Many of us forget who is in charge even when we mess up.

The story of the potter in Jeremiah 18 lifts up a celebration of a divine redo. The potter takes a wrecked vessel and reworks it into something new and usable. He sees beyond the now into the possibilities of the future. On many occasions we forget we see now, but God sees forever. We see the world, but God knows the universe.

Max Depree, in his book, Leadership Is An Art (New York: Doubleday, 1989) says, "The first responsibility of a leader is to define reality." That applies to church leaders as well. Our present reality must be seen in the light of a divine future

reality. That divine reality can shape the kingdom work we attempt now.

One of the stumbling blocks of our witness as the church is our integrity. We must take our commitments seriously within the walls of the church and outside of our community of faith. Every organization, even the church,

suffers when folks say they will serve and then never show up. Others sense our lack of integrity and commitment. Jesus tells us in Matthew 5:37, "*Let your yes be your yes and your no be your no.*" The good news is we can repent of our lack of integrity and be a people of the Word by keeping our word!

Discipleship can make a positive impact on our lack of integrity in the church. What a difference that would make in our witness to our communities! The good news is we can work on it until Jesus returns. The bottom line for now and always is God is in charge and He stills loves and forgives us. Psalm 103:11-12 says, "*For as high as the heavens are above the earth so great is His love for those that fear Him; as far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us.*" Thank God for His wonderful good news and the reality of His eternal redo.

The Committee also approved the contract for Rev. Dr. Michael Stephens to serve as the Interim Area Minister for

the Northeast area.

The Committee appointed a search committee that is responsible to search and recommend to the Executive Committee someone to replace the retiring Shields.

Hispanic Ministries: *Lessons for the Journey - Lecciones Para El Viaje*

Noemi was 16 years old when she left her home in Ejido Manacal in Chiapas, Mexico. She was the oldest of seven siblings and saw how her mother and father, a Pentecostal pastor, struggled to make ends meet. Manacal is a coffee-producing area, but not everyone profits from the crop. Those working on coffee plantations make \$3.00 a day or \$60.00 a month. The dire economic conditions in her village force most men, young adults and even teenagers to seek better opportunities elsewhere in Mexico or “El Norte,” as they call the United States. Unable to find a job in her community, Noemi followed the path taken by many of the young adults in her community and headed to Tapachulas, an important city in Chiapas. There she got a job at a store making \$60.00 a month.

After six months in Tapachulas, she returned home for a few weeks. With a strong sense of duty to support her family, she ventured to Mexico City, where she hoped to make more money. Working as a housemaid she made \$80.00 a month. Life in one of the world’s largest cities was not easy; she was alone and missed her family. She worked for six months and then set sail back home. However, her journey within Mexico was not over. She stayed home a few weeks and then sailed farther north. This time her port of call was Tijuana. In Tijuana, she made \$80.00 dollars a month as a housemaid. It was there she was encouraged by a friend to migrate to the United States. “Noemi, let’s go to the United States. My dad says that they make good money over there. Let’s go ...” was her friend’s enticing remark. But she hesitated because of the horror stories she had heard about those who attempted to cross the border. Her reply was, “I don’t think so. Have you not heard everything they say about what happens? Women are raped ... no, no I am not risking my life. I’d rather stay here.” She remained five months in Tijuana and then plied back home.

She stayed with her family for two months. During that time, a friend from church shared with her he was migrating to the United States. “At least 20 people from Manacal are going in this trip,” he added. Knowing so many people from her community were traveling gave her a sense of security. She would not be surrounded by strangers. She would be protected by friends. “I will think about it,” she responded. She sought counsel with her parents. “If you are thinking about leaving, you should first seek God to see if it is His will. If it is His will, doors will open,”

advised her dad. Noemi fasted and prayed for three days to seek God’s guidance. At the end of that time, she felt God confirmed she should make the journey. She was 19 years old when she left Ejido Manacal on February 14, 2004.

Her journey to the United States was priced at \$2,000 and lasted a week. Her assurance of God’s protection during the footslog through the desert is remarkable. During her first few years in the United States, she was a migrant farm worker moving across Florida, Georgia, North Carolina and Ohio. Despite not having a home, she was extremely happy and grateful for her work. All she wanted was to provide for her family. “I had a lot of willingness to work and help my father and mother,” she says. Noemi, her husband and their two children have been living in Ravenswood for eight years. She continues to be a farmworker. The weariness resulting from the agricultural work is obvious. She says, “Here one has to be working day in and day out in the same type of work, in the fields, in the tomatoes.”

