Exciting News: We are Fully Funded!



What started as a dream in 2015 has become a reality; we are now fully funded for the construction of the Sunny Day Activity Center!

In October of 2023, two anonymous donors stepped forward to relaunch this campaign under the condition that we immediately start building and raise the remaining \$550,000 that was needed. That was announced during the 2023 WVBC Annual Meeting, where individuals had the opportunity to purchase symbolic blocks. Over the remaining months of 2023 and early part of 2024, churches and individuals continued to give, numerous people made donations from their Required Minimum Distributions and others gave gifts in someone's memory. Invested money also grew, allowing us to stay ahead on all of our invoices without the need to borrow any money.

Over the course of the summer, churches had fundraising challenges, individuals sold t-shirts, kids donated leftover store money and we continued to get closer to our goal. Amazed at God's faithful provision, the WVBC Executive Board voted in October to go ahead and add the sports flooring to the project, originally planned as a future enhancement. Not only would this save money in the long-term, but it would also provide a safer recreational area for our kids. It was announced during the 2024 Annual Meeting that there was only \$120,000 left to raise.

One of our churches heard about that number and made a sizable gift, which prompted other individuals and churches to also want to participate in the completion of this campaign. In the month of December, as donations poured in, we not only met but exceeded our goal of \$1,516,000. The extra funding allows us to start building a maintenance fund to care for this building long-term.

How incredible it has been to once again see the faithfulness of God and His people!

Many were able to view the progress of the construction at our Open House in November. Since that time, the rest of the original construction has been completed and the sports flooring has been ordered. The sports flooring will be installed in early spring when the outdoor temperatures get warmer.

We will host a Dedication Service for the Sunny Day Activity Center on Saturday, May 17th. We would love for our entire WVBC family to join us for this special occasion!

Thank you to the many individuals and churches who have helped contribute to this campaign. We are excited to see how God uses this tool to further our mission at Camp Cowen of being a place "where people meet Jesus and grow as His disciples in a community of faith."

Doing Christ's Work Together

Abiding in Christ

Hudson Taylor, Missionary to inland China, found himself in a season of struggle in his mission efforts that quickly began to affect him physically, emotionally and spiritually. One of his friends sent him a note that would renew both his strength and effectiveness. He simply reminded Hudson to “let the Savior work in him by abiding, not striving—trusting Christ for the power.”

Jesus said, “I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing” (John 15:5). Simply put, abiding in Christ, or as it is sometimes translated, remaining in Christ, is necessary for an individual, a ministry, a church or a convention family of churches to be effective in producing life-giving fruit for the Kingdom of God. Apart from Christ, nothing of true value can be accomplished.

Jesus’ invitation to abide in Him is a call to spend time with Him. It’s a call to prayerfully seek His will for our lives and ministries, and His strength to accomplish that which He has called us to.

Christian singer Jessica King illustrates this point beautifully in her song “Keep Me in Your Will”:

Sometimes I think I'm in control / And I act so foolishly
Facing problems on my own / I don't know what's best for me
My mistakes at times disturb / All the plans You have made
Lord, keep me in Your will / So I won't be in Your way.”

As Hudson Taylor was reminded, we are called to abide rather than to strive. Our desire is to follow God’s will for our lives and our ministries. God’s will done His way and in His power!

Elton Trueblood writes, “I have no doubt that He has a will for my life, but I am quite sure that I frustrate it time and again... Not only are we free to initiate action; we are also free to resist. In Christian experience, prayer is not telling God what to do, for that would be presumptuous; it is, by contrast, telling Him what we think we need. However, the humble practitioner always adds, at least tacitly, ‘if it be thy will’ because he recognizes his finitude and is sincerely glad that not all his petitions have been granted. Most of the problems relating to God’s will are already solved when we see prayer not as an effort to change it, but as loving communication which may help in the promotion of that will, whereas without prayer it might be frustrated.”

As we as a Convention focus on a call to prayer this year, let us seek to abide in Christ more deeply so that we may be fruitful in serving Him and that He may be glorified in our lives and ministries.



Executive Board Approves Plans for 2025

On Saturday, January 4th, the WVBC Executive Board met at Parchment Valley Conference Center to review and approve the ministry plans for 2025. Continuing the theme from the past three years, the focus remains on “Intentionally Engaging Communities for Christ,” with a special emphasis this year on “for Christ.”

