MEXICO Lubeck Community Baptist Church (Parkersburg)

Fairmont State University Baptist Campus Ministries

Fairmont State University Baptist Campus Ministries sent four students and three adult leaders on a Mexico mission trip over spring break March 9-16, 2019 to partner with Keith and



Deborah Myers. The group provided vacation bible school lessons, games, songs and o

snacks to over 50 children and led a women's workshop. This group is thankful for the prayers and support from West Virginia Baptist Convention churches and looks forward to future mission trips.

NORWALK, OHIO West Virginia University Baptist Campus Ministries

Baptist Campus Ministries (BCM) at West Virginia University (WVU) had the opportunity to partner with Norwalk, Ohio First Baptist Church (ABC-USA) during the college's spring



semester break, March 10-15, 2019. The mission/service focus during the week was a labor of love for their afterschool program building, The Haven, where they helped prepare rooms to be used by a community ministry teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) and for building relationships. They were also able to help lead worship on

Sunday morning and offer a BCM service (worship and Bible study) on Wednesday evening. Being able to witness ten students experience the greater community of American Baptist churches partnering together was amazing.

HAITI

Clarksburg Baptist Church, Union Baptist Church, Grafton First Baptist Church and Oakwood Baptist Church

The first Haiti mission team, consisting of 29 members,

ministered in Fort Liberté, Haiti April 1-11, 2019. The medical group ministered to over 900 patients, while those in the food distribution group provided ten pound bags of food to 1,200 families. Participants included Michael Yost, Clarksburg Baptist Church (Union); Christina Moore, Union Baptist Church (Union); and Brenda Rosier, Grafton First Baptist Church (Union).

The medical group saw over 600 patients and food was provided to 500 families with additional food given to several villages. New Baptist Church

A group from New Baptist Church (Guyandotte) also visited Fort Liberté, Haiti. While there, they checked in on the children sponsored by families in the United States to make sure

they were doing well in school and also measured them to get their clothing sizes. They also brought a medical team to run the clinic and provide medical care for anyone



who came to them. The group also set up tables in some of the outposts for a day and provided medical care and food.

BOLIVIA Marshall University Baptist Campus Ministries

Sandra Clay of Hurricane First Baptist Church (Teays Valley) was greatly impacted by the Marshall University Baptist

Campus Ministries' trip to Bolivia during their spring break. Having served alongside J.D. and Rhonda Reed, she wrote: "Bolivia was a trip that humbled me beyond belief. All too often, we take for granted our daily



blessings and look at the world through a glass screen. By experiencing other communities' troubles first-hand, a fire was set in me that is spurring me to spread the gospel with those who need to hear it. The Task Remaining

A New Day in Missions

A few years ago, I was driving back from Senior Day at Camp Cowen and, for some reason, was overcome with a burden to pray for the nations. As I drove along Birch River Road, I remember praying for all the nations that came to mind, praying specifically for those that were closed or hostile to the gospel. Continuing to pray as I turned on to Interstate 79, making my way back to Charleston, I noticed a car stranded alongside the road with a man standing in front, frantically waving for assistance. A storm was quickly brewing and he was hoping to hitch a ride for himself and his two sons before the weather got any worse. Agreeing to pick them up, I asked where he was from and he quickly responded, "Pakistan." I had literally just finished praying for Pakistan!

They needed a ride to Institute to meet their extended family, which meant I had an hour to engage this family in gospel conversation. I quickly learned he had never heard of Jesus, nor had he ever seen a Bible. After confirming he could read English, I gave him mine.

When we arrived at the destination, the man thanked me for the ride and invited me to join his extended family for dinner. With no other plans that evening, I quickly accepted and followed him inside. Meeting me at the door were his cousins and their in-laws, all from Saudi Arabia. I had also prayed specifically for Saudi Arabia! Sitting around the dinner table, I was also able to share the gospel with them.

Is God not creative!? Combined, Saudi Arabia and Pakistan have over 200 million people, and more than 90% of them have never heard the gospel. Some sources suggest they are two of the most closed-off groups to Christianity. However, 2,000 years ago, we were commissioned to go and make disciples among them (Matthew 28:18-20), but history shows we have neglected that call. It is estimated that 88% of the people in that region of the world will live their entire lives without ever meeting a Christian. Paul asks the questions in Romans 10:13-15 (in reverse order):

And how are they to preach unless they are sent? And how are they to hear without someone preaching? And how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? How then will they call on him in whom they have not believed? For "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

We see that salvation is dependent on calling, and calling is dependent on believing, and believing is dependent on hearing, and hearing is dependent on preaching, and preaching is dependent on being sent. After neglecting Christ's commission to go to all nations, could it be He is now sending the nations to us? Is God creative enough to do that?

Since that time, God has opened my eyes to the nations all around us. My neighbor is from Egypt, several local restaurant owners are from Syria and at the University of Charleston, where my wife and I have helped lead Baptist Campus Ministries for the last eight years, there are nearly 50 countries represented. God is literally bringing the nations to us. Could missions ever be so easy?

