Construction Begins for the Sunny Day Activity Center

We have officially broken ground to begin the construction of the **Sunny Day Activity Center** at Camp Cowen. The initial phase of construction will take place through the end of May, pausing during the summer camping season. It will then recommence in August with construction expected to be complete by November.

"As we break ground for the Sunny Day Activity Center," said Jill Narraway, WVBC Director of Camping and Youth, "we know this is so much more than just another building. Since 1943, God's faithful people have supported the facility expansions at camp in order to accommodate more campers. The WVBC is invested in the life-changing impact camp has in reaching thousands each year with the gospel. As a year-round building, the construction of Sunny Day increases our ministry reach during our summer camps and also gives us more opportunities throughout the year!"

Rob Ely was the director when the initial vision was cast. He said of the occasion, "The Sunny Day Activity Center will make a daily impact at Camp Cowen. The weather so regularly impacts programming, but this building will be a great asset for the weekly camps. It will also be a great place to develop leaders. The dream was to honor the incredible leaders who came before us and to invest in today's generation. The Sunny Day Activity Center will certainly accomplish that."

To date, just over \$1,200,000 has been raised toward the \$1,500,000 project. Of that total, nearly \$700,000 has been donated in the past six months! Those donations have allowed contracts to be signed and construction to begin. However, the remaining \$300,000 must be raised by the end of fall.

WVBC Family: Who Are We?

The Easter story is often titled "The Greatest Story Ever Told!" It is true that following the narrative of Jesus during His triumphal entry into Jerusalem riding on a donkey, to His betrayal, mock trial, beating, crucifixion and resurrection from the dead is a remarkable story. However, it is so much more. It is the account of Jesus' sacrificial death and subsequent resurrection from the dead to redeem us from the sentence of death and restore us to a right relationship with God. It is the reality that "God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). It is a theological truth that, "For our sake He made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21). And it is a humble

reminder that causes us to ask, as the psalmist did, "What is mankind that You are mindful of them, human beings that You care for them?" (Psalm 8:4).

It is within these realities that the West Virginia Baptist Convention finds its identity and purpose. When we proclaim our mission of "Doing Christ's Work Together," it has, as its focus, our desire and willingness to be used of God to change lives in two primary ways: for people of all ages and demographics to come to know Jesus Christ as their Savior and then to grow from that commitment to follow Him as their Lord. We often refer to these as evangelism and discipleship.

These two factors inform everything we strive to do together as the WVBC Family of Churches. We join hands and hearts because we know that by doing so, we can extend our reach and ability to influence more people for Christ than we could ever do alone.

We often point to Camp Cowen and to various association camps as examples of how to touch the lives of numerous people of all ages – some who may otherwise never hear of the wonderful message of Jesus' love and forgiveness. However, church camps could never happen on these large scales unless local churches pull together to provide the volunteers, leaders, prayers and financial support as well as inviting and bringing those who attend each week.

This same emphasis on changing lives for Christ informs every ministry we share together. It is found in our work with international missions and supporting those serving globally; in Baptist Campus Ministry as they take changing lives for Christ to college campuses across the state; at Parchment Valley as it reaches and equips people with education opportunities, conferences, training events and camps; at Brothers' Keeper as it ministers and shares Jesus' love with some of the poorest in Jackson County; at Bobby Wood School of Christian Studies, Internships, Mentoring and the Palmer Seminary Partnership as they actively train and equip leaders to serve churches and help them to be more effective in reaching their communities for Christ and teaching people to walk in His ways; in programs that help safeguard children to ensure safe ministries for children and youth to learn about Jesus; in ministries such as the Engaging Mental Health with Hope initiatives, teaching grandparents how to disciple their grandchildren and equipping local churches to be more effective in outreach through opportunities like the Dinner Church strategy of using the simple meal as an opportunity to introduce people outside the church to Jesus.

