# Weirton Christian Center Celebrates 100 YEARS OF MINISTRY in 2017

The Weirton Christian Center is celebrating 100 years of

ministry this year! We have been so blessed by our West Virginia Baptist family through all these years. And, as we plan for a new building

to serve our children and families even better, you are playing a crucial role in bringing the vision to reality. Many of our churches are supporting the Build-A-Building Project financially and with your prayers. God is on the move in Weirton, West Virginia!

As of December 31, 2016, our West Virginia Baptist churches and members have given \$83,514 (includes donor bricks) of our total projected request of \$150,000. This leaves a balance of \$66,486. The American Baptist Women have reached

their goal of \$12,000 for the new preschool. Foundations and trusts total \$190,000 and the One Great Hour of Sharing will provide \$30,000 for the construction of the kitchen, plus \$20,000 for equipment and \$10,000 for feeding expenses our first year in the building. Corporate, organizations and individual donations total \$11,520. Our matching grant from the Christian Fellowship Foundation will provide \$300,000 once the rest is collected. Also being covered is LED dimmable lighting and extra insulation for better ener-

gy efficiency and our sustainability. Based on receiving the projected funds from West Virginia Baptist churches, we are only \$73,480 away from being totally funded for the \$735,000 building project ... and there are grant possibilities. Our plan is to break



ground by May 2017 so we will not have to return any of the foundation dollars due to them not being spent within the year. Once in the new building, we will be equipped to apply for 21st Century Learning funding to cover personnel and program expenses as well as feeding funds through our USDA-approved kitchen. We cannot express enough appreciation for all those who have worked so hard to come up with ways for churches, women's

groups and individuals to help support this building project.

Our CHRISTmas celebration at the center was such a blessing to be a part of. Sharing the story of Jesus coming to earth to save us with our children, knowing they understand the true meaning of the day and can share this with their families made my celebration most meaningful. There were many churches, groups and individuals that helped us provide items for Christmas: shoeboxes for each child



from Vienna Baptist Church (Parkersburg), t-shirts and ornaments from Beulah Baptist Church (Union), toys from Fairmont Baptist Temple (Fairmont), the "sock" collection from the West

Virginia Baptist Convention Children's Rally, coats from New Hope Baptist Church (Parkersburg) and hats and gloves from New Martinsville First Baptist Church (Panhandle) and the Church of the Beatitudes in Florida. Our local Boy Scouts collected pajamas and slippers, a wonderful donor supplied pillow pets and Weirton Medical Center Home Health and Accounting Departments helped make Christmas special with gifts and financial donations. The Family Christian Bookstore in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania desig-

nated the Weirton Christian Center as the recipient of their donate a Barnabas Bear to a child in need program, and we were expecting about 150 bears. But that store had the highest collection of donated bears in the nation: 360. They attribute it to the

fact many people knew of our ministry and we promised to share any extras with the two geriatric centers our children visit. We were able to distribute all but around 50 bears before Christmas. There are so many friends of the center. I thought I should share a few of the smiles we saw during our celebrations. God bless you all for your generosity, continued prayers and ongoing support.

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
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#### Post-Truth

The Oxford
Dictionary word of the year is post-truth. As if many of us were not confused enough, this concept comes into vogue. The dictionary defines post-truth as meaning that opinions, rather than being shaped by objective facts, are shaped more by personal opinions and emotions. This is



In the church, multiple sermons, conferences, seminars and Bible studies are all good. Yet, it seems some of us have sat and soaked in all this information so long we have soured because we have not acted on what we have learned. Worship has become a spectator-oriented event, having attachment without commitment. Many folks want to be included on the church roll without taking a role in the church. If we are invested in our churches, then we need to take care of our investments! We need to put into action what we have heard in worship, at conferences and in Bible studies.

A survey was conducted on church attendance with the question asked, "Why do young folks not attend worship?" Some of the responses were telling:

- Worship services are boring.
- Worship services are too predictable.
- Worship services are irrelevant.

Many times the same messages are preached, the same songs are sung and the same prayers are spoken. And

yet, there are those who find Jesus! There is no simple answer as to why many folks of all ages drop out of church. Could it be they are looking for *truth* in other places? Could it be they base their opinions of worship on emotions and personal opinion rather than objective facts (are they there to

worship God or to have a "feel-good" moment)? Has worship become a post-truth?

So how do we handle the anxiety caused by "tmi" (too much information) or post-truth? The beginning of our journey with Christ is a great place to start coping with our information anxiety. When we are saved we meet Jesus. Repentance is not just being sorry for our past, it is about change. The church is a community of believers with the purpose of transforming people into disciples of Christ, and empowering them to overcome anxiety by studying the word of God.

Christian Counseling Today (Vol. 21, No. 4) offers some concepts to get us started on overcoming the anxiety caused by the idea of post-truth.

