Now that is the Church

I would doubt that on March 1, 2020, anyone could have imagined the interruption to everyday life the coronavirus would cause. This means that it was not something that pastors and leaders of churches could have envisioned, let alone planned and prepared for. Seemingly overnight, the familiar and comfortable way we functioned as a church came to an abrupt halt. However, faced with a situation for which there existed no road map or guide, the churches of the West Virginia Baptist Convention quickly rose to meet the challenge. The great British preacher, G. Campbell Morgan, once said, "It is a remarkable thing that the church of Christ persecuted has been the church of Christ pure." I think we could easily apply G. Campbell's quote to the unusual time in which our convention family finds itself. In fact, if we use a classic definition of the word *persecute*, which is "to harass or annoy persistently," we have a relatively accurate picture of the persistent annoyance the church has experienced during this coronavirus pandemic! And just as G. Campbell alluded, the church has risen to the challenge and emerged even more united and focused on its mission!

Someone once said, "There is nothing like the local church when it's working right. Its beauty is indescribable. Its power is breathtaking. Its potential is unlimited." And I feel that is exactly what we have witnessed with our West Virginia Baptist family of churches! For the last eight or nine weeks, convention churches throughout the state have demonstrated remarkable resiliency and creativity. Churches have found many new ways to continue to faithfully communicate the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In 1918, another pandemic required churches to stop meeting in person. At that time, clergy would write out their weekly sermons and take them to the local newspaper to be printed. During this pandemic, pastors once again found new and productive ways to deliver their sermons. Some preached from the back of pickup trucks, some on the front porches of the church or their homes, others held drive-in services in the church parking lot using low-powered FM transmitters so people could listen through their car radios. Many moved services to online media platforms such as Facebook Live, Zoom, GoToMeeting and YouTube, delivering their messages from church sanctuaries, rooms in their home and outdoor venues with nature as a backdrop. And the results have been incredible as people who had perhaps been away from the church for a while or had never

attended church at all were able to hear and be transformed by the love of God communicated through His Word!

However, pastors and churches did not stop there. Many went on to add daily online devotions and Bible studies, providing much needed hope and encouragement to people as they faced the stress and concern of uncertain days. They proved to the watching world that the "church" was not a building, but a community of believers - the Body of Christ - as they fed people in need, communicated with those who were homebound or lived alone and provided grocery shopping and pharmacy trips for people who were more at risk or restricted in their ability to travel. Discipleship became a *family* word instead of a *church* word as the home replaced the Sunday School in the Christian education of children and teens. Throughout this time, churches developed unique and interactive online programs specifically designed to engage children and teens in God's Word at home.

It is amazing how quickly our pastors and church leaders have gone from "problem solvers" to "opportunity finders!" This is the point we find ourselves in at this stage of the pandemic battle. As plans are being made for churches to safely begin in-person worship and ministry, it is taking place through the lens of newfound possibility! Our focus has moved beyond the immediate circumstances to the anticipation and expectancy of what can be. Questions like what have we learned and of all we discovered what do we want to continue in the future? For example, how do you stay connected with the new people you engaged online and bring them into the loving presence of your faith community? Evaluating how we did things before and asking ourselves can we do them differently or even better? Even amid this crisis, God has given us a fresh opportunity to grow in grace and effectiveness as the church. The task before us is not to return to the comfort and complacency of the past, but to bring the same level of determination and creativity that inspired us during the time of quarantine with us as we move into the future. Even once the crisis of this virus passes, the urgency of communicating the Gospel is perhaps greater than ever! It will be exciting to see what comes next!

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

Mentoring for Pastoral Excellence

When the West Virginia Baptist Convention, in partner-

ship with Renew Transformational Strategies, launched its new Mentoring for Pastoral Excellence initiative, the hope was that it would inspire, encourage, support and strengthen networks between experienced pastor-mentors and the gifted younger pastorleaders in our churches. Nowhere on our radar was the unexpected pandemic that would greatly impact Convention churches just two months later. However, in hindsight, the timing proved to be a God-moment and His

hand in the program becomes more evident every day.

Shortly after the stay-at-home order was announced by Governor Jim Justice, I spoke with one of the pastor-leaders participating in the mentoring program. He commented that it had really been great to have a mentor while trying to navigate the next steps of moving his church to online services and learning to minister in a radically different way. Then he added a very important observation, he and his mentor were able to share ideas and to learn from one another. This is key because the beauty of a successful mentoring relationship is best revealed when the learning and support flows both ways between the

mentor and the leader.

