Will You Hold the Rope?

In his inaugural address before the Baptist Missionary Society in 1792, William Carey famously preached, "Expect great things from God; attempt great things for God!" As we embark on a new year, we hope to reemphasize Carey's challenge as we expect and attempt great things for God over our next decade of Doing Christ's Work Together.

By this point, I hope you have heard about **Vision 2020**. Vision 2020 is designed to help us look back, celebrating all that Christ has done over the course of our rich 155 years of ministry together, but it is also designed to help us look forward as we anticipate all that Christ may want to do in and through us over the next decade. As we expect and attempt as a West Virginia Baptist Convention family, we have already seen some exciting new initiatives kick off this year.

Mentoring for Pastoral Excellence: This program was started as a result of several younger pastors indicat-

ing a desire to be mentored by someone more seasoned in ministry. Statistics show the average tenure of a pastor is only six years before they face burnout.

Leadership Development: Another statistic reveals the average age of a pastor in the United States has risen from 44 to 54, with only one in seven being under the age of 40. Yet, we are seeing incredible young leaders emerge in our churches, having been discipled and trained through Baptist Campus Ministries and/or our West Virginia Palmer Seminary program. To facilitate further opportunities for development, both the Church Ministry Intern Program and the Missionary Intern Program were established to help young adults discern their long-term calling to ministry as well as

to give churches the opportunity to benefit from their leadership.

New Church Development: Together, we have planted 18 churches over the last 20 years, yet there are still thousands of people within our communities who are virtually unreached with the gospel. It has been exciting to watch the impact of some of our recent church plants, especially those that are considered non-traditional or those that have been planted among other ethnicities. With an increasing diversity in our state, the opportunities for new church plants are only going to grow. In response to this, we are once again reemphasizing new church development and have established a fund that can help new churches get started. We are also working with churches interested

in re-planting, aimed at infusing life back into a declining congregation.

Carey knew no matter what he attempted, he could not do it alone. Prior to the formation of the Baptist Missionary Society, encircled by a group of fellow association pastors, Carey shared his vision of taking the gospel to India, likening it to a rescue mission into a deep, dark well. His invitation to his fellow pastors was, "I will go down if you will hold the rope." The pastors agreed to become rope holders, forming the Baptist Missionary Society to send and support the missionary enterprise, and William Carey led a small team that traveled to India, where they spent the rest of their lives planting churches, translating the Bible and reaching thousands with the gospel.

As we consider the exciting opportunities that lie before us, we are also in need of churches and individuals to hold the rope. We have mentors, young leaders and prospective church

planters ready to attempt great things for God. We also have exciting opportunities through Camp Cowen, the Bobby Wood School of Christian Studies and the other ministries we do together. However, as Mike Sisson shared at our Annual Meeting, over the last decade we have effectively exhausted our reserves - essentially relying upon the rope holders of previous generations. Thus, we are now in need of new rope holders who are willing to support these ministries going forward. So as each of you read this article, I want to ask: "Will you hold the rope?"

A few weeks ago, the Executive Board passed a budget that has the potential to be our first budget in a decade that no longer requires us to draw from reserves. If just 200 individuals agree to become rope holders, we anticipate our budget will be fully supported. Over the last month we have

already seen nearly 50 individuals sign up.

Additionally, if we reach our goal of 2,000 rope holders, we will not only reach our budget, but we will also be able to start rebuilding our reserves to a healthy enough level to carry us through the next decade of ministry together.

I want to invite you to become a rope holder by supporting the ministry we do together with a gift of at least \$20 a month. You can sign up to be a rope holder through our website, the card enclosed with this newsletter or by contacting your area minister. We are expecting great things from God this year! As we attempt great things for Him, will you help us by holding the rope?

It would be a year-round center where people could retreat from their everyday routines and responsibilities and find a beautiful setting in which

heart, mind and soul could be inspired to new heights of worship, discipleship and service. Shortly afterward, his vision for a year-round conference center became a reality, with the support of many volunteers, prayers and donors.

Now, as we spring into 2020, God's presence at Parchment Valley Conference Center continues to bring great blessings. Recently, we completed our 7th Annual Jackson County Hunting Heroes event at Parchment Valley. Hundreds of volunteers were present, along with 25 veterans and

their local guides. One of our new leaders, Cole Moore, a recent graduate of Marshall University, participant in Baptist Campus Ministries and Brothers' Keeper alumni, led worship in the dorms and truly blessed the camp.

A first-time hunter, guest Thomas Jenkins, president of West Virginia Paralyzed American Veterans and a combat veteran who lost both legs in the Vietnam war said, "Parchment Valley was a great place to be." He often encourages others going through a traumatic event in their life to "Go do something!"