This generation is bringing with it a new day of missions. William Carey had to get on a boat to take the gospel to India. For many of us, we can just walk across the street. Countries that have historically been hard-to-reach or closed off to the gospel are enrolling in our universities, or working at our hospitals or moving in next door. The call to "go" is still essential, but we now also have a call to "welcome." This is a new day in missions.



Adult Discipleship: Journey Alongside

What is discipleship? How can I help someone become more Christ-like? How does your church "do" discipleship? What are the barriers to participation in discipleship activities? Have you asked these questions or heard someone in your church ask these questions? The West Virginia Baptist Convention Discipleship Commission invites you to a daylong Discipleship Event on Saturday, August 24, 2019 at Parchment Valley Conference Center. Our goal is to help answer these questions and more.

The theme is *Bearers of Hope: Journey Alongside*. The event won't give you a ready-to-use curriculum or a one size-fitsall approach. Instead, you will discover relational principles applicable to your life's diverse set of relationships. Dane Allphin, Navigators Regional Leader, will be the guest speaker. The theme is inspired by Bill Mowry's book, <u>The Ways of the</u> <u>Alongsider-Growing Disciples Life to Life</u>. Dane will share with us the four words of discipleship: disciple, discipleship, discipling and disciple making. He will then unpack the concept of R + 2D + 3A: Relationships (with God and Others) + Discovery and Discussion (2D) around the Bible + Application, Accountability and Affirmation (3A). He will finish the afternoon with an invitation to engage in the scriptures.

One of the key passages to explore will be Jesus' last words to His disciples: "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing then in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." RUSSIA

The present ministry of the West Virginia Baptist

he West Virginia Baptist Convention Russia Mission Partnership is three-fold. First, there is an economic development program. Because of a grant from One Great Hour of Sharing, a pool of funds is available to provide microloans to start Christian businesses. These businesses agree to repay the loans over a period of three years, and to tithe to the Ryazan Baptist Church, of which the owners must be a member. Second, there is

financial support provided through gifts from West Virginia Baptist Convention churches. This support can be designated to aid the ministry of a partner church in Ryazan or to benefit the partnership as a whole. Individual Ryazan Baptist Churches have several projects to support, such as halfway houses, building programs and various children's ministries including camps and orphanages. The Ryazan Baptist Union has also started a campground facility very similar to the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen. Third, and most importantly, there are the many mutually inspiring relationships that exist between West Virginia Baptists and Ryazan Baptists. Witnessing how God is at work in the lives of believers from both countries never ceases to be a catalyst for awe and worship.

Virginia Baptist Convention/Russia Mission Partnership is now transitioning into a second, younger generation. Other regions of the Russia Baptist Union, in addition to Ryazan, are being considered for missionary outreach and support. Although the standard of living has risen since the fall of communism, it is still far below the standard of living in America. Ministry resources in Russia are scarce, but Russian believers are amazing in their extremely efficient use of money and materials. With gifts and encouragement from West Virginia Baptists, much more can be done to share the gospel and to make disciples throughout the vast, expansive land of Russia.

Russian Baptists have a heritage of severe persecution for their devotion to Christ. Their predecessors were arrested and removed from their families for leading church services. Russian Baptists are very Biblical in their worldview and very conservative in their theology and are deeply devoted to missions.

When I return to Cuba later this year (2019), it will mark

visit to a closed, Communist country. An ongoing, life-changing partnership had never crossed my mind.

The ministry has grown and changed over the years many of the mission activities that mission groups often do are not feasible, and in some cases not needed in Cuba. For example, Cubans have cradle to grave medical care. While they often lack many of the technologies and drugs we take for granted, they educate a surplus of medical providers. Every neighborhood has a doctor.

What kind of ministry is this, then? At its best, it is a ministry of presence and relationship. We visit and encourage

the 29th consecutive year I have visited that island nation. That sentence fills me with surprise, joy, wonder and gratitude to the Lord God! It was never supposed to be like this. When I began this journey in 1991, it was to be a once in a lifetime churches and pastors of the Fraternity of Cuban Baptist Churches. Their highest priority is for us to be with them. Out of our relationships, we have grown a vibrant ministry of assistance and development. Through the generosity of our friends, we have been instrumental in helping them to procure and develop their national camp. We have been able to help churches secure property and build buildings. Pastors have been educated and their salaries subsidized. We even held a pastor's family retreat for all the pastors of the fraternity.

Of course, any partnership benefits both partners. The association with the Cuban church has been of great value to me, personally, and to those who have traveled with me. For instance, Cuban Baptists have taught us how to be a church in a hostile society that seeks to marginalize the church - that is a great lesson for the American church.

The depth of their faith and the beauty of their witness has been transformative for many of us. This event expresses it well. One of our Cuban brothers gave a shirt to a non-Christian man in his community. When asked why, he answered simply, "I had two shirts (literally) and he didn't have one. Such actions
