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Time to Refocus



Someone once said, "Obstacles are those frightful things you see when you take your eyes off your goals." This is an observation that seems to apply to many different circumstances. It certainly applies to every aspect of one's personal life, whether physical or spiritual. However, it also applies to ministries being done for Jesus Christ, whether they are being carried out as individuals, churches or as the convention family of churches.

Obstacles can be defined in many ways with some being brief and others lingering around for a longer time. Regardless of the nature of the obstacle, they all have the capability of distracting us from God's will and mission. It seems the writer of the book of Hebrews understood this principle very well when he wrote, "let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us fixing our eyes on Jesus" (Hebrews 12:1b-2a). He calls our attention to the fact that this "race" is a marathon, not a sprint, so extra caution must be used to not become distracted. The way to accomplish this is to maintain our focus on Jesus Christ and stay on course.

The Bible provides numerous examples of people who overcame incredible obstacles by keeping their eyes focused on the Lord. One such example would be the account of the battle between David and Goliath. Goliath was a giant and the undefeated Philistine champion warrior with a sword, a spear and 150 pounds of armor. David was a young shepherd no more 17 years old with a staff and a sling who was only there to bring food to his brothers serving in Saul's military. It is times like this people might say, "Hey David, you might want to do the math" which means, "look at the obstacles and accept that the odds are against you." Talk about the definition of an obstacle, Goliath was between nine and ten feet tall. He was hard to ignore. He was undefeated in war. "Do the math!" Beating Goliath was pretty much impossible. However, David's response to the Philistine makes it clear he had chosen to focus on the Lord and not on the very large and threatening obstacle standing in his way. David says to Goliath, "You come against me with sword and spear and javelin, but I come against you in the name of the Lord Almighty ... for the battle is the Lord's, and he will give all of you into our hands" (1 Samuel 17:45, 47b).

What we focus on, we magnify. What we focus on, we energize. It is far too easy to allow the challenges we face to distract us from the mission. By their very nature, challenges and problems are threatening and can easily demand our attention, however the way forward is found in refocusing and placing our eyes back on the Lord!

As a convention family, our Goliath right now is finances, however we know money follows mission and our mission is **Doing Christ's Work Together** with the emphasis being on Christ. So, our focus must be on the Lord to guide us and like David to ask for ourselves, "Lord how will you work through me to overcome this giant obstacle?" It is cliché, but still true, "Where God guides, He provides!"

In the words of the psalmist, "I will lift up my eyes to the hills - From whence comes my help? My help comes from the Lord, Who made heaven and earth" (Psalm 121:1-2).

Learning While Leading: Summer Interns

Experiential learning is an important part of the way the early church operated. Jesus was very much a practitioner of the "hands on" approach to leadership training. His disciples first shadowed Him as He traveled, preached, taught and healed His

way across the countryside. They had opportunity to ask questions, listen, learn and even make mistakes - all in the presence of the Master and with the support of one another. When they were ready, Jesus sent them out two-by-two to do a little ministry of their own. When they returned, they spent some time together to unpack what they had learned and experienced.

Last January, over 20 young adults came together at Parchment Valley Conference Center for our very first intern training session to learn, share and explore. Not all would go on to be interns, but many did. The idea was to learn from Jesus' method and give our young adults opportunity to grow in their leadership using a summer, practical experience. Each intern was paired with a mentor. Each was given multiple books to enhance their learning experience. The interns received a wage for their work, roughly equivalent to what a summer worker at camp might make.

Internships are not a new or original idea. Many of our

churches have offered them before. But starting several summers ago, many began to feel this was an important part of what we needed to be doing together, as a convention. The first summer, there were three internships, all fully funded by the churches

> offering them. Last summer, there were six, with supplemental funding offered by the convention for those churches who needed help.

This summer saw 18 young adults try their hand at various types of ministry with our churches around the state. Some preached their first sermon, some wrote Christian music, some learned how to teach, lead and organize. There were interns who were gifted in personal evangelism, many worked with children or youth, and some led worship. We had an intern working in intercultural ministry, one helping with the School of Christian Studies and even one who was placed with a Christian business. All learned and grew in their faith and leadership. And we, as a convention family learned as well - how to make the internships better and more effective.

