"The Church of Christ Will Never Die!"

"The church of Jesus Christ will never die!" That is the promise Michael Beck shared with the nearly 300 individuals that were present at our WVBC Annual Meeting. Michael served as this year's keynote speaker, speaking from his experience as a pastor and Director of Re-Missioning for Fresh Expressions. A fresh expression is, in its simplest form, a pattern for believers to share their faith in their everyday lives. They are about getting creative in your church's reach.

The term our WVBC Outreach Commission adopted to convey the same concept is the word "microchurches." Others have referred to this as "hometown missionaries." Regardless of the terminology used, the goal is the same: to equip our church members to intentionally engage the communities they are already part of with the hope and truth of the gospel.

Michael spoke during both of our Friday sessions, providing biblical support for and practical examples of church members engaging their communities for Christ. One church member has started a Bible study at a tattoo parlor; another is sharing Christ with their running club; yet another has built relationships and is sharing about Christ at a local dog park; and another is reaching people at a local restaurant. With each example, these are places where the church member was already spending their time — they already had community. The goal, therefore, simply became to learn how to **intentionally engage those communities for Christ**.

The entire Annual Meeting, including the workshops, was built around this theme. Each of the main sessions, in addition to Michael's workshop, was recorded and is also available on our website. You can contact any of our staff to request Michael's PowerPoint slides.

With such a high percentage of West Virginia's population unchurched, we have to find ways to engage our communities with the gospel. The rapid secularization of our culture is quickly widening the gap between the church and our neighbors. And so, if we truly love our neighbors, then we must be willing to cross that gap to share the love of Christ with them. Gone are the days when they are going to come to us. We MUST go to them!

"Intentionally Engaging Communities for Christ" remains our theme for 2023. With 358 churches spread across our beautiful state, we have the ability to advance God's kingdom in a powerful way. The question just simply becomes, "Are we willing?"

Thanks-living!

What if I were to tell you that thankfulness is not an optional courtesy or an annual activity, but a guiding principle for a follower of Jesus Christ. This appears to be the Apostle Paul's direction for the church of Thessalonica. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). There is a difference between pausing to be thankful to God on the Thanksgiving holiday and living a life of thanksgiving unto God. In his letter to the church at Colossae, Paul wrote, "And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (Colossians 3:17).

One author captures it well:

How have we grown so deaf? How have we grown so immune to awesomeness? Why are we so reluctant to be staggered or thunderstruck? Perhaps the frequency of the miracles blinds us to their beauty. After all, what spice is there in springtime or a tree blossom? Don't the seasons come every year? Aren't there countless seashells just like this one? Bored, we say Ho-hum and replace the remarkable with the regular, the unbelievable with the anticipated. Science and statistics wave their unmagical wand across the face of life, squelching the oohs and aahs and replacing them with formulas and figures. Would you like to see Jesus? Do you dare be an eyewitness of His Majesty? Then rediscover amazement. (God Came Near by Max Lucado)

Recently, a sense of thanksgiving to God happened for me during the Annual Meeting of the WVBC Family at Summersville Baptist Church. I entered the sanctuary for the start of the first session and just stopped, taking time to listen to the joyous buzz of conversations and to observe the smiles and the sense of genuine community that filled the room as WVBC family members from across the state entered. In that moment, I knew God was present and moving among His people in a marvelous way. In that moment, I was reminded that we are all part of something much larger than ourselves. We are indeed the body of Christ, called to give witness of His grace and love demonstrated through the redemptive power of the Lord Jesus Christ. We are called to bring glory to God as we strive to do Christ's work together by intentionally engaging all communities with the Good News!

It is easy in this crazy mixed up world we live in to feel we have little to be thankful for. However, it is an opportunity to focus our thankfulness for the God we serve who can shine light and hope into the chaos. And He has called each of us, both individually and collectively, to be instruments in His mighty hands to do so. The encouragement for us is to change the idea of thanksgiving to the opportunity for thanks-living!

Jim Anderson Retires After 21 Years as Southeast Area Minister

After 21 years of serving our WVBC family as the Southeast Area Minister, Jim Anderson is retiring on December 31, 2022. As an area minister, Jim's responsibility included serving as a resource to 99 churches, made up of the following associations: Elk Valley, Fayette, Greenbrier-Raleigh, Hopewell and Rockcastle. Prior to joining Convention staff, he also previously served several WVBC churches and has nearly 50 years of preaching ministry.

Raised as a son of a bi-vocational pastor, Jim served in a bi-vocational role before joining WVBC staff. This has always been an important designation for him, as the majority of pastors in his area (and across our WVBC family) are bi-vocational. Ten years ago, as a way of honoring his late father, the WVBC began presenting the James Anderson, Sr. Bi-Vocational Pastor Award during our Annual Meeting. Jim and his sister, Mary Jo Slater, presented this year's award.

Jim has also long been passionate about missions. Initially introduced to the ministry of the House of Hope in Bolivia by founders Mario and Iris Morales, Jim has been leading annual trips for more than 15 years. Jim also serves as the president of Send the Light Fellowship, part of the Greenbrier-Raleigh Association, which has committed to monthly support to the House of Hope. Unable to lead a trip over the past couple of years due to COVID, Jim is planning on leading a trip in 2023.

In his retirement, Jim plans to join his wife, Susan, in the school system. Burdened by the lack of teachers, and burdened even more by the lack of positive male role models in the lives of young boys, Jim is planning to start working as a substitute teacher in the upcoming spring semester. He will also be busy with his farm, where he always promises to serve a cup of coffee to anyone who wants to come visit.

We are grateful for Jim's leadership over these past two decades and look forward to seeing how God continues to use him to change lives around the southeast part of the state!


The WVBC Welcomes Dana Gatewood as Southeast Area Minister

Women's Camp 2022: "Share Your Story"

It has been three and a half years...

Following Women's Camp 2019, the next camp was scheduled for spring of 2020, and – maybe you heard – there was a worldwide event which caused the camp to be delayed. Due to COVID-19, Women's Camp was postponed from spring of 2020 to fall of 2020, and then it was postponed again to fall of 2021, and then it was postponed once more to 2022. Upcoming Commissioning Service for Sarah McCloy

It was less than a year ago that Sarah McCloy was endorsed as our 42nd missionary from our WVBC family to serve with International Ministries. Called to serve in Japan, Sarah will serve as a part-time instructor at Shokei University, where she will teach English and work with the chaplaincy department. She will also serve as an assistant pastor at Shokei Baptist Church.

For the past year, Sarah has been traveling around the state and visiting other regions as she raises financial support. Thanks in large part to the individuals and churches of our WVBC family, Sarah has already reached the point of where she can begin planning her commissioning service!

International Ministries requires all missionaries to raise the entirety of their support prior to being commissioned for their first term. A term is considered five years (four years in-country and one year on home assignment). As a missionary preparing for her first term, Sarah had to raise funds for both one-time startup expenses and her ongoing monthly support (which includes salary, ministry costs, etc.). Her one-time costs were fully funded in only a few months. Her ongoing monthly support is nearing 90% in funding.

In addition to raising support, Sarah has had to go through extensive training as she prepares to serve overseas. She recently completed her security training, which began the day after she arrived home from her vision trip to Japan. After she moves to Japan, she will also be spending at least the first year of her term in language study. This is an important requirement for all missionaries who serve with International Ministries.

Everyone is invited to Sarah's commissioning service, which is scheduled to take place in the evening of Sunday, March 5th at Parchment Valley Conference Center. Specific time and details will soon follow.




Junior High Convention Recap

Church Health Check-Up Assessment Available