• Reject the idea of, "I think, therefore it is." We can be sure of what happened yesterday, but we cannot be certain of what will happen tomorrow.

- Balance your decisions. Proverbs 18:2
- *Think in a positive matter.* Philippians 4:8
- Response vs. reaction. Proverbs 14:9
- Declutter your life. Proverbs 12:25

- Focus less on what and more on who. Jeremiah 29:11

As we move into the heart of a new year, may we seek to know Jesus who is *The Truth*, not the **post-truth** of our anxiety-filled society.

# Executive Committee Accepts Executive Minister Retirement Announcement

**PARKERSBURG** - The Executive Committee of the West Virginia Baptist Convention in its January 6, 2017

meeting received a letter of pending retirement from Executive Minister, Dr. David Carrico. Dr. Carrico, in his letter to the President, notified the Committee of his intention to retire on the occasion of his 70th birthday, August 17, 2017 in compliance with the bylaws of the Convention.

"My retirement comes with deep appreciation for my years of service to the good Lord and the wonderful people of the West Virginia Baptist Convention," Carrico wrote. The Executive Committee received the letter with great appreciation for the 12 years of faithful leadership Dr. Carrico has provided.

Dr. Carrico leaves a legacy of mission. Under his leadership, the Convention has seen mission involvement grow as well as support for overseas missionaries. Dr. Carrico's passion for missions is undeniable. The first Hispanic Ministries' Strategist position was created and developed under his leadership.

The Executive Committee reported to the Executive Board their receipt of the letter. It also announced the search process for a new executive minister would begin soon. Convention President, Rev. Mark Wood, will chair the search committee in consultation with Dr. C. Jeff Woods, the Associate General Secretary for Regional Ministries, ABC-USA.

# Employment Opportunity Associate Director of Camping and Youth

PARKERSBURG - The Executive Committee of the West Virginia Baptist Convention in conjunction with the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen Board is pleased to announce the creation of a new position: ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF CAMPING AND YOUTH. This will be a full-time professional staff position beginning July 1, 2017.

Minimum qualifications include a Bachelors Degree and/or a significant work history in camping ministries. Candidates must be mature Christians, a member of an American Baptist Church and hold appreciation for the unique values of the West Virginia Baptist Convention. They should demonstrate a vision driven work ethic and have skills in developing disciples of Jesus Christ.

The one hired for this position will be responsible for the daily operations at Camp Cowen; they will supervise the staff at Camp Cowen; they will manage the budgets and operations at Camp Cowen; and as the Associate Director of Youth they will coordinate state youth events and supervise the Youth Leader Core (YLC) and Youth Ministry Planning Team (YMPT). This position reports directly to the Executive Minister of the Convention with supervision from the Director of Student Ministries. Housing is provided at the camp for the associate director and residency there is expected when there are activities at camp.

#### West Virginia Baptist Convention Flood Relief Report

A total of \$214,741.44 has been given for West Virginia flood relief. Funds were donated by individuals, churches, the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering and the American Baptist Churches of Pennsylvania and Delaware (ABCOPAD). Expenses totaled \$140,708.34, with \$74,033.10 remaining in the flood relief fund as of January 3, 2017.

Grants were provided for ten churches, the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen, the Crouch House at Cowen and three businesses (for supplies), totaling \$111,374. The funds

were used for mattresses, heaters, rebuilding, washers and dryers, air conditioners, yard supplies, food and putting six families back in their homes.

The total expense for supplies was \$29,334.34. This included the following: two tractor-trailer loads of lime; 100 rakes; 20 fans; 25 push brooms; 47 dehumidifiers; and ten cases of Shock Wave disinfectant, sanitizer and cleaner. Reimbursement for delivery and tools was also included.

# Are You Listening?

The call of Samuel is one familiar to many of us. How can we forget the story from Sunday School when the young boy, living in the temple, thought his master was calling for him after they had gone to bed. Upon hearing a voice calling his name, Samuel runs to Eli who had not called him. After the second interruption of his sleep, Eli realizes it is God's voice that Samuel is hearing - a very rare occurrence in those days. He tells Samuel to respond to the call of God by saying, "Speak, for your servant is listening." (1 Samuel 3:10)

Upon hearing and obeying the call of God, Samuel's life was forever changed. God had not called Samuel to an easy task. His first test was to tell Eli - the man who had raised him from birth, the man who had instructed him in the ways of the Lord, the mentor he respected and loved, that God was bringing judgment upon his house. Samuel listened to God!

Juan and Denise Aragon heard the voice of God calling them to serve as missionaries in Chiapas, Mexico. Keith and Debbie Myers heard the call of God calling them to Africa, which upon further discernment was a call to Puebla, Mexico. J.D. and Rhonda Reed obeyed God in accepting a call to serve in Bolivia. These are just a few of the many to whom God is speaking.