Recently, I spoke with Derek Hall, pastor of Old Greenbrier Baptist Church (Greenbrier-Raleigh). Derek's mentor is Bill Brown, senior pastor of Vienna Baptist Church (Parkersburg). I asked Derek if he would be willing to share his thoughts about the program and the mentoring relationship with Bill. Derek wrote, "Bill and I decided the first book we would cover would be Canoeing the Mountains because I have considered 'leadership' to be one of my weak areas. It was an amazing look at 'adaptive leadership' and I learned a great deal, not only from the material, but also from Bill's experience, wisdom and insightful questions! What I didn't know when I chose the book was that I would be living out that very process (as all of us have been) over the past few months. Bill has been a great comfort to me in navigating these "off the map" issues we've all been trying to address. Knowing he's praying for me and that I can bounce ideas off of him at any time has been a wonderful point of dependability in a rather chaotic and uncertain time."

My hope and dream as Executive Minister is that every pastor of every stage of ministry will be able to be connected with a mentor so they can experience the support, encouragement and mutual learning such as is taking place in this *Mentoring for Pastoral Excellence* initiative. Convenient hybrid courses meet for seven weeks with two and a half day residencies at Parchment Valley Conference Center. We are now offering more courses than ever

(including summer courses), which allow you to graduate in quicker time without traveling away from home.

In past years, we have been limited in the number of students we can admit without a bachelor's degree. However, our accrediting body, the Association of Theological Schools, now allows us to develop our own policy in this situation. So, beginning with the fall semester, graduates of the School of Christian Studies may now be considered for admission without an under-

graduate degree. This eliminates one of the largest hurdles many of our potential students have faced.




JOHN PARSONS

The Legacy of P.W. and Dora Johnson


Located in Northview Cemetery, in New Martinsville, is a very ordinary headstone that simply bears the name "Johnson." If you were to stop long enough to read the equally ordinary grave markers, you would find they belong to P.W. Johnson (1898-1975) and Dora M. Johnson (1904-1995).

Born in Kentucky, P.W. Johnson was a builder and became very successful in the mining industry. Dora Johnson was a loving wife and homemaker. They had no children.

The Johnsons were active members of New Martinsville First Baptist Church (Panhandle) and donated the land for its present structure. P.W. would serve in a variety of roles at the church. He also served as president of the West Virginia Baptist Convention in

1954. To the best of anyone's knowledge, Dora was active, but never held any leadership positions in the church.

After P.W.'s death in 1975, Dora continued to live in New Martinsville for the remainder of her life. She went home to be with her Lord in 1995 at the age of 91. Hence, the headstone and grave markers in Northview Cemetery.



Dora Johnson is yet to be fully realized. You see, when Dora

passed away, she left a significant gift from the estate to the West Virginia Baptist Convention. One of the purposes of that gift was to support the planting of new churches. As we renew our commitment to plant new churches in West Virginia, how fitting that each new church is a tribute to the Johnson's desire to bring glory to God, not themselves.

So, the very ordinary headstone and grave markers in Northview

Cemetery, I'm sure, suited P.W. and Dora Johnson just fine. That's because, instead of monuments, they were content with a recognition far greater ... "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Missionary Internship Program Cancels Summer Travel

The **Missionary Internship Program** provides individuals with the opportunity to explore their long-term calling to missions by pairing them up with a long-term missionary partner for



a three to six-week internship. In addition to their international experience, they have the opportunity to participate in several training events on the topics of mission theology, culture, conflict resolution and much, much more. Last year's pilot group of interns spent their summers in Mexico, India and Lebanon and they provided very helpful feedback on

how the program could be improved. Those improvements were made and six more interns were chosen to participate in this year's program.

Over the last six months, Becca Martin, Bree Fleming, Kali Wilkinson, Beth Perry, Shyra Freeman and Emily Fordyce devoted several evenings a month to preparing for their respective internships this summer. Their training was coordinated by Todd McClure, Minister of Missions and Finance, and included several area directors and global servants from International Ministries. Also new to this year's program was a partnership with Midwest Ministry Development, which administered crosscultural adaptability, conflict resolution and personality testing. Each of these tests is something that would be required if any

one of these girls decided to pursue full-time missions any further.