Already, we are looking to the future and next year. We are currently accepting applica-

tions, available at <u>www.wvbc.org</u>, for next year's summer internship program and are planning for training in January 2020.

"The missionary intern program is great! Keep it up!" Those are the words of Mark Jarrell, pastor of <u>Genesis Fellowship</u> (Kanawha Valley). One of the young adults of his church, Taylor Huffman, was part of the internship program this summer. Along with Taylor, three other missionary interns were commis-

sioned by our West Virginia Baptist Convention family this summer to serve alongside various mission partners around the world. The internship was designed to help young adults discern a possible longterm calling to missions.

Taylor, who spent three weeks in Tura, India, reflected on her trip, "I grew in my relationship with Christ through seeing Him in the people of Tura. Just seeing how they worship Him throughout the day was so moving to me. I also think my prayer life was strengthened because throughout the internship, I not only had to rely on

Him more, but I also had to be in greater communication with Him." She also added, "After getting home and sharing about my trip, my church home group decided they wanted to go on a mission trip next year. So for me, I am excited to go on another mission trip with them next year!"

Jenni Rosenberger, who along with Cortney Belcher spent five weeks in Mexico working alongside Keith and Debbie Myers, said, "Over the course of my five weeks in Mexico, we traveled to several different indigenous communities. From Cerrillo to Oaxaca to Zongotzola, I had the opportunity to experience many different cultures. What stood out to me most during my time in Mexico was the sacrificial love the people showed us. They would give up anything to make sure we were provided for and through their actions, I was able to see the love of Christ like

I have never seen it before."

Abigail Harman served for six weeks among migrant workers in Beirut, Lebanon. Her missionary host was Sarah Chetti. As an international affairs' major, she said, "What stood out to me most was how important politics, history, language and geography are to missions. I also learned my passions for those things can be used as a tool to bring the gospel. As I return for the second half of my time at Marshall University, I am looking forward to seeing how I can join my love of politics and international relations with missions

and seeing how God wants to use me in His kingdom."

In addition to the international mission trip experience, each of the interns also participated in a training program that focused on topics such as theology, missiology, culture and support raising. Interns were also intentionally placed with missionaries who could invest in them while on the field.

Bearers of Hope: Journey Alongside -A Discipleship Conference Recap

"How do we make disciples in the local church?" This is a question frequently asked by pastors and church leaders. Today, it seems the mission of the church is evangelism. Our goal is to preach and teach the gospel of Jesus Christ, bring people into the church, get them baptized and send them out on their own. It appears that over the years we have forgotten the last part of that Great Commission.

"Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20, NIV).

The last part of Jesus' command is teaching. We call this discipleship. In many of our churches, there is no follow-up instruction after baptism. The Discipleship Commission of the <u>West Virginia Baptist Convention</u> held a special discipleship training event at <u>Parchment Valley Conference Center</u> on Saturday, August 24, 2019. The purpose of the event was to help pastors and churches step up their game in the area of discipleship.

The morning began with worship led by *Blind Journey*. There was such a wonderful atmosphere of worship that even a broken guitar string could not hinder the Spirit's movement.

The main speaker of the event was Dane Allphin, the Navigators' regional leader. Dane began by asking two very important questions: What is a disciple? How do I make disciples? He presented four important words for ministry in the local church: disciple, discipleship, discipling and disciplemaking. We discovered that in order to make disciples of others, we must first be disciples of Jesus Christ ourselves. This means we must have a growing relationship with Him. We must make quiet time with God a priority in our daily lives.

Jonathan and Koreen Villers led a time of worship at the conclusion of Dane's presentation, several people shared what they learned, and Jill Narraway closed the event with prayer. Each student was then presented with a workbook entitled <u>The Invitation, Thirty Days to a Changed Life</u> to help them develop into better disciples, which will allow them to also better disciple others.

2020 Challenge: Will You Join Us in Holding the Rope?

When William Carey sensed the call to go to India, he likened it to going on a rescue mission into a deep, dark well. As he looked at the men around him, he said, "I will go down if you will hold the rope." Carey spent the next 41 years of his life in India while the other men spent the rest of their lives holding the rope for Carey and the other missionaries who would soon follow.

