Come Join Us for Our 156th Annual Meeting

Every year, the Annual Meeting of the West Virginia Baptist Convention family marks the launch of a new season of mission and ministry. Our theme for 2022 is *Intentionally Engaging Communities for Christ*. However, for a theme to have meaning and purpose it must be both clearly relevant to God's purposes in our world and deeply rooted in scripture.

As Christians, we recognize there is a great spiritual battle raging for the hearts and minds of men and women across our nation. We now find ourselves in a cosmic struggle between Christian truth and a morally indifferent culture. This spiritual wrestling match appears to be what the apostle Paul was alluding to when he wrote, "For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms" (Ephesians 2:12). Therefore, it comes as no surprise that the reality of non-Christians walking through the door on any given Sunday morning is highly unlikely. However, these are the very people Jesus loved and died on the cross to save.

Jesus knew His church would need to mobilize to be successful in reaching people just like these. Jesus said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:18-20). Four things in Jesus' command worth noting. First, Jesus reminds us He is sending us out under His authority. This means He is sending us out with His endorsement and empowerment. Second, He said, "go and make" not "come and hear." The phrase "go and make" has an intentionality about it. The need for the mission is urgent and the objective accomplishable. Third, we have a responsibility to evangelize and make disciples by teaching them to understand and live out the truths passed on to us in scripture. And lastly, we have the ultimate promise we will never go it alone. Jesus promises He will always be present with us and in us until the very end of time.

Embracing Jesus' command to go while acknowledging the growing difficulty of "engaging" people with the Gospel will require a willingness to meet them where they are. The apostle Paul addressed overcoming this challenge. He wrote, "I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, that I may share with them in its blessings" (1 Corinthians 9:22b-23). Paul is not sug-

gesting compromising the truth or embracing sin, he simply recognizes that to reach people he must first meet them where they are. That is our focus for 2022. Finding ways to remove barriers to reach people for Christ by meeting them where they are.

During this year's Annual Meeting you will hear the vision for how we can accomplish this by Doing Christ's Work Together. You will hear about microchurch initiatives. Think of these as hometown missionaries being sent from your local church into the mission field in your neighborhood to share the gospel with the people who live there. The truth is there are many people, who for a variety of reasons, do not and will not attend the local church, but desperately need Jesus Christ in their lives. Microchurches are about going and making disciples by meeting them where they are.

Another area we hope to be more intentional in is discipleship. Discipleship takes place in the home as well as the church. For example, scripture encourages parents to be active in discipling their children, "You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise" (Deuteronomy 6:5-7). However, grandparents have a role to play in discipleship too. In West Virginia, statistics indicate over 50% of grandparents are raising their grandchildren. While this is indeed a sad statistic, it also points to the need for grandparents to be active in discipling their grandchildren. Scripture speaks often of the important role of Biblical grandparenting. Moses instructed grandparents, "Only take care, and keep your soul diligently, lest you forget the things that your eyes have seen, and lest they depart from your heart all the days of your life. Make them known to your children and your children's children" (Deuteronomy 4:9).

These are only a few of the opportunities the Lord has before us in 2022.

Join us October 21-22 at Mount Vernon Baptist Church in Hurricane for a wonderful time of fellowship, worship, being challenged from God's word and listening for His vision for the WVBC family as we work together to build His kingdom for His glory!

Monty Foster, the pastor at Barboursville Baptist Church (Guyandotte), served as our worship leader. Monty did an incredible job of leading us, and it was during worship around the campfire that several men began pouring out their hearts, praying for healing and renewal.

We were also challenged by both of our weekend vespers speakers. Michael Hatfield, the pastor at Logan First Baptist Church (Logan-Mingo), reminded us on Friday evening to fear God and trust in Him. On Saturday evening, Patrick Vincent, the pastor at Willow Tree Baptist Church (Fairmont), rallied our men to join in an amazing and powerful circle of prayer, where we petitioned God with dozens of needs. Many of those prayers were answered that very same weekend!

One of those answered prayers came on Sunday morning when one of our first-time participants gave his heart to the Lord! Immediately following, we walked down to the river that runs alongside camp and celebrated as our new brother got baptized! It was a great way to conclude our weekend!



Cowen Cabin Upgrades Continue

Cabins are one of the most essential buildings at the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen as they provide a "home

away from home" during a stay at camp. Many of these well-used and well-loved cabins have been in need of extra attention. In the summer of 2020, the Adopt-a-Cabin program began restoring and updating the oldest camp cabins with new paint, light fixtures, outlets and curtains. Minor repairs were also made, along with interior and exterior cleaning.