In 2020, more than 10,000 people will enter the gates of Parchment Valley Conference Center. The vision is cast and the Lord tells us in James 1:22-25, "Do not merely listen to the word,

and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says" (NIV).



The Vision of Dorothy Santrock

Even among those who never personally met her, Dorothy Santrock continues to be revered by many throughout our West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC) family. Anyone who has visited Parchment Valley Conference Center has likely

attended a meeting, class or conference inside the building that now bears her name. The Santrock Education Center was dedicated as part of Vision 2000, a WVBC campaign that raised over \$2.1 million. Dorothy played a significant role in that.

Referring to the original vision of Parchment Valley - a place "where lives are changed" through higher education and leadership development - Dorothy expressed her excitement at the building's

dedication service by referring to it as "a dream come true." She went on to say:

"There were those who many years ago had the vision of a Conference Center for the West Virginia Baptists. They were people who worked tirelessly to secure this site and began the development, one building at a time ... because

of the efforts of many, it has been our joy for many years to share the "Parchment Valley experience.'"

That "Parchment Valley experience" is still being enjoyed as the Santrock Education Center now serves as the home to our West Virginia Palmer Seminary program, the Bobby Wood School of Christian Studies and various

retreats and conferences for our WVBC family. It also serves as the home for a Ripley church plant, is a frequently requested location for weddings and also opens its doors for numerous community events.

Former executive minister, Lloyd Hamblin, described Dorothy as "a no-frills person whose spiritual waters and grace ran really deep." He also added two words to his description that might be viewed as opposites: generous and frugal. He explained:

"An example of her generous side was seen during the Vision 2000 campaign. The result of that campaign was we raised \$2.1 million toward a goal of \$1.5 million. There were hundreds of small and larger gifts. There were at least seven gifts between \$25,000 and \$75,000. There were two gifts that totaled over \$500,000. One of those was from Dorothy and she inspired the second one. I am convinced the second gift would not have been made without her influence and example."

But he also described her as being frugal. Her modest living and meticulous accounting of finances made a big impression on people. It even led to the decision to construct the Santrock Education Center using volunteer labor, saving the convention around \$200,000 in expenses. Lloyd added, "She saved wherever she could so it could be given away."

However, Dorothy's legacy goes far beyond Parchment Valley. Her generosity and frugalness made her an excellent treasurer for the West Virginia American Baptist Women's Ministries (ABWM), where she served in that role for over 37 years.

It was in that role that Janey Carrico, former executive board member for ABWM, first met Dorothy. Initially, Janey was intimidated by how business-minded and thorough Dorothy was with everything, but eventually that intimidation dissolved after she gained a sense of her humor.

"She was a gem," Janey described. "There was nobody that did not like her. She was subtly funny, she was wise, and she was a really good mentor."

Another former ABWM member, Debbie Higginbotham, described Dorothy as having an incredible vision with a plan for how to bring that vision to completion. "She engaged the women of the state using her precious humor," Debbie explained, "but she was also consistent and forward thinking."

One example of Dorothy's humor that many of the women remember was she consistently brought a sock to each event that she passed around to raise money for national projects. "I don't think there was ever a project that was not fully funded with that sock," Janey recalled. "That was probably due to Dorothy's ability to cast vision as well as her willingness

to complete the funding of projects out of her own pocket." That willingness was also seen in Dorothy's establishment of an endowment which still provides income for ABWM to this day.

In addition to her work at the state level, Dorothy was also active in women's ministry at her home church, Charleston Baptist Temple, where she also served as

the church organist and piano teacher. Due to her vision and leadership, she was coveted by nearly every board and committee, and she served numerous terms as a trustee on the WVBC Executive Board, the Camps and Conference Board of Directors and the Budget Committee. She also served on boards for various community organizations.

It is because of rope holders like Dorothy Santrock that we are able to *Do Christ's Work Together*. Her vision and leadership had a direct impact on other rope holders for Parchment Valley, for ABWM and for the WVBC. Her vision is also still being realized in the lives of individuals all throughout our convention family.

As we enter into this new decade of ministry together, we are grateful for the men and women of previous generations who have laid the groundwork for us. We continue to reap the benefits of the labor of individuals like Dorothy Santrock and others who contributed to Vision 2000.

As we enter into Vision 2020, would you join us in laying the groundwork for the next generation? May God continue to raise up people who are as faithful to the Lord as Dorothy Santrock was!