Nancy Wolfe opened the meeting with a devotion on prayer. Her devotion proved to be extremely timely as the board agreed that prayer needed to be a major focus this year. As was shared at the WVBC Annual Meeting, we will be launching a statewide prayer initiative, inviting churches to pray together. To help facilitate this, four prayer books will be passed around the state for churches to record their requests and to pray for others. Be on the lookout for more details on this. Also be sure to contact your area minister if you want to be part of this.

After the devotion, each of the four commissions — the Discipleship Commission, Leadership Commission, Outreach Commission and Stewardship Commission — separated into their own meetings to discuss their plans for carrying out the theme. Following those meetings, the Executive Board once again gathered to report on the commission meetings and to approve the 2025 budget. That budget was passed unanimously.

The meetings not only provided an opportunity to look forward, but it also gave us a chance to look back at what God did in

We celebrated the 209 salvations that took place at WVBC events this past year, the tripling of locations for the Bobby Wood School of Christian Studies, the exponential growth of Baptist Campus Ministry and the news that the Sunny Day Activity Center was now fully funded! Despite Power Concerns, Cuban Christians Display an Infectious Joy

This past November, I was able to lead a team to visit our partners in Cuba. That team consisted of Greg and Melanie Swisher (Calvary Baptist, Oak Hill), Cari Pauley (Forks of Coal Missionary Baptist), Phil and Tori Wayman, and Mark Rohrbough (Clarksburg Baptist). During our trip, we visited churches in Havana, Ranchuelo and Zulueta.

We arrived in Havana two days after Hurricane Rafael passed through. There wasn't much damage in the areas we visited. However, we were without power for the first day and part of the second.

Speaking of power, Cuba has been plagued with major power outages. Their power grid is a disaster. Random and lengthy power outages are a fact of life for most Cubans. Almost every place we visited experienced some type of power outage while we were there.

Food and medicine continue to be in short supply. Thanks to a gift from the Eastern Baptist Association, we were able to take a good amount of medicine with us. One of the ways we can help with the food shortages is through a company called Tuambia. Several times a year, through the generosity of churches and individuals, we can send shipments of much-needed food to the churches in the areas listed above.

The churches we visited are growing. Two have outgrown their seating capacity, so we were able to assist them with funds to add

seating to their sanctuaries. Again, these funds came from our group, along with gifts sent with us from individuals and churches in the US.

My biggest takeaway from this trip is the infectious joy of the Cuban Christians, despite their circumstances. Their worship and prayer times are genuine and powerful, baptisms are frequent and discipleship is real.

Thank you to our WVBC family for your support of our efforts in Cuba.

Parchment Valley Welcomes New Director of Operations





Weirton Christian Center Has Had Great Year!

Weirton Christian Center has had a great year, serving a total of 86 students in the afterschool program and 38 preschoolers for the 2024-25 school year. We just celebrated a wonderful CHRISTmas celebration with the help of many of our supporting churches! Once again, Vienna Baptist Church provided shoeboxes for each child, and we appreciate all the donations and gift cards for Christmas! We also opened our new playground this year, which was covered by two local foundations, and we are getting ready to expand the garden even further to add more raised beds and some fruit trees.

Our main goal with the students is to help with homework and learning, while also providing a hot meal and snack each day. It is a blessing to be able to add to their life experiences with piano, ukulele and dance lessons. We also provide the opportunity to perform in the Signs of Hope group.

Middle and high school students participate in a leadership program where they learn life skills and get the chance to work in the classrooms, earning a wage after meeting volunteer and education requirements. Our entrepreneurial group makes jewelry and crafts to sell at local events, where they earn half and the program receives the other half. This has been a tremendous program for the past six years, sponsored by Cleveland Cliffs.

We have been blessed by our WV Baptist family who has made it possible for us to continue our ministry. We are currently starting a Camp Campaign, to be able to continue to send our kids to camp this summer. A week of camp is \$275 per child. If you or your church would like to sponsor a child for a week, you can donate online or send a check to the Weirton Christian Center. We also need to rebuild our Quarters for Grades Program to encourage our kids to improve their grades. Outside of our operational expenses, our other main needs include the transportation fund and feeding our preschool students.

Many thanks to all who have put us in their mission budgets and continue to support and pray for our ministry.

On December 15, 2024, Joseph "Randy" Walker was ordained as a deacon at Hampton Baptist Church (Kanawha Valley).


Billy Jarrell is also scheduled to be ordained as a deacon at Barboursville Baptist Church (Guyandotte).
