry of presence can be a light in the darkness. Our society values children, yet on many Sundays church classrooms are empty. It is our responsibility to keep them healthy, safe and teach them the ways of God.

There will be other bleak December days. There are many excuses why we do not practice our ministry of presence as the people of God. They will not hold up under the scrutiny of a doubting society. It is the hope that these words might light a holy fire under some who have grown cold to the church and colder to God. You may need to be the match!

As we approach the Lenten-Easter season, it is a grand time to examine our faith in the realty of Christ's death and resurrection. Our ministry of presence may count in all of eternity in ways we may never understand. Meet the Lord in worship this week and every week. Get to know Him a little better and love Him a little deeper. Practice and teach a ministry of presence. And remember this: Jesus loves you!

# Hispanic Ministries: Embracing a God-given Opportunity - Abrazando Una Oportunidad Divina

For everything there is a season... a time to plant and a time to harvest.... Ecclesiastes 3:1-2 (NLT)

The mission of God's people is to proclaim the gospel. C.J.H Wright

Kairos is a special time of crisis or particular opportunity; perhaps this is the word that best describes this time in the history of the church in the United States. The presence and migration of millions of Hispanics into the United States comes with numerous challenges, but it also furnishes unusual and remarkable opportunities to announce and demonstrate the gospel among migrants. Throughout the Bible, God mandates His people to welcome, care for and speak up for the sojourner, poor and powerless. (See, for instance: Matthew 25:35, Proverbs 31:8-9, Zacharias 7:9-10.)

As West Virginia Baptists, we have heard God's call to embrace this kairos and we are sharing the good news of Jesus Christ with Hispanic immigrants. We are doing cross-cultural missions in our own backyard; however, there is much more to do and you can join us in this exciting mission. So, how can you make an eternal difference in the lives of Hispanics who live in the Mountain State?

First, on your knees ask the Lord of the harvest to send hands for the harvest (Luke 10:2). Hispanics are very religious people and their newness in this country and the lack of friendships makes them open to hear the message of the gospel, but we need people willing to share it.

Second, when presented with the opportunity, befriend an Hispanic (maybe a server at your favorite Mexican restaurant). Ask God for the boldness to do it. Start a conversation by asking for his or her name. He/she will be happy to tell you and, more than likely, you will end up knowing about his/her family, children, country of origin and so on. Look at this as a God-given opportunity to share

the love of Jesus Christ. You are building a relationship and this is the "bridge" God will use to touch with His love, through you, the life of that person.

Third, as you build a relationship, try using the little Spanish you know to connect to them, dare to learn some Spanish words and practice them, even if you mess up it will bring some laughing, and there is no better way to connect to others than through laughter. If you already know some Spanish, you have a blessing. God has already gifted you and you have the opportunity to share God's love with that person. Consider also learning about the specific country and culture of your new friend. Hispanics have different cultural backgrounds depending on their country of origin.

In the winter issue of *Uncover Magazine*, David Kinnaman from the Barna Group observes that "It's very important for [Christians]... to learn more about Hispanic brothers and sisters. Whatever we may perceive about this audience, their collective impact on Christianity in this country, and indeed the world, is going to be substantial in the next several decades...."

The church must be moved for what moves God's heart. Hispanic immigrants are in need of hope and compassion; the church has been sent to announce and demonstrate good news of love. Let's embrace this kairos, let's transform lives with the power of the gospel (Romans 1:16).

that focus outside—rather than inside—their sanctuary walls. The resulting outreach profoundly touched communities through dozens of programs, such as "Feed My Sheep" soup kitchen; "Springification" yard clean-up for older citizens; "F.E.A.S.T. (Family Educational Action Support Team)" for children of incarcerated parents; and "Building Bridges," a women's shelter partnership that provides moving services, family Christmas baskets and community education about domestic violence issues.

- American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) welcomed 12 new chaplains and pastoral counselors endorsed to share the life-changing news of the Gospel with men and women in prisons, hospitals, counseling centers, chapels and churches throughout the United States and on foreign shores. More than 600 active chaplains and pastoral counselors ministered throughout the year, along with active and retired chaplains and pastoral counselors who served in more than 115 local churches throughout the United States.
- More than 75 churches in more than seven regions and four academic settings participated in ABHMS presentations about the "Got Style?" strategy for congregational transformation, evangelism and holistic discipleship.



# **Building Community**

- ABHMS facilitated the placement of 732 volunteers across the United States and Puerto Rico.
- Domestic development grants distributed by ABHMS totaled \$150,000. In seven states—from Massachusetts to Wisconsin—these grants supported a youth summer jobs program; the expansion of an outreach program to teens, sen-

ior adults and the unemployed; training for 500 justice ministry workers in prisoner reentry projects; and scholarships to a children's bereavement camp.