Missionary work requires rope holders. Did you hear the conditional logic of Carey's statement? "I will go down **IF** you will hold the rope." Without rope holders, Carey could not have gone to India.

Every month, exciting things are happening throughout our convention family. This newsletter is full of those stories! But work like this requires rope holders, and in order for these ministries to continue, we need people to hold the rope. For 2019, it was budgeted that we would continue to pull from reserves, relying on those who held the rope in the past. But after eight consecutive years of doing that, we cannot do that any longer. It's time for the current generation to also join in holding the rope.

Of the 369 churches in our convention family, 253 of them are holding the rope financially this year - that's just over 68%. There are also numerous individuals who have set up recurring giving through our online giving tool. To those individuals and churches: Thank you for holding the rope!

But to the other churches and individuals, I want to offer you a challenge. If 2,000 individuals or churches started or increased their giving to the <u>Mountain State Mission Offering</u> by \$20 per month (consider this the **2020 Challenge**), then we could support the above-mentioned ministries and more for many years to come! Or consider doing what some of our other faithful saints of the past have done by setting up legacy gifts that support these ministries forever! I would be more than happy to help you set these up!

The reality is this current generation (myself included) needs to own the fact that it's our turn to hold the rope. It's what we have been called to do.

As you contemplate whether or not you are called to participate in this challenge, reflect over the words of William Booth (founder of the Salvation Army):

> "'Not called!' did you say? 'Not heard the call,' I think you should say. Put your ear down to the Bible, and hear Him bid you go and pull sinners out of the fire of sin. Put your ear down to the burdened, agonized heart of humanity, and listen to its pitiful wail for help. Go stand by the gates of hell, and hear the damned entreat you to go to their father's house and bid their brothers and sisters and servants and masters not to come there. Then look Christ in the face - whose mercy you have professed to obey - and tell Him whether you will join heart and soul and body and circumstances in the march to publish His mercy to the world."

Our state, our nation and our world are in desperate need of the gospel. That is why we *do Christ's work together*. The question for you is: Will you join us in holding the rope?

Camp Global Recap

As West Virginia Baptists, we have much to celebrate when it comes to missions. Since our formation in 1865, we have commissioned 41 different full-time missionaries and we have seven who are still on the field - and that is just our International Ministries' (IM) missionaries. We have also commissioned hundreds of others who are serving with other agencies all over the

world. In addition to our long-term missionaries, nearly 200 more individuals have gone on short-term mission trips this year to more than a dozen different countries on five different continents. We can celebrate the fact that we are working all over the world!

But at <u>Camp Global 2019</u>, we were soberly reminded that more than 41% of the world has yet to even hear of Christ, implying we have a great task remaining!

Camp Global is a weekend-long family mission camp at <u>Camp Cowen</u>. This year's

theme of "Immigration, Emigration and the Gospel" focused on how the migration of people all around the world is opening doors for the gospel like never before. Dan Chetti, IM missionary in Lebanon, shared that more than 250 million people are currently on the move, which comprises the greatest migration of people in human history. He also shared how this has resulted in millions throughout the Middle East and North Africa coming to Christ. Todd McClure then talked about migration from a United States' perspective and challenged people to consider how God might be opening doors for the gospel here as well.

Trent Eastman, pastor at <u>New Baptist Church</u> (Guyandotte) led Vespers on Friday evening and discussed what the missionary call truly means. Saturday was comprised of Bible studies; missionary updates from Dan, Rhonda Reed and

> Debbie Mulneix; and workshops designed to either equip individuals to better reach internationals in their own communities or to provide updates on our mission partnerships around the world. This year, those updates came from partnerships in Mexico, Nicaragua, Haiti, Bolivia, Russia, Morocco, Tunisia, Egypt, Sudan, Lebanon, Syria, Iraq and India. Andrew Ely, of <u>Huntington Community</u> <u>Church</u>, led the group in worship all weekend and also led a campfire devotional. The migration of people is opening

doors for the gospel like never before. You can now take the gospel to the nations by getting on a plane or sometimes by just crossing the street. How might God want to use you in His redemptive work? Mark your calendar and join us next year at Camp Global 2020 from July 31-August 2, 2020 to learn of more opportunities.

