Spring is Coming!

It has certainly been a long, dark winter. In a sense, it has been a long, dark winter since March 2020. It is a proven fact the shortened days and lower light conditions that mark the winter season have a depressing effect on many people. During these last twelve months, the light of positivity and hope has dimmed for many people, making the effect of the stay-at-home measures to combat the spread of the virus even more difficult. People are experiencing cabin fever on steroids. So, using the imagery of a long winter as an analogy for the past 12 months may even be an understatement for many. So much isolation, frustration, fear and uncertainty created a long, dark season that has impacted many people emotionally, physically and even spiritually.

However, the good news is spring is coming! Spring brings with it new hope, new beginnings and new life. With spring, that which has lain dormant,

restrained by the grip of winter's darkness breaks forth in newness and life! This is a parable of sorts for the promise of hope, of new beginnings and the newness of life we have in Jesus Christ. His resurrection establishes this hope. It brought the victory of life over death. The power of light over darkness. The promise of hope in the midst of despair. The presence of joy, regardless of the circumstances. And this is the encouragement we all need in this season.

It is Christ's remarkable gift of joy that creates in us the assurance of the hope that shines the light which chases away the darkness winter has cast upon us. Joy is not the same as happiness. Happiness is derived from happenstance or circumstance. In fact, they share the same root word "hap," an old Norse word meaning chance or luck. In other words, happiness is conditioned upon the chance that everything is going well. Jesus did not promise things would always go well. Jesus said, "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). How can we take heart in the time of trou-





ble? It is because Jesus promised us joy. A sense of security, hope and wellbeing independent from any outward pressure or circumstance, because its source comes from our relationship with Jesus Christ. Jesus compares our relationship with Him to the way branches are given life through their connection to the main vine. He follows that analogy with these words, "These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full" (John 15:11). The source of our joy is not dependent on happenstance, because it is found in our unalterable relationship with Jesus Christ. "The joy of the Lord is your strength" (Nehemiah 8:10).

Although trouble has the power to take away our happiness, we do not have to let it rob us of our joy in Christ. Charles Stanley once said, "As Christians, we should never think it's our job to make sure everything works out the way we want. Instead, our confi-

dence should be that the Lord will meet our needs as He desires. Then we can rejoice in Him, letting joy become an immovable foundation that undergirds our lives."

The old hymn, Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus says it well:

O soul, are you weary and troubled? No light in the darkness you see? There's light for a look at the Savior And life more abundant and free.

Turn your eyes upon Jesus; Look full in His wonderful face; And the things of earth will grow strangely dim In the light of His glory and grace.

Will You Hold the Rope?

In 2019, when the *Rope Holder* initiative was launched, no one could have imagined the magnitude of the global pandemic that was soon to follow. Nor could anyone have imagined the financial impact that *Rope Holders* would have on our West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC) finances. Since the official launch of this initiative at the 2019 Annual Meeting, nearly 200 individuals have contributed more than \$90,000. It is because of *Rope Holders* that the WVBC finished financially in the black in 2020 for the first time in more than a decade.

In 2021, many of our ministries continue to be impacted by the restrictions brought about by COVID-19. This is especially true for Camp Cowen and Parchment Valley Conference Center. Because income opportunities will likely be limited for those ministries, *Rope Holders* will continue to be essential for carrying those ministries forward. In fact, *Rope Holders* will be essential for carrying all of our ministries forward!

When William Carey initially communicated his desire to take the gospel to India in the late eighteenth century, the challenge he gave his fellow pastors was he could only go "if they would hold the rope." *Rope Holders* are necessary for gospel ministry to flourish.

While there are millions in India who are in need of the gospel (which is why we are committed to our WVBC-India Partnership), there is also an increasing number within West Virginia who need the gospel. A recent survey (prior to COVID-19), indicated 89% of our state was unchurched. That number is likely higher now.

Rope holders are needed to fund our new church planting initiative. They are also needed to fund our intern program which is raising up the next generation of leaders. **Rope holders** are also used to help fund our educational opportunities, our mission training programs and our discipleship resources for people of all ages. Of course,

Rope Holders also help fund Camp Cowen and Parchment Valley.