Noemi and her husband consider it a blessing their children were born in the United States. “Life over there [Mexico] is very difficult,” she comments, “Thank God my children have clothes and shoes and food. What I am concerned about is they are growing and they have everything. They lack nothing and sometimes I think it is very important they see one cannot have everything all the time. There are children with deep needs in Mexico. So I wish I could take them to Mexico to see and learn what life is like in Mexico. It is not about having everything and you have to fight in life in order to have a better life.”

Noemi and her family are part of Iglesia Bautista Comunidad Nueva Esperanza in Ravenswood. She is a joyful woman with a vibrant faith and spirituality demonstrated in her passion for prayer and for sharing God’s love with others. She is currently enrolled in an online program to earn a certificate in evangelism and church transformation. Her journey of faith and hope should encourage us in our own pilgrimage to desire and commit to a deep spirituality to seek God’s guidance in major decisions, do everything out of love and always hope for a better and brighter future no matter how dim or uncertain our present circumstances might be. Her journey is a reminder we also need to tune up our perspective to see Hispanic immigrants as people who have come to bless and make the United States a better place.

Every picture in this 52-page publication featured the outcome - the harvest - the fruit one could expect if seeds were planted.

The seed companies know the hope of harvest is what sells seed. It is the hope of harvest that encourages planting. It is the hope of harvest that keeps them in business whether the harvest is a beautiful flower or edible produce.

When I see the spectacular pictures in the catalogue I tend to be inspired to place my order to get seeds or plants

started so I can duplicate the depicted harvest. I tend to lose this inspiration when the work of plowing, hoeing, fertilizing, watering, weeding, etc ... begins. I wish they would send me what was in the picture.

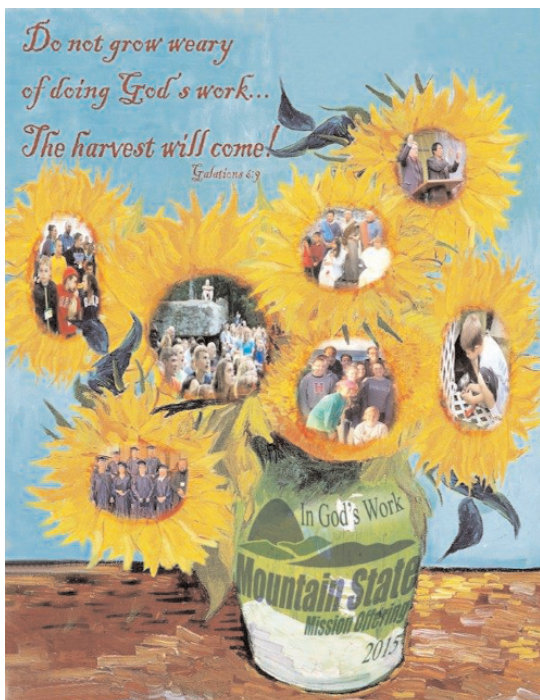
When I read the parable of the soils from Mark 4, I cannot help but believe the sower had the picture of the harvest in mind when he began to fling seeds. For the sower, it was not about the rocks; it was not about the birds; it was not about the hard work; it was not about some seed not producing - it was about the harvest.

This can be a lesson for us. When we focus on the obstacles of ministry instead of the promised outcomes we tend to hold on to what we have. And each of us should know seed cannot fulfill its purpose in the bag.

Convention and each Baptist Campus Ministries' chapter on our campuses join the 60,000 in the Georgia Dome in Atlanta on January 2-4, 2017. The speakers were challenging throughout our time, but one statement has really made me think. Tim Smith, a pastor from Jackson, Mississippi stated, "Worship begins with a 'view.' How you respond to a person depends on your view of them. What is your view of God?"

Students from everywhere in West Virginia and the world show up on a college campus with a view of God. It is our responsibility as Baptist Campus Ministries on each campus to help them understand the truth of God and Jesus Christ. The challenge arises when each student has a different background and needs a different, complex set of questions answered. That is the fun challenge of college ministry! Ministering for three months at Marshall University Baptist Campus Ministries has taught me to be on my theological toes because a day can be as simple as "How are we to be a light to this campus?" or as complicated as "I have a quick question: at the tower of Babel, what ... ?" These discussions have happened over the years on college campuses, but the truth remains: "In the beginning, God ..." and we are to "Love the Lord our God, with our heart, soul, mind and strength."