West Virginia (WV) Hope is a new ministry created in 2019 by former WV American Baptist Women's Ministries' (ABWM) president, Debbie Higginbotham, as an alternative to

the former White Cross program. The national ABWM removed White Cross from their jurisdiction and transferred it to an International Ministries' (IM) project. Debbie was inspired by the Herald of Hope Chapel Car that once ministered to West Virginians through the railroad system. Herald of Hope founded or helped to found many churches in our state.

WV ABWM groups now have the choice of an IM White Cross project, the WV Hope Project or both, if they so choose. Each year there will be several ministries chosen by the WV ABWM first vice-president and

her committee. Among the ministries chosen each year for assistance from our organization, Weirton Christian Center will be perpetual. Anyone wishing to submit a ministry for consideration should contact Libby Young at el.young@aol.com.

This first year of the program, Weirton Christian Center, Baptist Campus Ministries, the Gabriel Project and Star Club (an afterschool ministry) were selected and presented to the associations and local WV ABWM groups. The response to the program

has been very good as the ladies involved are more than pleased to be able to lend help and support to the in-state programs.

A contest was sponsored for the creation of a logo for WV Hope, and LaAnna Blake designed the winning entry at right. She described the sketch by saying, "sometimes we are in a position to reach down and help others and sometimes we are in a position that we need to reach out to others for help."

The results of this first year of the WV Hope Ministry will not be available until

late 2020. We are, however, optimistic about the success of the project based solely upon input from the WV ABWM membership-at-large.

Margaret Ernestine Mitchell: Missionaries Could Not Have Found a Better Advocate

Margaret Ernestine Mitchell, more affectionately known as Ernie, was a longtime member of Meadow Grove Baptist Church (Hopewell). She served for more than 20 years as the church treasurer and was influential in starting their first American Baptist Women's Ministries' (ABWM) circle. Her involvement in the local women's circle led to her involvement in the state ABWM, where she became even more familiar with the ministries of the West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC). In addition to ABWM, she was active in the Historical Society, in supporting the initial development of Parchment Valley Conference Center, and in supporting missions.

"Her passion was always missions," said Dana Gatewood, her former pastor at Rainelle First Baptist Church (Hopewell). Ernie had transferred her membership near the end of her life and had continued to be active in ministry. Never married, she found companionship in opening her home to missionaries on furlough and providing them with homemade dinners. "Missionaries could not have found a better advocate than Ernestine."

Ernie was active in the Hopewell Association and she especially had a heart for young people. Goldie Treadway, now a member at Dunbar First Baptist Church (Kanawha Valley), recalls Ernie frequently supporting young people in their pursuit of college. "She gave whenever she could," Goldie recalls. "That is what she enjoyed!"

Dana had the opportunity to preach Ernie's funeral service and still remembers the service. "Her funeral was held at the church and I was watching as the hearse delivered her body for the 1:00 p.m. viewing. I smiled when I saw the casket she had picked out because it was the least expensive one they offered - thin wood covered with velvet, the casket used for people who didn't have much money. Even in death, Ernestine was still providing for missions."

In her last written will, Ernie chose to leave an endowment that is to be used "to support American Baptist missions overland and overseas." Each year, a portion of the interest from that endowment is divided to support overland and overseas missions. In 2019, she gave nearly \$5,500 to support Baptist Campus Ministries (BCM) and she gave an equal amount that was divided among our West Virginia International Ministries' missionaries: J.D. and Rhonda Reed (Bolivia), Keith and Deborah Myers (Mexico) and Juan and Denise Aragon (Mexico). Nearly two decades after her passing, Ernie is still providing for missions!

It is because of rope holders like Margaret Ernestine Mitchell that we are able to *Do Christ's Work Together*. If you are interested in learning how you can leave a legacy gift, please contact the WVBC office at 304.422.6449.

Mentoring for Pastoral Excellence

In January 2020, the West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC) launched a new mentoring initiative, *Mentoring for Pastoral Excellence*. The mentoring program takes place through a partnership between the West Virginia Baptist Convention and Renew Transformational Strategies with the focus of raising the level of excellence of pastoral leadership within convention churches, while at the same time providing a network of support and encouragement for the participating pastors.

The idea for the program was born from the convergence of many different streams all pointing to the need for a mentoring support system within our convention family. The first indicator for the need of such a program took place a few years ago when the WVBC Leadership Commission became concerned with the increasing number of pastors leaving the ministry after only two or three years. Fast forward five years with the advent of the ministry intern emphasis, the Leadership Commission again began to discuss the strong need of mentors for pastors. About this same time, the convention staff began sharing that many pastors were asking them about potential mentors. That was when Dr. Ed Rogers, owner of Renew Transformational Strategies and former senior pastor of South

Parkersburg Baptist Church (Parkersburg), came forward offering to donate access to his resources and knowledge in mentoring leaders to come alongside the convention to develop the concept of a *Mentoring for Pastoral Excellence* program.