I would argue God speaks to each of us. God has a mission for each of us. God desires for each of us to be engaged in God's mission in the world.

How you engage God's mission is different and unique to you - your gifts, your circumstances, your calling. We should not get so busy we fail to hear God's voice when God speaks. Each of us should take time each day in the quiet of the morning or evening to still our hearts and minds so we can hear God speak.

I believe the ministries of our churches would be greatly enhanced if the leadership were listening to God. I believe we would be a force for dynamic changes in our communities if we listened to God and followed God's direction for action. I believe we would have surplus resources for ministry if we each listened to God and allocated our money as God instructed.

Let it not be said of us as it was of Israel, "In those days the word of the Lord was rare; there were not many visions." (1 Samuel 3:1) But let us quiet ourselves as Samuel did and say to the Lord, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

# Hispanic Ministries: How Far Should Love Reach? - ¿Hasta Dónde Debe Llegar El Amor?

"Can you help me get to 'el Norte' (the North)?" was the brave request of a young man I met in Chiapas, Mexico. "El Norte" is what many in Mexico call the United States. The dire poverty in his village was an obvious reason for his desire to migrate to the United States.

I was dumbfounded by his upfront plea, but managed to ask, "Why do you want to go to the United States?" With a blend of sadness and hope, he said, "I was working in Cancun, but I made barely enough to pay my rent and buy my food. I couldn't help my family. I missed them so much I decided to come back. I know over there [in the United States] I'll make enough to help my family."

Certain that he had dreams, I probed deeper, "If money wasn't an issue, what would you do with your life?" His eyes got teary and his jaw started to tremble. I had struck a nerve. "I'd be a biologist," he responded. "There are many medicinal plants that could help a lot of people, yet we don't know how to use them."

Poverty, injustice and lack of opportunity shatter lives and dreams. This young man is only one of millions across the globe who see migration as their only hope in search of a better future. In our global interconnected neighborhood, every day we are flooded with an unceasing stream of news about the oppressive realities afflicting people everywhere: violence, injustice, poverty and disasters. It is in this context Christ calls and sends us to show grace and love to our neighbors - local and global.

Yet these tragedies, rather than passionately propelling us to share God's love may tend to numb us. After all, what can we do for the wounded and hurting people across the world? And does God really expect us to care for the needs of others?

In his famous parable, the Good Samaritan, Jesus offers some light. Luke says a religious expert raised a tricky question to draw from Jesus an answer suggesting that one could "inherit eternal life" while bypassing the law (Luke 10:25). But Jesus didn't take the bait; He threw the question back to him. In his answer, the lawyer quoted the great commandment (Luke 10:27). Jesus commended his answer and challenged him, "Do it and you will live." Attempting to justify himself, he pressed, "And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29)

For first century Israelites, a neighbor was a fellow Jew. So, the purpose of his question was in fact to make a clear distinction between who was and who was not a neighbor - who was within and without his reach of love. But Jesus didn't play his game, instead he outwitted him by telling a dramatic story with a surprising plot twist that would have scandalized the lawyer and those listening with him.

"A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho ..." (Luke 10:30) Travelers passing through this 17-mile treacherous and dangerous route knew it was plagued with thieves hiding in the caves along the road. The man is stripped of his clothing, beaten and left half dead, cast off at the side of the road.

Fortunately, help was on the way. A priest and a Levite

were going down the same road. But when presented with the opportunity to practice their faith, they chose to elude it (Luke 10:31-32). Perhaps they feared being prevented from performing their temple duties, which would have occurred should they have had contact with a dead man. If that is the case, such fear was baseless. Since they were "going down," we could assume they had already served their duties and were heading home.

Shocked by what they just heard, the original listeners wondered what would happen next. Jesus surprised them with an entirely unexpected hero: a half-breed, despised foreigner, a Samaritan. When the Samaritan saw the man, he had a gut-wrenching experience (Luke 10:33) and was moved to action: he went to him, bandaged him, poured oil and wine on his wounds, put him on his donkey, carried

him to the inn and took care of him. He generously provided, from his own money to make sure the man had a place to recover (Luke 10:34).

While the religious men avoided, the outcast saw, felt and served. Jesus shredded the lawyer's prejudiced, limited view of neighbor. Jesus called and challenged everyone listening to bestow the love and grace they had lavishly received to anyone anywhere. The needs in our world are so vast we surely run the risk to become unresponsive and impervious. But God, says Jesus, expects you and me to be proactive to break through ethnic, cultural and religious barriers to show His mercy to serve those in need across the street and across the world.

May God continue to bless you!



