Dr. Mike Sisson Installed as Executive Minister

Convention gathered at Gassaway Baptist Church (Elk Valley) on July 14, 2018 to install Dr. Mike Sisson as its Executive Minister. The service was emceed by Rev. Mark Wood, Immediate Past President of the West Virginia Baptist Convention and chair of the Search Committee that called Dr. Sisson.

Host Pastor Rev. Mark Stump welcomed everyone to the church and had the opening prayer.

The service of installation was led by Dr. Lee Spitzer, General Secretary of the American Baptist Churches, USA. Dr. Spitzer focused his remarks on Acts 14, which demonstrated the regional work of Paul and how it was the model for regional executive ministry. Executive Ministers are called to authentic spiritual ministry - to preach, shepherd, disciple, encourage and to help maintain the truth of the gospel. Spitzer went on to say an Executive Minister must: 1. Remain a pastor at heart, 2. Be prophetic in holding God's people accountable and 3. Be apostolic in calling churches to be faithful to fulfill the Great Commission.

Dr. Sisson shared in his response his desire to serve and his passion for helping churches reach the lost for Christ. Dr. Sisson pledged to listen to God as he asked for the prayers of the people so together we can advance the kingdom of God. "We stand on the precipice of a great movement of God!" he said. "Pray! Dream! Expect to see God at work!"

Ginny Prunty coordinated the reception that followed the service with the assistance of the hospitality team from Gassaway Baptist Church.

Special guests included: Dr. David Bronkema, Interim Dean of Palmer Seminary; Rev. Jim Bell, International Ministries; Dr. Jeff Allen, Executive Director of the West Virginia Council of Churches; Past Executive Ministers, Dr. Lloyd Hamblin, Dr. David Carrico and Dr. Mike Stephens; Convention Staff; and a host of friends.

Dr. Sisson began his tenure as Executive Minister on April 1, 2018, having served previously as Senior Pastor of the Crab Orchard Baptist Church (Greenbrier-Raleigh) and Sutton Baptist Church (Elk Valley). Dr. Sisson has served as an Adjunct Professor for Palmer Theological Seminary in both their Masters and Doctoral programs.

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A Personal Prayer Life

Howard Hendricks once pointed out that if we opened our Bible to

Matthew and were to read through to John, we would never find an instance where the disciples asked, "Lord teach us how to witness" or "teach us how to perform miracles" or "teach us how to teach." However, we do find the disciples asking, "Lord, teach us to pray ..." You see the disciples, as do most Christians, believed prayer played a very important role in the life of the believer. Perhaps one of the most neglected aspects of prayer is "personal prayer." By personal prayer I am not referring to our faithfulness in praying for

others, the church or even provision. Instead, I am thinking more of the time we spend in silence before the Lord. Time spent meditating, reflecting, listening and enjoying Emmanuel, God's presence with us. Time alone with God is so significant even His Son, Jesus, made a regular practice of spending great amounts of time alone with His Father in prayer. For example, we read in Luke's gospel, "And it came to pass in those days, that He [Jesus] went out into a mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer to God" (Luke 6:12). Richard Foster, in his excellent book The Celebration of Discipline, explains, "Prayer catapults us onto the frontier of the spiritual life. Of all the spiritual disciplines, prayer is the most central because it ushers us into perpetual communion with the Father."

Personal prayer changes us. Foster writes, "Prayer is the central avenue God uses to transform us." However, "If we are unwilling to change, we will abandon prayer as a noticeable characteristic of our lives." Simply put, the closer we come to God through prayer the more we will see our need and the more we will desire to become like Christ. The principle is this: One cannot come into the presence of a Holy God and remain the same. Just as Moses' face glowed after spending time with the Lord on Mount Sinai, so our lives too will also be noticeably transformed when we spend time with Him. As the apostle Paul writes, "We all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, [even] as by the Spirit of the Lord" (2 Corinthians 3:18).

Spending time alone with God changes the way we think. "In prayer, real prayer," writes Foster, "we begin to think God's thoughts after Him: to desire the things He desires, to love the things He loves, to will the things He wills. Progressively, we are taught to see things from His point of view." When our attitudes become influenced by seeing things as God sees them our life takes on new dimensions, it has new meaning. Prayer then becomes no longer a means by which we try to move God, but the means by which God moves us. The result is we develop a spiritual mindset that will inform every area of our life and enable us to live according to His will and design. Take time to get alone in prayer with God. You will be forever glad you did.

Why Sunny Day?

Perhaps that seems a strange question to ask. You have been hearing about the capital campaign to raise money for the *Sunny Day Leadership and Activity Center* for a couple years. So maybe it seems odd to ask, "Why Sunny Day?" The more conversations I have the more I realize that is just the question I need to be answering.

Why is it Called Sunny Day?

