Who is My Neighbor?

Who is my neighbor? That was the question the expert in the Mosaic law asked Jesus in Luke's Gospel. Of course, Luke explained that he only asked it because he wanted to justify himself. The lawyer knew that if he could narrow the scope of his responsibility to include only the people that he considered neighbors, he could easily reply to Jesus, "Oh, I have already done that." However, Jesus instead answered with a parable.

A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.' (Luke 10:30-35)

After telling the story, Jesus then asked the lawyer, "Which person would you say was the injured man's neighbor?" The one who showed mercy was the only logical response the lawyer could offer.

Bible scholar Warren Wiersbe explains that the decision to stop and assist the injured man was not as easy as it may sound. To begin with, there was no logical reason for the Samaritan to rearrange his plans to stop and assist a man who was likely considered an enemy or at the very least a stranger. Likewise, it didn't make sense to spend his own money on the injured man for the same reasons. On a practical note, the road from Jerusalem to Jericho was an extremely dangerous one. It was a difficult journey

because the elevation dropped 3500 feet in only 17 miles. It was known as the "Way of Blood" because of the blood which was so often shed there by robbers. There were many tight turns that created excellent hiding places for robbers to ambush travelers. One ploy used by thieves was to have someone pretend to be injured and when someone stopped to help them, they would attack and rob them. However, in spite of all these rational excuses the Samaritan took the time to stop. He made the sacrifice to spend his own money to help the injured man. He experienced the uncomfortableness and inconvenience of placing the man of his donkey and walking the rest of the way to Jericho. And he took the uncomfortable risk of stopping to help even though the robbers may be hiding nearby.

Jesus made his point clear: to love God with all of your heart, soul, mind and strength includes also loving your neighbor as yourself. And your neighbor is the person within your sphere of influence. This is why, as the West Virginia Baptist Convention family of churches, we have chosen to focus a second year on "Intentionally Engaging Communities for Christ." This year, we will highlight the word "community." Community can be defined as a group of people living in a particular local area or, as Jesus would say, "your neighbor." Communities can be friends, family members, co-workers, sports teams, ethnic groups, neighborhoods or anywhere people gather. These are the people in need of the hope and salvation Jesus can offer, and we have been called to be the person who shows them Christ's love.

During our **WVBC** Annual Meeting in Summersville on October 20-21, we will focus on how to effectively fulfill Jesus' calling to identify who our neighbors are and how we can intentionally engage them with the love of Jesus Christ. We have several workshops planned, as well as guest speaker Dr. Michael Beck, to help equip us. I hope you can join us!

This resulted in widespread flash flooding with water levels reaching as high as 22 feet. Letcher County, as well as several surrounding counties in southeastern Kentucky, were declared a natural disaster area. Meteorologists are deeming this flash flooding as a 1 -in-1000-year flooding event.

Through the generosity of the West Virginia Baptist Convention, many citizens have been blessed with the essentials to carry on with daily life as we recover from the flooding. Frank Miller was able to mobilize donations from churches within the Convention to Letcher County within days of the flooding event. This outpouring of love through essential supplies, gift cards and, most importantly, prayers, has helped ease the burden on hundreds of families working to move forward following July 28.

We could never express our appreciation enough for the West Virginia Baptist Convention and the kindness shown to Letcher County. They have been heaven-sent and shown God's goodness through their love in action.

Preparing for 60 Years of the Raleigh-Rockcastle Association Camp

Next summer will mark the 60th anniversary of the Raleigh-Rockcastle Association Camp. Former camp director and pastor, Dewey Lowe, has been involved in 51 of those camps. His successor in the pulpit at Breckenridge Missionary Baptist Church was also his successor as camp director. Corey Brooks has a great vision for both the church and the camp.

The Raleigh-Rockcastle Association Camp was started in 1963 under the leadership of Dewey Wilson, pastor at the time of Sophia First Baptist Church. Others who were involved in the initial formation of the camp were Bob Keaton and Charlie Hudson. Associations would frequently host rallies and youth would travel to other churches for times of fellowship and Bible study. Relationships were built that evolved into a closeness of community, as youth would often see each other at ballgames and The 60th Raleigh-Rockcastle Association Camp will take place other events. The association camp was formed to deepen those relationships and further strengthen the association of churches.


Held annually at Camp Cowen, this camp is open to all middle and high school-aged youth. What makes the Raleigh-Rockcastle Association Camp unique, compared to WVBC-operated camps, is that the association handles the entirety of their registration, scheduling and menu. Pastors and leaders from within the association also rotate as speakers. Again, because it is an association camp, deep relationships are often formed that can be continued back at home. For Dewey Lowe, the camp is where he met his wife, Jeanne, where they raised their children and where they met their eventual son-in-law. Reflecting back on their many decades of involvement, Dewey said, "I wouldn't have changed a single thing!"

Corey's involvement is a bit more recent. He attended a couple times as a youth, but it wasn't until he became an adult that he really grasped the value of the camp. He initially volunteered as a counselor but later joined the camp leadership team when he was hired as the youth pastor at Breckenridge. Now serving as senior pastor of the same church, he continues to organize the camp and has involved many of their college students as counselors. A highlight for him this past summer was watching how well those college students poured into the lives of the youth. "It was so thrilling to watch them lead," Corey said. "They truly made it a great week for our students."

Thousands of lives have been changed over the past six decades of the Raleigh-Rockcastle Association Camp. That was also Othe case this past summer, as four more youth gave their lives to Christ and 60 more rededicated their lives.

"My hope for 2023 is to continue growing our camp," Corey said. "I love the history of it, and it is a blessing to be a part of it. If you are part of this association, we hope that you will join us next year!"

Parchment Valley; Covered Campfire Update

It is with great excitement that I share with you an update on Parchment Valley's newest addition: the **Greenlee Activity Campfire**, also known as the "Whippoorwill Covered Campfire."

This new facility is being built to honor all of the wonderful volunteers who have given of their time and finances to help build this incredible ministry.

Ground was broken last spring and construction began midsummer. Currently, we are installing the trusses and the construction of the roof will immediately follow. Once the exterior of the covered campfire is complete, we will then begin the construction of the inside. That is where we need your help!

The inside of the covered campfire will consist of 24 sections of seating. With two sections of seating already claimed and purchased, that leaves 22 sections to be funded — equal to the number of associations that make up our WVBC family. That being said, the challenge is: **Would you, as a church or as an individual, consider sponsoring a section of seating on behalf of your association? With 22 commitments of \$2000, that will be sufficient to complete this project.**

Our goal is to have the Whippoorwill Covered Campfire completed and available for use by late fall. We are already receiving calls from groups interested in reserving this space. We are excited to see how God uses it to help us continue our mission of being a place "where lives are changed."

One of our dear friends who was instrumental in the planning and construction startup of the project was Joe Greenlee. Joe recently