The model adopted for the program was simple. Find pastors/leaders with long track records of leading churches to be healthy and growing, consistently leading with wisdom, walking in integrity and a heart for supporting other pastors. Once these mentors were recruited, pair them with pastoral leaders desiring to lead with excellence and willing to have someone walk alongside them in their life and ministry.

The mentoring program requires a commitment by leader and mentor to meet once a month for a minimum of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. During this meeting, 1/3 of the time will be used for a continuing education emphasis addressing topics such as self-awareness, leadership, boundaries and congregational dynamics. The remaining 2/3 of the time together will be framed by the leader based on their current context and needs. Additionally, there is a two-day conference planned that will bring all the leaders and mentors together for further networking and continued education. This is a pilot program that we hope to expand in the future to include all interested leaders.

Reducing the Risk: A Child Sexual Abuse Awareness Program

No child should ever experience the trauma of sexual abuse - and certainly never in a church or ministry setting. Sadly, there are hundreds of allegations made each year over incidents of child sexual abuse in faith communities. In fact, churches, by virtue of their open, welcoming nature, often attract predators looking for a low-resistance environment where they can prey on children.

At the same time, there are simple steps your ministry can take to protect children. We know you love kids. We do, too. Our hope is that no child - and no ministry - would ever fall victim to the devastating effects of sexual abuse. Koreen Villers, director of Discipleship for the West Virginia Baptist Convention, has been trained to provide training and assistance to your church to help keep kids safe in your ministry. Together, your leaders and volunteers will discover what they can do to protect the kids they love.

Emmanuel Baptist Church (Kanawha Valley) offered the training to their paid staff and volunteers in their children and youth ministries. Debbie Shadowen, children's director, at Emmanuel Baptist Church had this to say about the *Reducing the Risk* Training.

I took over as children's director a year ago and started researching our safety policy. I discovered training had not been done for several years and some volunteers had some questionable actions. Nothing illegal or immoral, but I had some concerns. I scheduled the Reducing the Risk training to protect our youth and children as well as the volunteers working with them. We have since began doing background checks on all our workers and have rewritten our safety policy. The training gave our volunteers some great insights as well as making them aware of situations that could cause them problems, even when done with the best of intentions. We have since had a second training for new volunteers and others who missed the first training. Our next step is final approval of our rewritten safety policy which we will require volunteers to sign off on and perhaps add additional steps if the policy is not followed.

Von Edwards, associate pastor of youth and young adults at Fifth Avenue Baptist Church (Guyandotte) sponsored a *Reducing the Risk* training and had the following to say.

God gave us the blessing to be stewards of young people in our communities and it is our job to make sure they are safe and protected. With this training we are not only learning how to be better stewards, but we are also learning how we can best love our hurting world.



Lubeck Community Baptist Church: A Family of Families

We continue our look at various churches in the area by

turning our focus to Lubeck Community Baptist Church (Parkersburg). There is something both inviting and comfortable about worshipping at Lubeck. The sermons are good, the atmosphere relaxed and informal, the music uplifting and the people are friendly. There are some subtle differences at Lubeck. For one, they don't "pass the plate." There is a box in the back of the sanctuary for those who would give, and it would be possible for you to not even find it for a couple of Sundays. According to pastor, Mark Houser, one of the regular questions new people ask is where the money comes from ... "I see the numbers from last week's offering in the bulletin, but I was here and don't remember you taking one."

There are no committees and just one board (trustees). The structure has been kept intentionally simple, "so that we don't get bogged down with it." The people are organized in teams formed to fulfill ministry ideas. It would

be truthful to say the church is both ministry centered and outwardly focused. For example, during school months the church sends a "missionary" team to McDowell county to minister in some underserved areas there. Likewise, every month a team goes to Ravenswood to minister to the poorest of that community, a ministry that began as a partnership with another church.

Every Sunday, shortly into the worship time, the church hits the pause button and stops for a time of fellowship and

snacks, which seems both odd, yet biblical! See Acts 2:42 - after all, we've never done it that way before ... but my teenager loves it. Lubeck, it would

but my teenager loves it. Lubeck, it would seem, is comfortable doing things just a little differently.