Truly we are the most effective in our efforts to change lives for Christ when we do so together. When we believe together, pray together, serve together, share our talents and gifts together, and financially support these ministries by giving together! As Emily Dickinson once wrote, "Let us all join hands so that no one will be lost."

David Hulme Announces Retirement

David Hulme has announced his retirement from his role as Northeast Area minister, effective July 1, 2024. David has always been a supporter of the ministries of the WVBC. He came to the staff as Area Minister in 2016 after serving 33 years at the Clarksburg Baptist Church with the final ten years as Senior Pastor. During his time on staff as Northeast Area Minister, David faithfully served the 95 churches in the Broad Run, Eastern, Fairmont, Goshen, Judson and Union Associations by caring for pastors, assisting pulpit committees, receiving new churches into the Convention Family, celebrating landmark occasions, resourcing churches and pastors, and overall encouraging them in the Lord!

In addition, David worked closely with the Outreach Commission in providing resources to churches as they launched digital ministries during the pandemic, assisting with re-missioning, introducing the Dinner Church Initiative and partnering with Renew Transformational Strategies to offer churches Health Check-Ups. Along with these ministries, David worked closely with the churches of Cuba. He has led and co-led numerous mission trip groups of WVBC people to serve short-term in Cuba. He continues to assist the churches there with much-needed resources for ministry and humanitarian needs.

While we are happy for David and his wife as they begin this next chapter in retirement, we are also sad to see him leave the staff. Mike Sisson points out, "You only need to visit a church or attend an association meeting with David to see how much they appreciated him and his ministry. I would often tease him about never sitting down to eat at an association meeting meal because he would wander around, visiting with people the entire time."

David said of his time on staff, "It has truly been a joy to serve the pastors, churches and associations of the Northeast Area, as well as the West Virginia Baptist Convention family as a whole, for the past eight years. I cannot thank all of you enough for your prayers, your support and the loving spirit with which you have welcomed me into your churches, hearts and lives."

When asked about how he plans to spend retirement he said, "There are no specific plans...but I want to spend time with family, maybe travel some and continue the mission work in Cuba."

During a specially called Executive Committee meeting on Friday, March 8, the proposal for a staff realignment that would move Kevin Sions into the role of Northeast Area Minister following the retirement of David Hulme was approved unanimously. Several factors were considered in the staff adjustment. The first being Kevin's role as Associate Director for Baptist Campus Ministry (BCM) in the Northern District. Taking into consideration Kevin's passion for ministry to college students, and after discussions with Rob Ely who oversees BCM, it was agreed that with the geographical overlap of both ministries, Kevin could effectively continue his work with BCM in this area.

Each Area Minister is assigned a second portfolio which is based on their area of expertise and passion. In David Hulme's case, his portfolio was outreach, including church re-missioning, church planting and the Dinner Church Initiative. David's portfolio will be shifted to Evan Arkell, who not only has a passion for these

ministries but is nearing the completion of his doctorate which will complement his new portfolio. This will allow Kevin the necessary time to engage with BCM as his second portfolio. Kevin feels this will strengthen his work with BCM because he will have more opportunity to build relationships with local churches and leaders that he can then invite to partner with BCM.

The second factor was the relationships and respect Kevin already has with many of the Northeast Area churches. Having grown up in the eastern panhandle, and having served in churches in different capacities, he already has many strong relationships and a good deal of familiarity that will assist him in serving those churches well as their area minister.

Mike Sisson added that what drew him to consider Kevin for the role was his observations of him over the past six years. "Kevin has a pastoral heart and calm demeanor, which are important qualities in ministering as a pastor to pastors. He takes time to process, which allows him to speak with wisdom rather than responding with a knee-jerk reaction in important decisions."

Kevin said of the opportunity, "I am grateful for the opportunity to transition into the role as Area Minister. I am looking forward to walking alongside churches and pastors and continuing to build relationships. Serving with BCM has provided a unique experience to see young adults create community through relationships that are centered in Christ. Having the same opportunity to see churches do the same is truly humbling."


Digging Deeper into 2 Samuel