It didn't take long in the restoration process before the critical need was identified for replacing windows and upgrading electrical service inside the cabins. As we've all come to know so well during the pandemic, proper air circulation is key to a safe guest experience. Keeping old windows in good repair is no easy task as finding replacement parts of rehabbing screens is difficult. With each cabin having six windows the cost of replacement adds up quickly across the 12 original-style cabins.

Broad Run cabin was the first (Broad Run pride does run deep) to receive donations toward the replacement of windows. As the summer continued Fairmont, Kanawha

Valley Association, Kanawha Valley Young People cabins also were adopted and new windows installed. Three more cabins

have windows on order with each set of six windows costing around \$2,600. What a blessing to watch God provide!

But God wasn't done with cabin renovations as David Withers, Rick Elkins and a few other volunteers worked on upgrading the electrical service in two cabins, providing a new circuit panel, conduit, wiring, lights, switches, heaters, smoke detector and five outlets per cabin. Seeing this important work moving ahead, donors have stepped forward to contribute to the purchase of supplies for more cabins totaling near \$1,000 in supplies for each cabin.

The continued financial donations and the countless volunteer hours are appreciated and we offer our gratitude for faithful supporters who allow these projects to take place and we look forward to continued work this fall and in the coming spring.



The Withers' Family: Helping People Meet Jesus


The West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen has been a place "where people meet Jesus and grow as His disciples in a community of faith" since 1943. The Withers' family has been involved since the initial formation of camp and has had six generations of family members involved.

Prior to 1943, A.B. Withers led annual revivals at nearby Camp Caesar. A.B. served on staff with the West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC). During one particular revival, his son, Gordon, and a few others were building a trail when they discovered a large rock formation that "would be a wonderful place for a campfire." Later, they discovered another area they thought would make a great vespers location. After sharing their findings with the WVBC board, the land was immediately purchased and the West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen was formed!

Gordon later directed the first camp in 1943. Two of his sons, Bob and Dick, served as part of the first camp staff. Dick served as the first camp lifeguard, and they both had the responsibility of preparing meals, building trails and continuing to clear away brush. Dick met his wife, Elizabeth, at camp and Bob's wife, Ruth, also served on staff as the first camp nurse.

Gordon's other son, Bill, was also involved. In later years, when camps were separated by age groups, Bill preceded his father as the director of Junior High 1 camp. Bill followed in the footsteps of his father and his grandfather by becoming a pastor. He served as a pastor within WVBC churches for more than 40 years, also serving as president of the West Virginia Baptist Historical Society.

Bill's son, David, and his wife, Barbara, are now active at camp and are members of Fifth Avenue Baptist Church (Guyandotte). David admits he was at one time intimidated by the spiritual heritage of his family wondering how he, as an electrician, could live up to their legacy. But recent years have provided him the opportunity to use his electrical skills to upgrade many of our buildings, provide lights for the ballfield and assist with many other projects. These upgrades were much needed and go a

long way in enhancing the quality of our camps. This summer, he also began rewiring many of our cabins, a project that is expected to take a few more years.

Each of David and Barbara's children have also attended camp, and several of their grandchildren, too. One of David's goals is to live long enough to take all of his grandchildren to camp, making sure they to know about their family's heritage.

The Withers' are just one of hundreds of families who have been involved at camp. However, their story reminds us that you don't have to be a pastor to leave a spiritual legacy. Within their family, they have nurses, lifeguards and electricians, all of whom have had an enormous impact! The West Virginia Baptist Camp at Cowen is grateful for their involvement as well as the thousands of other men and women who have volunteered their time over the past 78 years. It is because of their commitment and the diversity of our volunteers that we can be "a place where people meet Jesus and grow as His disciples as a community of faith."

Parchment Valley Bow Hunters Build New Crosses

In 1998, Parchment Valley (PV) began a relationship with a group of men united by two passions: God and bow hunting.

These two passions eventually birthed something much larger: an annual men's retreat and hunt. What began as a four-day event mostly built around hunting has now evolved into a six-day event that includes Bible study, prayer and the opportunity to build lasting relationships with other men. This annual event has increased our love not only for each other, but also for God!

In 2009, Frank Miller became the director at Parchment Valley. Frank is the master of developing deep friendships, and it did not take long for him to embrace our group of bow hunters. Not only did this friendship open the door for us to host our annual Bow Hunter Retreat at Parchment Valley, but it also provided us with other opportunities to serve. Frequently, our bow hunters come to Parchment Valley to host work parties, volunteering their time to pour concrete, patch fences, do electrical work and

just "help out." Many of our bow hunters have fallen in love with this place!