Founded in September of 2000, the church began as a Bible study with thirteen in attendance and has grown to a robust congregation of 330 members, with over 200 in average worship attendance. For the first 16 years of their history, Pastor Mark - their founding pastor - was part-time. Now, retired from his secular job, he works full-time with the church. Just this year, the church added a youth director to their staff, and other changes are on the horizon. And God continues to bless - there were 43 new members in the most recent year, with 34 coming by baptism. In the new year, Pastor

Salem Hosts Jingle Jam "Unboxed"



First Hand Perspective on Political Unrest in Bolivia

Convulsions ... that is how Bolivians would describe the

recent political situations in their country, and frankly in all of North and South America in recent days. Late last October, the National elections for president were held, and the incumbent, Evo Morales, was running for a fourth (constitutionally illegal and democratically opposed) term as president. He had been in the office for 14 plus years. If you asked people on the street, they would say he had done some

positive things, but it was time for a democratic change. After the election, it was widely proven there was electoral fraud by his party to maintain their power, and a national civic strike began. In Santa Cruz, it was a very non-violent peaceful protest. But in other parts of Bolivia, it was much more tense as the supporters of the president and his party lashed out at the opposition. The strike literally shut down the country and would last three weeks, and it seemed there was no end in sight. During this time, due to a number of reasons, both we and International Ministries (IM) felt it best for us to return to the states until things stabilized. Then November 9, 2019, the president resigned and fled to Mexico. Soon after, based on the report of outside governments and auditors, the election was annulled and it was announced another would be held on May 3, 2020.

In the days since, we are pleased to share many positive things have happened. The interim president, Janine Añez, who was the next in line after many in the president's party resigned, has become the second female president in the history of Bolivia and she has wasted no time getting things ready for the new election. Many positive steps have been made to bring healing to the country and prepare for the next election to be free and fair for all the world to see. One change that has been a wonderful blessing to the ministry of the *Fundación Proyecto de Esperanza* (FPE), formerly known as the House of Hope, is that the government has lifted the need for visas for United States' citizens in an effort to open opportunities for tourism. They are also pursuing re-establishing a United States Ambassador in the country for the first time in 12 years.

We, the Reed family and Sarah Nash, want to say thank you for all your prayers during this time. The ministry of FPE is back to normal and we are looking forward to a busy 2020. In mid-December we were able to purchase a 30 passenger bus - a goal we have been working toward for two years - to help us do mobile medical and dental clinics as well as provide transportation for teams. We are eagerly waiting to see what will come of the new elections this year. We are sure whatever happens, the ministry of *Fundación Proyecto de Esperanza* will continue partnering with churches, pastors and ministry leaders to make a difference and provide the hope of Christ to people in Cochabamba and Santa Cruz.

Paul Fulks had a passion for missions. He believed

mission engagement changed lives and encouraged mission involvement and support. In addition to serving as a pastor for 18 years, he also served on staff with the West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC), first as the minister of Mission Support and later as an area minister. Following his retirement in 2005, he continued to serve in a volunteer role with both the WVBC and South Parkersburg Baptist Church (Parkersburg).

Upon his retirement, he and his wife, Judy, established a scholarship fund for "the purpose of helping persons interested in participating in a cross-cultural mission trip with needed funds for this experience." The fund was established with a sacrificial gift from Paul's retirement account. Quarterly, the fund is reviewed by the trustees and the accrued interest is distributed as scholarships to approved applicants. Priority is given to first-time applicants who demonstrate financial need. Since the scholarship fund was established, more than 250 people have received financial assistance for their mission trips.

John Simmons, former associate executive minister of Missions and Administration, remembered fondly, "Paul is the

one who took me on my first mission trip." There are dozens of individuals around the state who have made the same statement. John then added with even greater fondness, "And I had the pleasure of taking him on his last one."

Through the establishment of the Mission Trip Scholarship Fund, Paul and Judy Fulks continue to be rope holders for our WVBC family. Not only did they demonstrate a passion for missions in their time of ministry together, but they continue to demonstrate a passion through the ongoing support of their legacy gift. In 2020, six individuals have already been awarded a scholarship - four from Petersburg First Baptist Church (Eastern), who traveled to Nicaragua in January and two from New Baptist Church (Guyandotte) who will be traveling to Haiti in March.

The Paul and Judy Fulks Mission Trip Scholarships are awarded quarterly, with the next application deadline coming March 1, 2020. If you are interested in contributing an additional amount to this fund, you can do so by sending a check to the convention office and designating it toward the "Fulks Mission Trip Scholarship Fund." This fund has been used to help us reach people all over the world with the gospel. It is through rope holders like Paul and Judy Fulks that we are able to continue *Doing Christ's Work Together*.