The phrase "sunny day" has deep meaning for Camp Cowen. First, it is in honor of Alissa Shamblin Cantrell. For many people who are familiar with Cowen, the words "pretty,

sunny day" can cause an instant smile. Those words bring warm memories of an amazing person who truly personified a "pretty, sunny day." Alissa loved and served the Lord during her lifetime with passion and consistency, and as she served the Lord she always did so with a smile and a hearty laugh. Her catch phrase, "I hope you have a pretty, sunny day!" meant so much more than a weather forecast. Alissa understood the hope and joy of the gospel and it radiated

from her. The *Sunny Day Leadership and Activity Center* is appropriately named for a woman of faith who dedicated her life to advancement of the gospel to the next generation.

How many days at the
West Virginia Baptist Camp at
Cowen are we in need of a Sunny
Day? Though the weather may
bring storms, rain, heat or cold, this
new building will provide us a place
to have a sunny day no matter the

weather. As we develop new programs, community outreach and disciple and equip leaders, it will also provide a sunny day for people whose life story is anything but sunny.

Why would this be Important for me to Support?

I will give you three reasons:

First, the building of the gym facility will increase the ministry impact to campers at the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen by providing year-round recreation space. While we love the outdoors and will continue our focus on those experiences, the reality is the weather is not always conducive to outdoor play (as the rain storms have continued to show so far this year). The gym would provide campers ample year-round space for groups of 250 plus for games, sports and gathering room we currently do not have on site.

Second, this project provides us the opportunity to minister to those in need right in Camp Cowen's backyard: Webster County. Imagine us being able to host school groups, sports activities, partnering to host parenting classes, ministry to grand-

parents raising their grandchildren ... the list is endless. How exciting would it be to make a difference in the lives of the very people in our community?

Third, the *Sunny Day Leadership and Activity Center* will pour into the lives of young adults and youth leaders for generations. *Camp Cowen has been a place where lives have been changed for 75 years and campers have come to know Jesus as Lord and Savior and grown as disciples*. As we seek to continue to identify leaders, provide training and give experiential opportunities in leadership, the classroom space will be pivotal in being a place set aside for this important task!

Financial Update

As of this writing, \$307,342 has been raised towards the \$1.5 million goal. More than \$13,000 came in during the month of June alone. Let me share with you what that looks like: We receive donation checks of \$1,000-\$5,000 and in smaller values, making the compounding impact of the giving astounding.

These boys (pictured above) blessed us so much with their giving hearts! Early in the week during Junior 1 Camp, they asked their counselor how they could give some of their money to support the *Sunny Day Leadership and*

Activity Center Building campaign. All week long they waited and made sure they had extra money left on checkout day to give. On Saturday, these boys were SO excited to give their money to help build Sunny Day. Thank you for your generosity.

School adopted the *Sunny Day Leadership and Activity Center* as
their project this summer. They

Living in Time

If you have ever sung in a choir or played in a band



you know how important it is for everyone to be on the same beat. It is typical for each participant to have rehearsed their part. It is also very likely the director/conductor has worked with the different sections of voices or instrumentation to prepare the group to play

together. Whether one plays/sings the melody or another part, everyone must be in the same time for the performance to be done well.

Weirton Christian Center Building Dedication August 26

The new Weirton Christian Center building is now ready for our children! This has been a long journey and we are dedicated to provide service to the community for at least another hundred years and this building will take us there.

Many thanks to all our family of Baptist churches, American Baptist Women's Ministries' groups and friends. We really appreciate all the generous donations, the fundraisers and offerings, totaling close to \$100,000. You are so instrumental to our ministry. The American Baptist Women helped to furnish our preschool and the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering is helping to provide a USDA (United States Department of Agriculture) -approved kitchen.

We are still accepting donations as we still have construction costs and end project expenses to cover. Much of our furniture and supplies will be transferred. We will also continue to sell the donor bricks as we are going to create a walkway between our center and Weirton Heights Memorial Baptist Church (Panhandle). The filler bricks can be replaced with engraved ones. We are selling them for \$75 each or 2 for \$100.

We feed the kids daily lunch and snacks, and have planned lots of fun activities. The bus stop is set for fall at the new center and we are planning a farewell party to downtown in

August 2018. We are working with a group of five churches who are planning to take over our old location for ministry in many areas, including Bible study, addiction recovery programs, food pantry and more. God is involved in all we are doing and it is such a blessing to see Him orchestrate our plans. We truly appreciate your support as we go into the unknown area of expenses for this new location. Our operational costs are still our biggest need. Thanks for keeping us in your prayers!

The Marketplace is a Great Place for Christians

Adult Discipleship: Faith in the Workplace Emphasis 2018

Darren Shearer, in his article of June 5, 2015 for the website *Theology for Business*, shares seven reasons why the marketplace is a great place for Christians. They are well stated and ring very true! Here is an abbreviated version of Shearer's article:

Reason #1: Almost all non-Christians are in the marketplace.