Fast forward to 2020, in the midst of a global pandemic, and God proved Himself to still be in control. Initially, it appeared

that our annual retreat would not happen. However, some changes were made and precautions were put in place, and we were still able to host our retreat with a smaller group. Then, in 2021, the ice storm of the century hit western West Virginia. Our bow hunters pulled together a group of men to render assistance

to Parchment Valley, removing dozens of fallen trees across the property. From this brief fourhour work party, another event sprung forth! God was moving us in a direction, and we simply did not realize it.

In May, a four-day work party and "turkey hunt" took place at Parchment Valley. I intentionally put "turkey hunt" in quotes because our hunting success was dismal, to say the least. However, the work we accomplished over those four days was tremendous! And it was there that God began to stir in us another project. Many years ago, Parchment Valley had a set of crosses that sat on the hill. Frank has long desired to see new crosses erected in their place. Well, on June 20th, the work began and by the end of July, a new set of crosses had been put in place. Our group loved being a part of this project!

You never know God's long term plan, but you must always be willing to get on board and ride it to the end. The Parchment Valley Bow Hunters have enjoyed our relationship with Parchment Valley. We hope each of you enjoy the new crosses!



The Reeds Return to Bolivia

After 15 months away, J.D., Rhonda and Nathan Reed have returned to Bolivia for the start of their third term.

The Reeds were scheduled to be in West Virginia for most of those months as part of their home assignment. A traditional term for International Ministries' (IM) global servants is four years on the field and then one year at home, re-raising support. For the Reeds, their home assignment began early due to both rising COVID-19 cases and political tension in Bolivia. In what would normally be a year full of church visits, their home assignment was a bit different.

It was originally J.D.'s idea to try a virtual mission trip. In the spring of 2020, this one-hour Zoom session provided them with the opportunity to provide a ministry update while most of our churches were not meeting in-person. This also opened the door for other global servants to host similar meetings, and the West Virginia Baptist Convention's (WVBC) Virtual Mission Trip Series became something that will likely continue for many years.

A few months later, they had another idea. Presented with the opportunity to receive a \$10,000 grant for the Fundación Proyecto de Esperanza (House of Hope), they invited individuals and churches to make 10,000 masks for students at Wheaton College. WVBC churches led the way in that effort and the grant was given. The House of Hope relies heavily on funds brought by short-term mission teams, but with all mission trips cancelled last year, that grant proved to be critical!

Later that fall, J.D. had another idea: hosting a disc golf tournament at Parchment Valley. J.D. serves as the IM coordinator for the Masters for Theological Studies in Latino/a Ministries (MTS) program through Palmer Theological Seminary. This program trains more than 60 students throughout the Latin American world, providing them with much-needed theological education. The well-attended disc golf event raised both funds and awareness, and it sparked one last creative fundraising idea.

The task of raising several hundred thousand dollars can easily be viewed as daunting, but when breaking down the cost of each student's need to participate in the MTS program, it was calculated to be around \$200 per month. This led to the creation of the Adopt-a-Student program, where churches, small groups and individuals could choose to "adopt" a seminary student for two years, providing a scholarship for their education. Making a major push this past summer, around half of the students were adopted. That means more support is needed!

For the Reeds, the last 15 months have been busy. Though they haven't physically traveled far, God has used them to accomplish a great work! Also during that time, they celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary, watched both of their daughters get married and reunited with many friends.

Please join us in praying for them as they enter their third term of missionary service.

Adopt-A-Student

Partnering to train Latin American Seminary Students for ministry

The MTS program has graduated 114 students since the start of the program in 2015. Today, it provides education to more than 60 students on three continents!



Top Per Capita Giving Churches

Every year, we as staff receive various statistical reports on our West Virginia Baptist Convention (WVBC) churches. When I received the report on the top 50 mission giving churches from last year calculated per capita, the amount of giving divided by the number of members, I was overjoyed to see Flint Chapel Baptist Church (Greenbrier-Raleigh) was #1 with \$816.67 per member given!

This church, which I began assisting in 2010 when their pastor began suffering from Alzheimer's disease, is unique in that it is a Methodist Church that by deed allowed the Baptist folk in 1912 to meet 25% of the time each month (we meet every 4th Sunday evening), while Sunday School is a combined service with both Methodists and Baptists.

Over the past 11 years, this church has been so generous in its mission giving not only to our WVBC family, but also to the local community. As with every church, they have lost several members in death to their heavenly reward. In August, they lost Betty Akers, who was our American Baptist Women's Ministries' president for years. But through it all, they have remained faithful to spread the gospel at home, around our state and throughout the world.