- Twenty-four Neighborhood Action Program Christian centers staff and board members gathered in Caguas, Puerto Rico, at an annual conference sponsored by ABHMS to share inspiration as well as practical insight about the community ministries they lead.
- A Latino pastor and lay leader training project—"Centro de capacitación para líderes del siglo XXI (CECALI XXI)", or "Capacity Center for Leaders of the 21st Century"—was implemented in Florida and Connecticut. Approximately 50 pastors, 280 lay leaders and four seminarians were equipped with practical tools for effective and transformative ministry in their churches and communities. Topics included administration, Baptist identity, conflict resolution, evangelism, stewardship and strategic planning. The project's ultimate goal is to train 220 Latino pastors and many lay leaders from across the United States by 2020.

We will also have a different group of children visiting our local geriatric center every Monday, spreading cheer to all the residents. After our Christmas caroling visit, many of the children want to go back. For Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, we have invited all the public service personnel to a "thankyou for serving" dinner. We received a matching grant from Volunteer West Virginia and will partner with two local businesses, the Serbian American Cultural Center and Lauttamus Communications. They will help our children be able to serve dinner to our local police, firemen, emergency medical technician (EMT) squads and city council. Our children have received food handlers cards and will be trained by professional

We have not had an area at the center large enough to hold this group, so this class has been on hold for the past few months. We are thankful for our partners who not only share space with us, but also

AmeriCorps members and volunteers.

Our Christmas participation was fantastic. Churches, American Baptist Women's Ministries' groups, organizations and individuals were so generous throughout the holiday season. Thanks to all of you who helped in so many ways. Vienna Baptist Church (Parkersburg) sent 120 shoeboxes for our children - and most of the kids open that first! They love them. From a friend in Baltimore, Maryland, we received 120 blessing bags - one for each child, containing seven meals for the long holiday. So many sent gift cards, which helped us purchase the gifts and Wellsburg First Baptist Church (Panhandle) provided our dinner for the party. We are so thankful for the wonderful Baptist family we are a part of. Truly you are all partners in this ministry. As prayer partners, we would like

you to lift up our children. These children are being abused; relocated; caught in custody battles; have no water, heat or food; have parents incarcerated or in rehab; and more. Please continue to pray for our future growth and expansion. As the economy in our area gets worse, we need to be shining bigger and brighter than ever for the Lord!

# Looking Through the Eves of Jesus

When I was living in Chiang Mai, Thailand, there was an event reported on the international news from the city. Many people had gathered at a government building to protest something. When the news report came out, they showed video of the event that included lots of people screaming, throwing objects and rioting in the streets. When I asked a missionary friend of mine who was at the event if he had been afraid, he replied, "of what?" He was at the event and while there were a large number of people, the protest had been very "Thai," polite. There had been no rioting or violence. We later learned the news report had used file footage from another part of the world as a part of their report.

It is not a secret our news reports are biased. The reports tend to shape the news to support those biases. People tend to migrate towards the news outlets that support their world view - the ones that shape the news the way they want to hear it. You can watch the different news outlets: FOX, CNN, CNBC, BBC, CBS, etc... report on a story and sometimes wonder if they are even looking at the same set of facts.

The same might be said of us as we look at the world around us. Some may see the homeless man on the street as a dirty drunk. Others may see him and wonder how his life could get so messed up. Still others may see him and be moved with

compassion and offer assistance.


Jesus was walking along the road with a great crowd. As he entered Jericho he found Zacchaeus the tax collector sitting in a tree along the road, for Zacchaeus wanted to see Jesus. Many in the crowd saw Zacchaeus as the enemy. Others saw him as a crook - a thief. But in the eyes of Jesus, Zacchaeus was a man in need of salvation. He was a man that could be redeemed.

There are many other stories to teach us that Jesus looked at people differently. He was often moved with compassion when he saw the plight of those around him. He saw the potential good in the people and called many to follow him who would not have been the obvious choices.

When they returned home, the consensus was they wanted this to be the first of many missional responses to the needs faced by their communities. So, in December 2012, a retired pastor from Mason informed Craig Coster, Southwest area minister, West Virginia Baptist Convention, of a housing need within their community. Following a visit to the home, Coster called the pastors of Main Street Baptist Church, Harmony Baptist Church, Concord Baptist Church and Zion Baptist Church, all of the Teays Valley Association, to enlist combined help of the churches.

In December, men from Main Street Baptist Church secured a tarp over the roof to reduce the possibility of roof leaks this winter. Next spring, these men will work with volunteers from other churches to replace the roof on this widow's home. The men from Harmony Baptist Church will be addressing plumbing issues in the coming weeks.

Other plans are in place to replace the siding on the back of the house next summer as well as remove and replace the front porch with an updated deck. By the time everything is completed, at least five churches will have had a hand in the necessary repairs to the home of this widow in Mason County.

Without your support through the Mountain State Mission Offering or the United Mission Offering, collaborative works such as this would be much more difficult. However, on your behalf, the area ministers of the West Virginia Baptist Convention are constantly seeking ways to empower local churches to be Christ honoring communities of faith and seeking ways to enable them to do together what they cannot do alone.