Bolivia - Missionary Update

International Ministries (IM) has three main focus areas. The first is "inviting people to become disciples of Jesus." One of the ways this is realized in Latin America and the Caribbean is through the Master of Theological Education in Latin Ministries' Program at Palmer Seminary. This program is a joint effort through Palmer, IM and American Baptist Home Mission Society (for United States' students) to help train pastors and leaders in Iberoamerica and the Caribbean. Just two months ago, I joined International Ministries' (IM) colleagues and celebrated the graduation of 14 students in Campinas, Brazil with our national partner, the National Baptist Convention of Brazil (CBN). The goal of this program is to train local leaders who can empower the local church, but also who can train other local leaders to do God's work. Whether pastors, doctors, accountants or stay-at-home parents, all are welcome. So far, in just three years of the program, we have graduated over 50 students in the United States, Mexico and Brazil. We currently have students in Chile, Ecuador and Bolivia as well. This fall, we will start a new group in Ecuador and are excited to be in the planning stages of expanding this program all throughout Latin America.

The challenge is making the program affordable. In Bolivia, for example, the average wage is just under \$300 per month and these classes are more than double that when taken at full price. With a generous scholarship from Palmer, we can significantly decrease that amount, but it is still more than they make in a month, so IM is trying to provide an additional scholarship so students can afford to be part of this amazing program. Because of their economic realities, only a few of them could participate without our help. Recently, I had the privilege to share with a student group that we were going to be able to give them a partial scholarship and joy filled the room. With a recession in their nation, many of the students were going to have to take a break from the program, but with this scholarship they will all be able to continue.

This is where I hope you can join in with this work. We need your help. Would you be willing to adopt a pastor and help them to be trained to meet the growing needs of the church in Latin America? We have a goal of training 500 leaders in the next ten years, but we can't do it without the help of churches and individuals that care about the church. illness, however, knocked us off our tracks and the plans were stopped.

In the process of waiting to receive Juan's diagnosis and prognosis, our desire to serve was unmoved and we found other ways to do it. One way was to hire a carpenter to make children's chairs for the churches in the Tseltal area. Many of our churches have lots of kids, but no children's ministries. We sensed God is leading us to equip them to sow His word in the hearts of these children.

Another way was with pastor Antonio. He represents the Tsotsil churches. He's been sick since April. As time passed and he continued to be ill, we told him to come to San Cristobal and Juan would take him to a doctor. Spanish is not pastor Antonio's first language. He misunderstood and thought Juan was saying he would have to be admitted to the hospital! After many weeks, he finally decided to come. We took him to see an internal medicine doctor who referred him to a gastroenterologist. He had an endoscopy, which found bacteria causing gastritis. We got him enough medicine to treat it and get him better.

Your prayers have strengthened our faith and courage during this time. Juan and I are traveling to Los Angeles for appointments at UCLA (University of California at Los Angeles) Hospital this fall. We will see two doctors who specialize in Juan's condition. These doctors' surgery approach is less invasive than the one done in Mexico. Again, we appreciate your prayers for this process and for our children as we leave them with friends in Chiapas.

Mexico - Missionary Update

A couple of years ago, on a friend's recommendation, I began reading, <u>When Helping Hurts</u>, by Steve Corbett and Brian Fikkert. Little did I know, that upon completion of the second chapter, our ministry in Mexico would embark on a profound, yet simplistic shift that would comprise, not only our CICEM (Council of Rural Indigenous Evangelicals of Mexico) churches, but be an extension of the entirety of our relationships as believers in Jesus Christ. It is no secret that at the root of creation, we were created for relationship. Our primary relationship, as believers, is the vertical one between us and God. The other three horizontal relationships exist between us and our own self, us and other humans and finally, between us and the rest of creation. Where humanity failed in disobedience, Christ redeemed hope for these relationships in His death, burial and resurrection.