At the start of the program, nobody could have imagined COVID-19 would bring international travel to a halt. However, because that became the case, it became increasingly clear both for the safety of our interns and their respective destinations, their plans for international travel would need to be canceled. Becca was planning to spend her summer in the Philippines, Bree in Myanmar, Kali in Mexico, Beth in Japan and Shyra and Emily in Honduras. While many of the decisions were made by international travel restrictions, others had to be made just out of respect and concern for the communities where they would be serving.

One of the primary lessons taught throughout the program was the need to remain flexible. That lesson was definitely realized with this year's group. Our prayer is that God opens a door in the near future for each of these girls to finish their internship. If not, they will be allowed to participate in next year's internship program and will have already completed several of the requirements.

One thing COVID-19 has reminded us is the harvest remains plentiful and the laborers remain few, and we need more individuals, like these girls, who are willing go into the harvest. Please join us in praying that God continues to guide each of them and that He continues to raise up even more individuals who are willing to go and reach the world with the good news of the Gospel.

Virtual Mission Trip Series

One of the greatest benefits of a short-term mission trip is that it provides individuals with the opportunity to come alongside a full-time missionary to learn about their ministry and gain a heart for what God is doing in that particular part of the world. Oftentimes, a short-term mission trip has a major impact on one's long-term calling. In the immediate week following the implementation of travel restrictions within the United States, five mission trips had to be canceled or rescheduled. In the weeks and months that followed, nearly a dozen other trips also had to be canceled.

This led to the idea of hosting a series of "virtual mission trips" to provide people with ongoing opportunities to connect with our missionaries around the globe. To date, well over 100 people have participated in these trips and several have requested these trips continue throughout the summer. There have also been numerous pastors and churches from other regions of the country that have participated.

Ministry in a Time of Quarantine


In Bolivia, the entire country is under a governmentally mandated quarantine, and in some cities (Santa Cruz being one of them) the military is "encapsulating the city" to help ensure that all are abiding by the rules of quarantine. In Santa Cruz and other hot spots for COVID-19, the total quarantine lifted at the end of May, but for other areas it is continuing. This plays out as each household can only have one person on one morning a week travel to get supplies, food and pay their bills. As you can imagine for a country that is filled with people who make their living in a day-to-day wage from an informal shop or trade work, this means that for months they haven't had any income at all, and there is an overwhelming feeling of anxiety about what the future holds. This is mixed with a healthy distrust of those in power and a national election hanging in the balance.

Churches and ministries like ours have been doing everything in our power to minister to our communities, but with limited contact and no transportation it has been almost impossible. For Fundación Proyecto de Esperanza (FPE) also known as the Project of Hope Foundation, the mobile medical and dental clinics have been canceled. Also, all leadership development training and Bible studies have moved online. Many we

work with do not have access to this technology. So, what does a foundation do?

After prayer and talking with leaders, the foundation came up with a plan. The husband of one leader is in the national police, so Fundación Proyecto de Esperanza began working with him to help provide much needed resources to the churches and communities that FPE serves. FPE provides an offering to each church pastor to serve their community in a way they view necessary. One particular pastor used their offering to buy food for their entire church family as well as all of their neighbors in a very poor indigenous neighborhood. So far, we have been able to be in contact with all 13 of our supported churches and ministries

As many of you know, our family decided to return to the United States in late April to begin our year of home assignment. We have already begun scheduling visits to churches and individuals that will begin in late August 2020. We would love to come and visit your church or group. bus) were sitting in the parking lot, back from gathering the children in the surrounding communities and bringing them to church. It clearly was a priority and it was also clearly bearing fruit. I have noted on several occasions the large percentage of their congregation made up by youngsters.

Then, the pandemic arrived. Suddenly, we all received word it was no longer safe to "bring them in." I imagine this was

difficult and harsh news to us all, but especially to a church that is so children-minded. What would they do now? Isn't it interesting how adversity sometimes brings out the best in people? Sand Fork, no longer able to bring the children in, instead sent the vans (and the bus) to take food out - for the children surely still needed them. And with the food, came not only the love of Jesus, but also the story of Jesus - included in Bible lessons and children's activities prepared and sent along with the meals. Each week, the church has made sure some 60 kids are fed - spiritually and physically. Besides the

church-prepared food, they have also served as a distribution center for the school prepared meals as well, making sure the meals made it to the kids who needed them. As they look forward to returning to church, Sand Fork Baptist Church continues to care for the kids and also provides Bible study and worship for all ages through electronic media as well.