Today, less than 20% of Americans attend church regularly. In many European countries, the percentages are much lower. At the current rate, regular church attendance is projected to drop to 11.7% by 2050.

The good news is these people who aren't attending church will still be waking up to go to work alongside their Christian co-workers in the marketplace each morning.

Reason #2: Almost all Christians are in the marketplace.

At least 85% of the Christian workforce spends 60-70% of their waking hours in the marketplace. In addition to serving our families and our local churches, the marketplace is the primary context in which our spiritual gifts should be used. The ministry potential for Christians using their spiritual gifts collaboratively in the marketplace is astounding!

Reason #3: Discipleship actually can happen in the marketplace.

Church leaders often are criticized for the lack of discipleship and spiritual growth among their congregations. Let's give our pastors a break. How much discipleship actually can happen during a two-hour church service on Sunday? Discipleship - that is, becoming more like Jesus - happens in everyday life. Yes, discipleship can happen anywhere ... even during a two-hour, lecture-style event on Sunday. However, the potential for discipleship and ministry investment in a weekly service is a fraction of what is possible during an entire workweek spent with our co-workers, clients, etc.

Reason #4: The marketplace is a more authentic showroom of Christianity.

If you were shopping for a car, you'd probably go to a showroom. Before you bought anything, you'd probably want to see if the car actually functions properly on the road. You might

even ask the dealer to allow you to take the car home for a day or two to test it out.

The local church is like the showroom for Christianity. The marketplace is the test drive. The marketplace is where our unbelieving co-workers get to see if they really want what we have. Daily, they see how we react under pressure. They see how we treat people. They see how much God truly matters to us in our daily lives.

Reason #5: The marketplace forces the church to use all of its capabilities.

Personality-driven and super-pastor Christianity doesn't work in the marketplace. Having a bunch of Christians sitting on the sidelines of ministry may not prevent a local church from increasing numerically, but it won't transform the marketplace for the glory of God.



We need to approach marketplace ministry in a way that leverages the spiritual gifts of all Christians in the marketplace.

Reason #6: Denominational divisions are less destructive in the marketplace.

We can choose whether to attend a Baptist Church, Pentecostal-Charismatic Church, Presbyterian Church, a Non-Denominational Church, etc. ... but most of us don't

have the luxury of coworking only with Christians with whom we agree theologically. The marketplace has a way of diluting some of these differences. This opens the door to collaborative ministry beyond the walls of our local churches and traditions.

Reason #7: Everything gets funded from the marketplace.

All money comes from value that has been created in the marketplace, and business professionals ultimately decide what gets funded. These business professionals need to know God and His plan for their lives in order to make righteous decisions concerning money.

Although business is often thought of only as the economic engine of the church, I hope we will begin to see and realize its full potential for transforming society for the glory of God.

It Began with a Call to Serve

The following article has been written by our new West Virginia Baptist Convention intern, Breellen Fleming. It introduces an exciting ministry at one of our churches. Hope you find inspiration in their story.

It began with a call to serve, to spread the love of God where it was needed in the community. The people of Elizabeth Baptist Church (Parkersburg) thought this calling was only leading them into a new bus ministry. However, as they began to pick up children to come to the youth group, a new layer of God's plan began to be revealed. Many of the children were hungry and in clear need of a meal. It was then that those who were helping with this ministry realized God was providing them with an opportunity to serve the community in a different way than they had originally thought.

They felt led to start providing meals for the children at youth group. As they took this next step in their ministry, the program exploded. Children came pouring in from the community, excited to receive spiritual nourishment as well as physical nourishment. While this new growth was incredible, it did present new challenges for the volunteers to overcome. Finding funding for the meals was an issue that arose early on.

One of the first steps the team of youth leaders took was to become an agent of the local food bank, which provided them with meals at a lower cost. Another step was reaching out to the West Virginia Baptist Convention. The Convention was able to

provide them with information about where they could find more funding. Through their help, the team was able to apply for a grant which will expand the number of meals they can provide.

As the monetary needs of this ministry are beginning to be fulfilled, the team is starting to see another layer of God's plan for them. They feel led to continue with their calling to serve the community outside their youth group as well as within it. One of the ways they were able to do this was by providing meals for students during the teacher strikes this year.

It has been encouraging for the youth leaders to watch the children grow in their faith and come to see God as well as the church, cares for them. The leaders feel the kids have a real enthusiasm for learning about God. When their physical needs are met, the children are able to fully take part in the youth group and experience the joy of God's love.

According to the youth leaders, what the group needs now are more adult volunteers who feel a calling into mentorship. Since the ministry has grown so quickly, it would be helpful to have more adult presence as it would allow more small group time between adults and children. Pray for this need and for the children served by this ministry.


Racine First Celebrates 80 Years of Ministry