## Take Root, Bear Fruit in 2017 at Camp Cowen

Have you ever bitten into a berry with the expectation of a sweet burst of flavor only to instantaneously respond with the pucker that accompanies tart fruits? What a disappointment! The odd reality is the similarity in how the tart fruit looks in comparison to the sweet fruit. Sometimes, the only way to tell the ripeness or goodness of a berry is to pop it in your mouth. It is uncanny how similar mankind is to the berry-eating process. A person can appear strong and healthy on the outside. Once thoughts are shared, however, the true flavor of the heart becomes known. For the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen, the mission statement of it being a place "where people meet Jesus and grow as His disciples in a community of faith" is more than just a catchphrase. Camp Cowen is a place where the tartness of the world is shed for the sweetness of Christ.

The 2017 camp season theme, "Take Root, Bear Fruit" focuses on Colossians 2:6-7:

<sup>6</sup> So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, <sup>7</sup> rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness.

Bearing the fruit of Christ is purely dependent on the way one knows Jesus and is discipled in their relationship with Him. #### The Baptist Afterschool Special Still Going Strong After 40 Years

Do you remember your school days? When the last bell of the day rang you were seeking a place to go with friends and lots of food. Kids haven't changed. They are still looking for a place to hang out, spend time with friends and good food. Add Christianity to the mix and you have the perfect recipe for a successful afterschool program.

A small church in northern Marion county has enjoyed the fruits of a weekday Christian education ministry for youth and their families for 34 years! Saint Paul Baptist Church (Fairmont) holds a Wednesday afternoon and evening program for kids ages preschool through senior high, plus adults. Many kids are second and third-generation participants.

The name of the ministry is the Baptist Afterschool Special. Larry Harker, pastor of Saint Paul Baptist Church, explains: "During my time as pastor of Logan First Baptist Church (Logan-Mingo) from 1975-82, our daughters ran home from school every Wednesday to watch a new television show called the ABC Afterschool Special (1976). Before watching, they and their new friends raided the kitchen refrigerator. 'Why can't the church do this?' I thought, only with a Christian emphasis. And so with the help and support of the congregation, we launched a new youth ministry I call the Baptist Afterschool

Special (BASS). BASS was the popular name and it became an instant success. Space is limited in downtown Logan, so we played football in the streets, walked to the local bowling alley owned by a member who helped to start a bowling league. We also sponsored church basketball and softball teams. The highlight of the year was a spiritual growth retreat at Parchment Valley Conference Center in May."

When I returned to my home town of Fairview as pastor of Saint Paul Baptist in 1982, I wanted to try BASS, but was uncertain. Would it work? It not only did, but after 34 years it is still attracting kids. It is difficult to measure how many people have been introduced to Christ and the local church through the Ministry of BASS, but I know one thing: It has kept our church young. The last time we took a survey the average age of our congregation was 39. I believe it is even younger now.

#### Junior High Convention 2016 Service Project Focuses on Recovery Point

The students at Junior High Convention 2016 utilized part of their time together in a unique and beautiful service project. With the drug epidemic in our culture standing as a painful reminder of the vast arm's length at which our culture holds God, the students worked on care packages for men who are focusing on shortening that length. *Recovery Point* is a detox and drug rehabilitation program that addresses this epidemic. A free program for participants, *Recovery Point* currently serves 108 men, guiding them through the 12-step Alcoholics Anonymous program. As a service of support to the men travelling through this journey, the students from Junior High Convention worked together to build care packages for each man involved in the program. Care packages included items like socks, soap, deodorant and personalized letters from students. This project was two-fold in nature. Because of the epidemic in the current culture, the students on the Youth Ministry Planning Team (YMPT) not only wanted to support the work at *Recovery Point*, but they also wanted to discourage the growth of the epidemic by utilizing the stories of men who had been caught up in it. Under the leadership of YMPT member, Josh Eastman, five members of *Recovery Point* were interviewed as part of the educational portion of the project. Those interviews were then shared with the convention attendees as a personal form of

discouragement from the addiction lifestyle. Below is a portion of an article written by Josh about the project.

"Junior High Convention came and went with successful care-package packing. One student at the convention even sought me out and told me a cousin of hers was actually a client at *Recovery Point* right now. She addressed her care package and wrote notes directly to him. I thought that was pretty awesome.

My hope is hearing these men's stories and serving them through the care packages will also open the eyes of at least one student. If one student is nudged away from drug experimentation by the video or care-packages, it will have been a success. But, regardless, *Recovery Point* received 108 fully packed care packages - one for every man in the program. Beyond this, we donated the offering taken at Junior High Convention to *Recovery Point*, a total of \$373.13. And above it all, the glory was and is the Lord's, for the work He does at *Recovery Point*, through Youth Ministry Planning Team and in the hearts of West Virginia Baptist Convention youth. In all things, all glory and honor to Jesus Christ forever and ever, amen."