Partnerships Make All the Difference

As we move into 2016, we are off to a great start with our **BUILD-A-BUILDING PROJECT**. With the help of our West Virginia Baptist family donors, we are only \$132,146 away from our goal with the Convention! The adjacent property has been acquired and officially re-zoned for construction. We will be taking down the current building by spring and leveling the ground for new construction to begin. Once our goals are met and all 60% of the funding is raised, we can receive the matching 40% and start construction. Thank you for your consideration in supporting this valuable project for our children to have a safe place, all under one roof to come to each day.

Currently, we are working with four different agencies as we provide a small upstairs room in our house for visitation for separated families. In December 2015, we were blessed with the donation of a house on Orchard Street in Weirton, which will enable the Weirton Christian Center to develop a much needed

place for supervised visitations for families, counseling, parenting and life skills' classes and more. The generosity of Michael Psaros, the owner of the home, is making it possible for several agencies to collaborate in an effort to help rebuild families in a home setting. Evyenia's House of Hope will open in memory of Michael's grandparents, Harilaos and Evyenia Loufakis, who were immigrants from Chios, Greece; lifelong residents of Weirton; and members of the All Saints Greek Orthodox Church. We are looking for furnishings and solidifying community partnerships to help cover the cost of operations.

Partnerships are so important to our ministry. It is amazing how many people, American Baptist Women's Ministries' groups, churches and organizations come together to serve our children. The saying "it takes a village" is so true. Many thanks for the support of the past year.

Table of Hope

Investing in Future Generations at the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen

Since 1943, the *West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen* has been a camp that has grown people spiritually and born the effects of that spiritual growth in the physical development of the camp. What at first started out as a few cabins on a hillside with a dining hall, meeting hall and swimming hole in the river has since developed into 21 cabins on a hillside with bathhouses, a beautiful dining hall and administrative housing and work facilities, a newly renovated meeting hall and an indoor campfire area with an amphitheater across the road from it. If a camper from 1945 wanted to attend a camp in 2016, they would first need a tour of the camp to know where everything is. Why is this worth noting? Everything changes over time and a campground would not be an exception to that rule. The *West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen* has not grown with the purpose of simply getting bigger and better. It has grown because people who have developed their relationship with God at *Camp Cowen* have turned around to pour back into the camp so it may impact the lives of future campers. It is an appropriate question to ask “What kind of camp experience would the children at my church have if no one had poured into the camp in the past ten years alone?” The *Baptist Camp at Cowen* grows physically because it has developed campers spiritually first and, in doing so, has created a desire for the next generation to experience God in a similarly lasting fashion.

The development from a few cabins to 21 cabins came about because of the growing need to house more campers each summer. It is clear it is time for the camp to experience growing pains again. The leaders at *Camp Cowen* desire to utilize the limited time they have with their campers to the best of their abilities, sharing in spiritual growth and activities that will grow their relationships with one another as the body of Christ. *The Sunny Day Leadership and Activities Center* will be the next step in growing the camp physically so campers will have more room to grow spiritually.



Rain is a gift from God, but when it begins to pour at the time a small group leader is preparing to begin their daily lesson there is a mental shift from, “What do I want my campers to learn today?” to “What is ‘plan B’ for our meeting area and how will I inform all of my campers?” If the leader is forced to focus on the meeting area it will distract them from the purpose of small groups and Bible study that is supposed to be taking place.



The Sunny Day Leadership and Activities Center will function as a gymnasium facility as well as a learning center with a meeting room on the second floor and a classroom on the first. This new facility will provide an indoor area where camps can continue to meet and play even on stormy days at *Cowen*. Just as the *Camp at Cowen* has developed to provide room for more campers to attend in one camping season, it is now time for the camp to build on, so that regardless of weather conditions or scheduled activities, camp may continue to go on.



For this new building to stand, the leaders at *Cowen* will need support both through prayer and finances.

Ways to pray specifically:

- *Pray for discernment and wisdom in the new building plans to help the leaders as they look to see how God’s plan for this new building will function in the regular camp season.*
- *Pray for students and youth leaders who will primarily utilize this building during the regular camp season.*
- *Pray for the learning, teaching and activities that will take place in this new building.*
- *Pray for strength and safety for the construction workers at Cowen.*
- *Pray for the churches, groups and individuals who plan to support this new project financially that God would lead them in their giving.*
- *Pray about how this new building will bless Webster County and the surrounding area churches.*