In regard to relationships, this past spring and summer, Deb and I had the privilege of being part of the <u>West Virginia</u> <u>Baptist Convention's (WVBC) missionary intern program by</u> hosting two interns for five weeks. Additionally, engaging with teams from <u>Fairmont State University Baptist Campus Ministries</u> (BCM), Alderson Broaddus University, <u>Oakwood Baptist Church</u>

Philippines - Missionary Update

One of the things I missed while in Asia was Autumn. I grew up in West Virginia and the state has some truly phenomenal fall seasons. I even love the bareness of the trees as winter begins because I understand the process is necessary for the new, vibrant season of spring. It was difficult to describe to people in the areas where trees only lose their leaves as new foliage is coming on.

I have come to the decision that my season has been, and still is, changing.

I will be retiring from International Ministries (IM) on October 31, 2019. I felt I needed to change my focus two years ago when I returned from the Philippines. I was excited to explore the new responsibilities of working with IM while living among my family in West Virginia and visiting several times a year with our partners in Asia. But now I realize my season as a missionary overseas is coming to an end. In other words, just like the trees, I need to make a break and strengthen my work with ministry here in the United States.

I have some deputation commitments before the end of October, but my focus will soon be on my home church, <u>Philippi</u> <u>Baptist Church (Union)</u>, and specific local and international ministries that I support as an individual.

I have been blessed with an amazing Missions Partnership Team, including Rev. Dick Hepler, Rev. Dana Gatewood, Mrs. Sandy Phares, Mrs. Jeanie Phillips, Rev. There is not sufficient space to identify each of the impactful ministries that took place this summer; however, WVBC churches served as an integral part of **embracing** the people of our CICEM family and for that we are grateful. Our teaching and preaching is always undergirded with the idea of the restoration of these fundamental relationships. The connections we have with our brothers and sisters in West Virginia are essential in developing a deeper connection with of our brothers and sisters here in Mexico. We ask for your continual prayers and financial support as we attempt to **embrace** the call of God in our lives.

Mill Creek: Modeling a Multi-Generational Approach

Mill Creek Baptist Church (Good Hope) is located at



Leroy, in a bend of the Spencer Road (Route 33), roughly half-way between Spencer and Ripley. Its redbrick building and nearby parsonage are not all that different from many a rural church in a state filled with rural churches. No, to see the difference at Mill Creek. you would have to look closer. The first clue would be the parking lot. Arrive late on a Sunday morning even for Sunday School and you might find yourself parking in the grass.

On any given Sunday morning, the lot is full, the pews are packed and the church is bustling with people of all ages.

Only a few minutes spent with the healthy, joyful crowd inside lets you know something is very right here. The normal accoutrements one would expect to attract a younger crowd (technology, projector, screen, praise band or praise music) are notably absent. The service is traditional in style and structure (church choir, hymns, opening assembly, Sunday School). So, what is different? Why are all of these people here?

Not long into the pre-Sunday School assembly, you begin to notice a difference. The children are all summoned to the front. As the crowd of young worshipers gather, an older adult pulls a box out from under one of the chairs on the platform. It has been there, unnoticed, the whole time. It is heaped full of drums, cymbals and noise makers of all shapes and sizes. Each of the children equips themselves with a selection or two from the box, and they begin to sing - and drum, tap and thump - a simple song praising the Lord. The congregation joins in and urges them on. At the end of the song, the noise makers are chucked back in the box, and the children quietly return to their seats. After this, the day mostly goes on as expected. There are classes for all ages - and I must say, the children's area looks pretty exciting, using a rotational station approach. And at the end of the day, more children come to the front to lead the church in its benediction - everyone raising their hands and crying, "Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord!"

More could be said about their approach, including their youth choir, youth Sundays and other activities. However, the main difference in this church is their non-traditional attitude and multi-generational approach. The message? Everyone belongs. Everyone is important. Regardless of age.

Local churches began donating nonperishable items to be delivered to the area. As donations were delivered to Parchment Valley Conference Center, local business owners in Jackson County called and said they wanted to help. After packing the rental truck full, Joe, with a trembling voice recalled June 23, 2016, and how his own community was devastated by the 100-year flood. "Lives were lost and families were