Rope Holders help fund all of our WVBC ministries. With a new year also bringing about new



Annual Training Event Recap

The Annual Training Event has become a staple for our West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC) family over the last several years. Usually held at Parchment Valley Conference Center, hundreds of individuals typically gather for fellowship, worship and workshops tailored toward the various church offices. During a "normal year," participants are limited to just two workshops - one in the morning and one in the afternoon. However by this point, we all realize this is not a "normal year."

Forced to adapt, this year's Annual Training Event was moved online and took place over a series of three evenings during the first week of February 2021. With more than 200 participants, more than one-third of those surveyed indicated this was their first time attending the event. Not only did this digital option allow for greater involvement, but it also allowed people to participate in more than just the standard two





Building Intentional Community in the Workplace

The year 2020 was challenging on so many levels and the new year brings more of the same. My husband, Rich, is the lead pastor at South Parkersburg Baptist Church (Parkersburg). His recurring message for the last year has been to be the church outside the walls of our building. Get creative!

On the morning of November 28, 2020, during my quiet time, I felt God nudge me to ask my coworkers to a Bible study. For a few years, I had been feeling a shift in my soul, which included the desire to connect with my coworkers on a more spiritual level. We are nurses and healthcare workers in a neonatal intensive care unit. So that day, I extended an invitation to each of them to participate together in a Bible study via Zoom. With the pandemic and challenges of travel time, it was clear utilizing technology would be necessary for this to be possible.

The level of interest and different work schedules have led us to have two sessions each week. We are completing our

second study and planning a third. We meet at 8:30 p.m. for about an hour. Then comes the meeting after the meeting, when an opportunity is given for more sharing if desired. A session without tears is a rare thing and laughter is frequent.

We have a "worship leader" who loves to share links to music. Another gal says she is going to have children's church because of all the little ones popping in and out during our sessions. At this point we have 37 members in our Facebook group where loving messages and prayer requests are shared. For example, one coworker was almost hospitalized with COVID-19. Another requested immediate prayer for her 17-year-old sister, newly diagnosed with diabetes.

This has created an opportunity for us to walk a path together we would not have collectively walked before in these moments. There is a shared sense something more is going on here - more than just individuals sharing love and grace within a study group and a trickling out to others in our workplace. It is sharing and participating in God's kingdom. Beauty in the midst of COVID-19 ashes.

Feeding Sheep at Parchment Valley Conference Center

The purpose statement of Parchment Valley Conference Center (PV) was written by the Rev. James Cunningham in 1974. James was the director of PV at the time, and he wrote that PV was "to provide a setting where persons, as individuals and in community, may worship, study and reflect in relation to themselves, others and God." For over 50 years, this has been true of this place.

However, the pandemic caused us to re-evaluate that purpose - not the statement itself, but how we live it out. With restricted gatherings, the forced cancellation of camps and the inability for others to come to us, we realized we needed to go to others.

Jesus said to Peter in John 21:17, "Simon, son of John, do you love me? ... Feed my sheep."

This past season, a miracle happened through an urgent request of a widow at our local church. She simply asked that we go and find her son who was living in the wilderness and suffering from addiction. A group of us departed PV, bathed in prayer, and we found him, broken and in despair. We invited him to PV during the men's bow hunt retreat hosted by Dale Mason annualy, and it was there that we fed him, clothed him and provided him with shelter. It was a simple act of feeding that man a one-pound meal.

God took that one-pound meal and He began to multiply it, opening doors through relationships we have built over the years through disaster relief work. I was asked if I could help provide more people with meals, and you know my reaction: "Let's just feed people."

From that opportunity, food began to arrive at PV by the tractor-trailer load. Dozens of PV donors and local volunteers showed up, rolled up their sleeves and we began to feed ... and

feed ... and feed. Since that conversation in December 2020, we have distributed more than 131,000 pounds of FREE food!

Through the pandemic, the purpose of Parchment Valley hasn't changed, we just changed the way we live it out. Continuing to be a place "where lives are changed," we are grate-

ful for the way God has used us in this season. We look forward to hosting events and camps again as

restrictions are beginning to be lifted, but we also look forward to continuing to go out to others. Are you interested in helping feed His sheep? Contact me, I would love to tell you how you can support and serve alongside us!

We will continue to abide by all COVID-19 policies put in place by local authorities and the PV board. With a limited number of participants this year, you will want to register early to make sure you don't miss out!





Day-Traders of Long-Term Investors


As it relates to the stock market, a "day-trader" is an investor who jumps in and out of the market, often many times a
